

Pelican Offense Clicks In 27-14 Win Over Eureka

A stone-wall defense and a pulsing ground and aerial attack converted a tie ballgame into a victory for a high-flying gang of Pelicans Friday night as they rolled over the Loggers of Eureka by a 27 to 14 score in a battle at Albee Stadium in Eureka.

In a bruising, slam-bang defensive struggle, it was the passing arm of Kent Hunsaker and the timing of such Pelican backs as Dave Stippich and Larry McClure that spelled the difference between two rugged teams.

The lack of a potent aerial attack and an even poorer pass defense cost the Loggers heavily as Hunsaker found his receivers on five of seven passes, two scoring

TDs, another setting up a scoring play and still others coming at crucial moments in the struggle.

It was a 29-yard aerial from Hunsaker to Dana Ash that opened the scoring. Ash pulled in the pass on the 10 and hustled into the end zone unhampered for the score. John Ruger booted the extra point for a Pelican 7-0 lead. The score climaxed an 80-yard drive with the Pelicans taking the opening kickoff on their 20 and never relinquishing it until they had converted it into seven points midway through the quarter.

However, Eureka came roiling back to tie it up in the same frame when George Muzio bulldozed over from the three-yard line, and

Larry Lawry split the uprights for the tying point with a minute left in the first stanza.

Again, Hunsaker took to the air to set up the second Pel counter. He found Stippich for a completion on the 20-yard line from the 35. Stippich cut over tackle and back to his left to carry to the eight. Larry McClure picked up a yard down the middle, then cut back on the next play to punch over for the second touchdown. Again, Ruger booted the extra point, this time with 7:20 left in the second quarter. Despite a frantic effort to tie it up, the score ended with Klamath holding a 14-7 halftime lead.

Coach Bob Williams' charges were hard-pressed in the third

quarter to hold off a battling Logger squad, but after holding deep in their territory on downs, and being held in turn, Hunsaker's punt was blocked by Dave Larson, and the bouncing ball was grabbed by Rich Keller, who rambled to the eight-yard line. From here, Muzio bulldozed the last eight yards for his second counter of the night. Mark Melendy Jr., son of the Eureka mentor, elected to run the high pass from center for the extra point and scrambled for the successful conversion to tie the score at 14-all with just 30 seconds left in the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was all Klamath Falls as the Pelicans rolled back from the tie score, and with about two minutes gone

in the fourth quarter, Stippich swept the right side, cut back and rolled 37 yards to score and put the Pels in front 20 to 14. Ruger's extra point attempt was blocked by Mike Redman.

Eureka attempted to put together a final scoring drive, but a rock-ribbed Klamath forward wall forced them to punt. Roger Macy broke through to block the punt and the Pels recovered on the 42 of Eureka.

When the Whitebirds' running game missed fire, Hunsaker settled a long aerial into the outstretched hands of Stippich on the Logger 10, and he rambled in untouched for the game's final counter. Ruger made it three-for-four on conversions and Klamath led

a decisive 27 to 14 lead with five minutes left in the game. Eureka took to the air in the final minutes, but found KU defense adequate to the threat and time ran out with the Pels chalking up their third victory in four starts, avenging two previous consecutive losses to Eureka.

The statistics showed the superiority of the Pels' ground game. They notched 17 first downs to only five for Eureka. The highly regarded Logger ground game could find few holes in the Pel forward wall and final figures gave them a net of 94 yards to 347 for Klamath. Muzio was big ground gainer for the losers with Hunsaker, Stippich and McClure leading the Klamath back brigade.

Stippich turning in the best performance with 72 yards in seven carries for a per-carry average just over 10 yards. His figure was aided by one 37-yard touchdown smash. Hunsaker reeled off 71 yards in 14 carries for a 5-yard-per carry average, and McClure, the workhorse for Klamath, carried 15 times for 57 yards, average about 3.5 per carry.

It was a well earned win for Klamath, and was the final non-conference clash before KU moves against its two toughest Southern Oregon Conference foes, Grants Pass and Medford, on successive weekends. Next Friday they head the Cavemen in their own den, and the following Friday, entertain the Black Tornado in a Home-

coming game on Modoc Field. Their already potent ground game. The combination will face a rough challenge next weekend.

Indians Upset Beavers

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Spirit-ed Stanford upset Oregon State, 34-0, Saturday and emerged as one of the West Coast's football powers.

It was the second straight upset victory for Stanford, which downed Tulane, 9-7, last week.

Oregon State was favored by two touchdowns, and for two quarters dominated the game. Then quarterback Rod Sears of Stanford led an amazing uprising.

He passed for one touchdown, set up two others and kept Oregon State back on its heels throughout the second half.

Stanford linemen came to life and rocked Oregon State back thereafter.

The Staters, who had compiled 29 yards and 11 first downs in the opening half, could get only four first downs in the second half, and they came only after

Sears had given Stanford an insurmountable lead.

Thus coach Jack Curcice's Indians, who failed to win a game last year, are undefeated after two outings.

Stanford did not even threaten in the first half but Sears broke the game open in the third quarter.

Stanford took a second half kickoff and Sears mixed passes with end runs to move his team 65 yards to the first touchdown. The big play was a 38-yard pass from Sears to halfback Larry Roysse, who made a diving catch on the 2.

Minutes later Sears conducted Stanford 56 yards, passing the final 22 to end Steve Pursell, and Stanford was ahead, 14-0, as the fourth quarter opened.

Oregon State began gambling for fourth-down yardage deep in its own territory, but the aroused

Stanford line balked, and Stanford fell heir to three easy scores. The Indians had to go only 28, 24 and 33 yards for the final touchdowns.

Oregon State's only bright spot was quarterback Terry Baker, who completed 139 yards, 92 of them from passing. He completed two passes and directed Oregon State in an 88-yard march after the opening kickoff, but the drive stopped on the Stanford 3 when Baker fumbled.

Oregon State was strong and confident throughout the first half and penetrated Stanford territory twice in the second quarter, once being stopped by downs on the Stanford 24 and later going to the 3, where a field goal try by Tim Ankersen sailed wide in the closing seconds of the half.

Quarterback Bill Henselman of Lewis and Clark ranks third in total offense with 179 yards. Begun is fourth with his 174. Halfback Bill Wood of West Virginia Wesleyan is the leader in total offense with 213 yards.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP)—Senior quarterback Kermit Jorgensen cranked up touchdown drives of 54 and 72 yards, and speedster Charlie Mitchell raced 66 yards to score in the last four minutes to give Washington a 20-7 victory over Illinois Saturday.

The Rose Bowl football champions of the last two years, who opened their season a week ago by losing to Purdue 13-7 in Seattle, stayed on the ground as a strong wind swept the field and drove to touchdowns in the first and second quarters.

The Huskies held a 14-7 lead at halftime after Illinois winged 80

yards in 15 plays to score 25 seconds before the second period ended.
