



27 Sites To Be Set For Action

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U. S. military strategists expect 27 new intercontinental missile sites to be ready for action within the next three months at bases offering considerable protection against A-bomb attack.

The Air Force already has 27 Atlas ICBM sites. But their construction does not provide any measurable assurance they would survive a major attack.

Pentagon sources said the Strategic Air Command planned to take over before the end of the year Atlas missile launching sites at Forbes Air Force Base in Kansas and Fairchild Air Force Base near Spokane, Wash.

Each of the new bases has nine launching sites widely dispersed to avoid being knocked out by a single nuclear explosion. Their big rockets will be stored in coffin-shaped underground structures strong enough to withstand near misses by enemy missiles.

The Air Force has announced that the first squadron of Titan missiles will achieve ready status at Lowry Air Force Base, Wyo., by the end of the year.

Although construction of the Titan sites differs from that of the Atlas sites, both offer roughly equal protection against nuclear attack.

The 27 Atlas sites already under SAC control are at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.; Offutt Air Force Base, Neb.; and Warren Air Force Base, Wyo. These launching sites are bunched in one area instead of being dispersed, however. The missiles are stored above ground.

Even the underground Atlas sites at Fairchild and Forbes do not provide the maximum protection planned for later U.S. missile bases.

These new bases, not scheduled for completion in the immediate future, will feature underground structures in which the missile will be stored in an upright position rather than on its side.

The upright structure, shaped like an underground silo, will permit the missile men to launch advanced versions of the Titan from below the surface of the earth.

Oregon State Taxes Lowest

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's state taxes amounted to \$113 per person in 1961, lowest on the West Coast, Commerce Clearing House, Inc., reported today.

The national average of state per capita taxes was \$106. The Chicago tax research firm reported per capita state taxes of \$107 in Washington, \$142 in California, \$138 in Alaska. Hawaii had \$206, highest in the country.

New Jersey was low with \$63. The company noted that only three states — Oregon, Ohio and Wyoming — had lower tax collections last year than in the year before. Oregon's 4 per cent reduction was the largest.

Hospital Gets Estate Funds

MEDFORD (AP) — The Rogue Valley Memorial Hospital will get a million dollars from the estate of Mrs. Alfred Carpenter, who died Sept. 13.

Her will left the money to a foundation, to be used for construction if the hospital so decides in the next 20 years. In the meanwhile the hospital will get the income from the million dollars.

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Nixon Announcement Sparks Battle Vows

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — For an announced candidate for attorney general, said "Richard Nixon is eminently qualified to serve as governor of California."

Leading the Democratic attack were statements by Gov. Edmund G. Brown and Roger Kent, chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee.

Brown said Nixon "surrendered to heavy pressure from eastern Republican bosses" and that the former vice president "sees the governorship only as a stepping stone for his own political ambitions."

Another announced candidate for the governor's seat, Assembly minority leader Joseph C. Shell, said Wednesday, "Nothing Mr. Nixon has said... has changed my intention in the slightest."

He said Nixon "has no working knowledge of the governorship because he has been occupied with national and international affairs since 1952."

Republican Mayor George Christopher of San Francisco, who earlier had announced that his decision whether to seek the governorship depended on Nixon's stand, praised the former vice president.

"I personally have been for him all this while," the mayor said. "With his proven leadership, his governmental experience and the vote-getting ability he demonstrated in winning California in the presidential election last year, we of the Republican party can be sure of sweeping the next Brown administration from Sacramento," the mayor said.
