## Desk-Flying Officers Ordered To Exercise

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gen. Curtis E. LeMay has taken steps to require the 91 Air Force generals flying desks at the Pentagon to play squash, lift weights or exercise regularly in some other way.

The Air Force chief of staff, a pretty rugged type himself, has expressed "very, very great concern" that generals doing staff work keep in top shape, sources said.

To this end, the Air Force Surgeon General, Maj. Gen. Oliver K. Neiss, has drafted a program

which is expected to gain final approval by LeMay.

Each general would be required to undergo a physical examination by an Air Force doctor, who then would recommend whatever measures might be needed to keep down waistlines and stay in trim generally.

Under the plan, general officers would have a couple of options. They could leave their offices for at least a half day a week for recreation or exercise "of which physical activity is an essential element." This could include golf

If they preferred, the generals could take more strenuous exercise for shorter periods of time at an officers' gymnasium in the Pentagon. Available there are handballs, swimming, weightlifting, squash and the like.

Air Force doctors would keep tabs to determine whether the generals attain and maintain the proper physical condition.

The Air Force, along with the other services, has taken a new look at its fitness program under Defense Department orders to intensify activities in this field.

## Craft Projects, Basic Art Classes Offered

Classes in craft projects and basic art structure will be offered on Monday and Tuesday nights at Klamath Union High School starting Monday and Tuesday.

The extension division art courses, which offer college credit, will be taught by Howard Hall and Lyle Matoush, KUHS art teachers.

Regular fees are \$11 per credit hour for the 10-week long courses. After Oct. 3 a late registration fee will be charged. Persons interested in enrolling should call TU 2-6230 or TU 2-3298 before Monday.

Offered for the first time in Klamath Falls, the Monday night class taught by Matoush will aim at helping the classroom teacher's craft activities for the elementary

school. The course will include puppetry, jewelry, modeling, book-binding, printmaking and paper mache.

Tuesday night's class in "Composition and Visual Theory" will offer instruction and basic research in all art structure. The class will spend part of each meeting in practical work, studying line, color, balance and unity. In addition, students will work on their own projects. Hall said the course would offer two or three hours of upper division credit.

Both classes will run from 7 to 9:45 p.m.

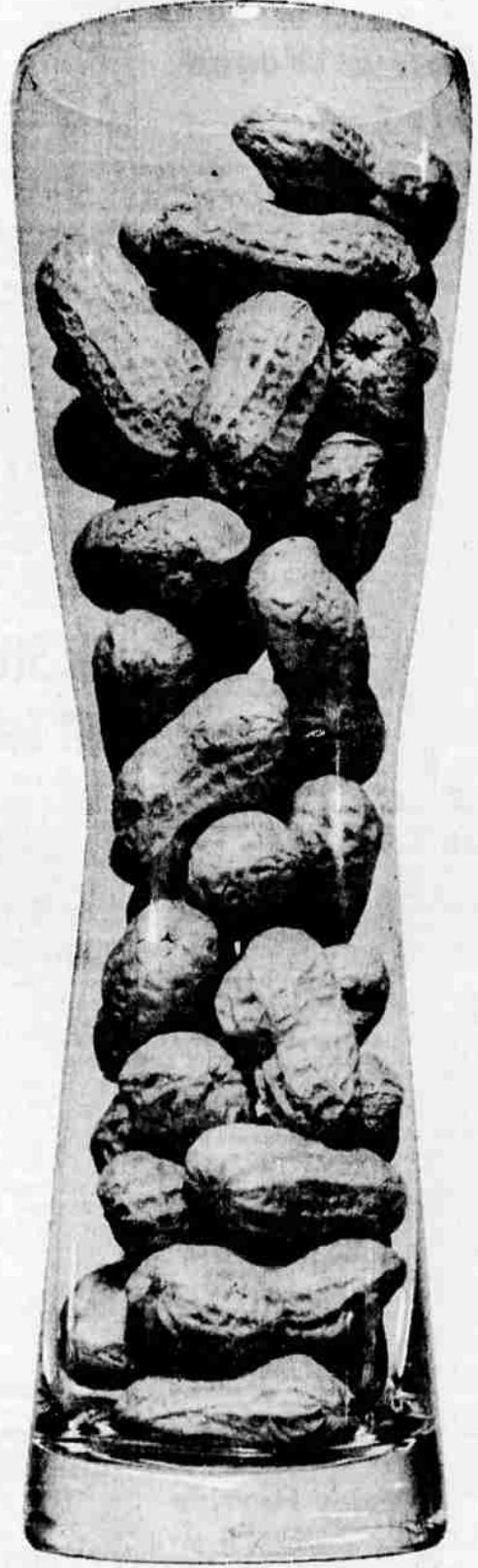
