Congratulations via transatlantic telephone came from the bridegroom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sven Gustov Nilsson, who will greet the newlyweds in Lund, Sweden, where they will make their home.

One of the most impressive wedding ceremonies of the season united Geraldine Nelda Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Bertil Johnson of Tulelake and Claes Bonde Nilsson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sven Gustov Nilsson of Lund, Sweden, at 4 o'clock on Sept. 2 in the First Presbyterian Church in Tulelake. The couple exchanged vows before an altar beautifully decorated with baskets of white gladioli and pink carnations and set off with two tall, tapering candelabra. The Rev. Wayne Wattman performed the double ring ceremony.

The newlyweds will establish their first home in Lund, Sweden, where he will complete his education at the Elmars Agricultural College. The young couple sailed from New York last week after an extended wedding trip across the country and visit to Glacier Park and Niagara Falls.
