Griffith Favored Saturday

NEW YORK (AP)—Benny (Kid) Paret held the world welterweight boxing championship 11 months before he lost it to swashbuckling Emile Griffith.

The Cuban, 24, gets a return title crack at Griffith in a 15-round television (ABC 9 p.m., Eastern Standard Time) fight at Madison Square Garden Saturday night.

"I'd sure like to get the title back," said Paret through an interpreter. "You don't know what being champion means until you're no longer champion."

The odds are 3-1, however, that the muscular, aggressive kid won't dethrone Griffith.

Griffith, 23, a Virgin Islands native now living in New York, has won eight straight fights over strong opponents and has shown improvement—especially in power—with each fight.

A fair puncher before, the tireless youngster developed a knock-out punch within the last year. In his last five fights he stopped South Africa's Willie Towel in eight rounds; outpointed Cuba's Luis Rodriguez, then the No. 1 contender; knocked out Paret in the 13th round of their title bout at Miami Beach April 1; stopped Gaspar Ortega in the 12th round of a title defense at Los Angeles June 3 (Ortega's first kayo loss); and rocked Yama Bahama in outpointing the middleweight at New York last July 29.

Griffith's record is 25-2, including nine knockouts. He never has been stopped.

Paret's record is 33-10-3, including 9 knockouts. He has been stopped twice.

Benny hasn't fought since he lost the title to Griffith. He collected \$20,000 for stepping aside and permitting Griffith to defend against Ortega.
