

Penn State-Miami Highlight Football Weekend Play

Southern Cal, Methodist Play

Penn State, somewhat shaky against Navy last week despite its pre-season rating as the top college football power in the East, faces an even sterner test tonight when it meets Miami in the Orange Bowl.

Southern California should enjoy an easier task against Southern Methodist in Friday night's only other major contest.

The Penn State-Miami match, bringing together two well-balanced and exciting teams, is one of the highlights of the weekend schedule which also includes Saturdays games involving Notre Dame-Oklahoma, Baylor-Auburn, Mississippi-Kentucky, Iowa-California and Minnesota-Missouri.

Star Halfback Returns
Cause for much of the optimism surrounding Penn State this year is the return of halfback Roger Kochman to join such outstanding teammates as quarterback Galen Hall and end Bob Mitinger.

Kochman was a sophomore sensation two years ago but a leg operation kept him out of action in 1960. He saw only limited service in his return to competition last week but still gained 60 yards in 10 carries.

Penn State defeated Navy, 20-10, in its opener after falling behind at halftime. However, a dark shadow was cast in the Nittany Lions' path when star end Dave Robinson was put out of service for at least six weeks with a dislocated collarbone.

Miami perennially fields strong teams and is capable of an upset.

Maris Seeks 61st Tonight

Home run No. 61 is the target tonight as Roger Maris starts in pursuit of the circuit shot that will make him the only player in major league history to hit more homers in one season than Babe Ruth.

Maris has only the three-game set starting tonight at Yankee Stadium against the Boston Red Sox in which to hit No. 61 and surpass the total of 60 compiled by the Bambino in 1927 when he established baseball's most revered record.

Maris, of course, cannot break the Babe's record according to the ruling of Commissioner Ford Frick, who set a 154-decision limit on tying or breaking Ruth's 34-year-old mark, and he'll be playing without homer-hitting partner Mickey Mantle.

Mantle, who has hit 54 homers, was hospitalized Thursday with a hip infection and will miss the final games of the American League's expanded schedule. He is, however, expected to be ready for the opening of the World Series against the Cincinnati Reds next Wednesday.

Neither Mantle nor Maris, who took a day off Wednesday when the Yankees played Baltimore, worked out Thursday as the AL champs used the open date for a hitting drill and an opportunity to discuss their Series opponents.

Maris hit No. 60 against Jack Fisher Tuesday night, then provoked comment by sitting it out against the Orioles Wednesday because he was "bushed."

On Thursday's light program, the Los Angeles Dodgers, clinched second place in the National League as Don Drysdale six-hit Philadelphia 10-0, and third-place San Francisco beat Pittsburgh 4-1.

In the American League, Cleveland topped Minnesota 12-5 and Los Angeles drubbed Washington 13-4.

Drysdale (13-10), beating the Phils for the sixth consecutive time, gained his third shutout of the year. He also hit a homer while Daryl Spencer connected for a three-run shot as the Phils contributed six unearned runs with four errors. Chris Short (6-12) took the loss.

The Aou brothers—Matty and Felipe—had a field day for the Giants after the Pirates had taken the lead in the second against Jim Duffalo (5-1) on a solo homer by Dick Stuart and a two-run blast by Smokey Burgess. Matty had two doubles and two singles, scored twice and drove in a run.

Felipe stroked three singles for two RBI and also scored twice. Earl Francis (2-8) was the loser.

Woodie Held was the offensive power for the Indians, driving in five runs with a double and two homers. Willie Kirkland also homered for the Indians, who tagged Pedro Ramos with his 20th loss against 11 wins. Wynn Hawkins, touched for Harmon Killebrew's 46th homer, won it in relief off starter Jim Grant.

The Angels spotted Washington a 3-run lead then came from behind to trounce the Senators, Leon Wagner drove in eight runs with a grand slam homer, two doubles and a sacrifice fly. Eli Grba went the route for the Angels for his 11th victory of the season. Dick Donovan, the Washington starter, suffered his 10th defeat.

OSU, Stanford Battle Feature Of State's Weekend Football Ticket

Oregon States battle with Stanford at Corvallis Saturday afternoon headlines college football action in the state this weekend, as Oregon travels to Salt Lake City for a clash Saturday night with the University of Utah Redskins.

OSU, 19-8 losers to highly-ranked Syracuse last weekend, is favored over Stanford, but the Beavers don't figure to have an especially easy time against the undefeated Indians, who beat Tulane 9-7 last week after going through a winless season last year.

Oregon's speedy Ducks, who ran all over Idaho for a 51-0 win last weekend, will face a tougher opponent in Utah, which opened with a 40-0 romp over Colorado State, then dropped a hard-fought 7-0 decision to Wisconsin.

In small college action, Willamette's Beavers go up against powerful Humboldt State of Arcata, Calif. The California team has won 20 straight regular season games. Both teams were rated AA, or superior, in the first rating of NAIA teams this season.

Linfield, the favorite in the Northwest Conference and also rated AA in the NAIA rankings, is expected to get its second victory at McMinnville Saturday night over Oregon College of Education.

Ducks Face Rugged Test

UCLA's Bruins, the pre-season choice as the best in the West, may take to the airways when they battle Michigan's big Wolverines at Ann Arbor Saturday.

The Uclans stuck to the ground in opening with a 19-6 victory over the Air Force, but his time they face a line averaging 223 pounds per man. A pass could prove the expedient move.

Trouble brews for most of the West Coast teams. California's Bears, walloped 28-3 by Texas last week, meet No. 1 ranked Iowa at Iowa City, while Washington travels to meet Illinois. The Rose Bowl champion tilt 13-6 before another Big Ten club—Purdue—in its opener.

Stanford's Indians, having downed Tulane 9-7 for their first triumph after 11 setbacks, go to Corvallis to meet the revamped Oregon State Beavers. Coach Tommy Prothro of OSC has gone to a form of T formation to utilize both Terry Baker and Don Kasso in the same backfield. Both were quarterbacks in Prothro's single wing a year ago. Now Baker plays quarterback, and Kasso is at left half. The Beavers fell before powerful Syracuse 19-8 in the opener.

At Los Angeles Friday night, the Trojans of Southern California hope to bounce back against Southern Methodist. USC hasn't won in its last 12 outings.

Mantle Treated For Hip Abscess

NEW YORK (AP)—The October jinx has overtaken Mickey Mantle early this year.

With a history of ailments and injuries besetting him at World Series time, the fleet New York Yankee slugger who, with teammate Roger Maris, has given new meaning to the initials M&M, today is in Lenox Hill Hospital, the victim of an abscess in the region above the right hip. He'll play no more during the regular season. He probably will be ready for the World Series.

The star centerfielder had been ailing with a virus for 10 days. With the development of the abscess he was ordered into the hospital Thursday, where Dr. Sydney S. Gaynor, the club physician, excised and packed the infected area.

Gaynor said Thursday night hospitalization of two or three days might be expected, and there was no chance of Mantle playing out the remainder of the regular season, which ends Sunday.

The current misfortune is strictly in keeping with Mantle's luck. As far back as 1951, his first year in the majors, he suffered a right knee injury when he stepped into a drain connection in right centerfield during the second series games with the Giants. He spent the rest of the series in a hospital, and subsequently underwent an operation to repair the damage.

He missed four games of the 1955 series with the Brooklyn Dodgers because a flareup of chronic osteomyelitis from which he had suffered since incurring a leg injury in high school football in his native Oklahoma. Osteomyelitis is a disease of the bones. He also missed a full game and parts of two others in the 1957 series with Milwaukee after suffering a shoulder injury in a collision with Braves' second baseman Red Schoendienst.

This year Mantle and Maris staged a prolonged, friendly home run rivalry which created an almost feverish interest among the fans as both sluggers appeared to have an excellent chance to equal or better Babe Ruth's record of 60 home runs during a 154-decision season, set in 1927.

The hospitalization means Mantle ends the regular season with 34 home runs. Maris hit 59 homers in the 154 games and eventually made it 60. The Yankees—with Maris shooting for No. 61—open their final three-game series with Boston at Yankee Stadium tonight, with afternoon games Saturday and Sunday.

Mickey thus ends his curtailed season with a .317 batting average, 34 home runs and 128 runs batted in in 153 games. He had 163 hits in 514 official at bats, including 16 doubles and six triples. He walked 126 times and struck out 114 times.
