

Major Baseball Play In Twilights

O'Toole Series Starter

Associated Press Sports Writer Jim O'Toole, Cincinnati's young southpaw ace scheduled to face the New York Yankees in the opening game of the World Series Wednesday, is well primed but the Reds' manager is not. O'Toole (19-9) and D. Johnson, Edwards (2), Foss, McBean (4), Labine (8) and Smith, Winner — O'Toole (19-9), Loser — Foss (1-1), HR—Coleman.

Johnson strained a muscle in his left side while taking batting practice before O'Toole pitched five innings of four-hit ball in his final tuneup for the series while the Reds clobbered the Pittsburgh Pirates 8-1.

It was the eighth straight victory and the 19th in 23 decisions for O'Toole, who hasn't lost since Aug. 11.

According to Dr. Richard Rohde, Johnson strained a muscle in the vicinity of his floating ribs during batting practice and aggravated it when he batted in the second inning. Johnson is the Reds only experienced receiver and was hitting .270. Rookies Jerry Edwards, hitting .186, and Jerry Zimmerman, batting .202, are the other catchers.

The Milwaukee Braves retained a chance to tie the National League for third place in the National League by whipping the Giants 4-1 behind Warren Spahn in a five-inning game halted by rain. The other NL clubs were idle.

In the American League, Roger Maris walked twice and popped out twice, failing to hit home run No. 61 while the New York Yankees were beating the Boston Red Sox 2-1. Detroit defeated Minnesota 6-4 in 10 innings, Baltimore edged Chicago 3-2 in 10 innings and Washington blanked Kansas City 2-0 on a two-hitter by Pete Burnside. Rookie catcher Bob Rodgers hit a grand slam home run for the Los Angeles Angels to defeat the Cleveland Indians, 6-4.

The Pirates reached O'Toole for their only run in the fifth inning on a two-out triple by Don Clemond and Dick Stuart's single. The Reds scored all they needed off Larry Foss (1-1) in the first inning, tagging him for three runs, two on Gordon Coleman's 28th homer.

Spahn (21-13) stopped the Giants on four hits, winning 21 games for the 11th time in his career.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—In a season that has brought them about as much gratification as a fractured wrist, the Cleveland Indians have reached the point where there are only three more things they can lose.

Two games and a manager. General Manager Gabe Paul came to Los Angeles for the Indians' final series and a source close to the club told The Associated Press Paul intended to announce the dismissal of Manager Jimmie Dykes here over the weekend.

But, the source said, Paul evidently changed his mind and will fire Dykes Monday in Cleveland. Paul is expected to appoint a successor at the same time and the most persistent rumor is that Indian Coach Mel McGaha will get the job.

The Indians flourished early in the season and then tumbled to the bottom of the first division.

Maris Fails Again

Roger Maris, strengthened by a two-day rest, was unable to hit a ball more than 90 feet in his first cracks at home run No. 61 since the matched Babe Ruth's 60-homer total.

Maris walked twice and popped out twice Friday night against Boston right-hander Bill Monbouquette while the New York Yankees were beating the Red Sox 2-1.

Maris now has the final two games on the regular season program, against Boston Saturday and Sunday, in which to hit his 61st homer and become the most productive one-season homer hitter in major league history.

Ruth's record, of course, is safe under the 154-decision ruling of Commissioner Ford Frick.

John Blanchard's 21st homer in the fourth gave the Yankees a 1-0 lead that Whitey Ford protected until he finished his six-inning stint in a final tuneup for the World Series starting Wednesday against the Cincinnati Reds. Blanchard singled Maris, who had walked, home in the ninth to score the other Yankee run.

Ford, who gave up only four hits, finished the season with a 25-4 record. His .662 won-lost percentage is the best in the American League since Cleveland's John Allen compiled a 15-1 record and .938 mark in 1937. Ford's 25 wins are the most in the league since Dave Ferriss of the Red Sox won the same number in 1946.

In the AL, Detroit edged Minnesota 6-4 in 10 innings, Baltimore nipped Chicago 3-2 in 10 innings, Washington blanked Kansas City 2-0 on Pete Burnside's two-hitter and Los Angeles came from behind to beat Cleveland 6-4.

Monbouquette (14-14) gave up only five hits, but his mates were able to score only against reliever Luis Arroyo in the seventh on Pumpie Green's single, a sacrifice and a single by Chuck Schilling. Rollie Sheldon (11-5), who succeeded Arroyo, picked up the win when Maris raced home with the clincher.

Jake Wood, who earlier struck out for the 139th time to surpass the AL record set by Minnesota's Jim Lemon, stroked a two-run single in the 10th as the Tigers beat Camilo Pascual (15-16).

Now Cash hit his 40th homer for Detroit while Terry Fox (5-2) got the win.

Hank Foiles' home run off Warren Hacker (3-3) in the 10th gave the Orioles and starter Chuck Estrada (15-9) the win over the White Sox. Jim Gentile drove in his 141st run for Baltimore, tying him for the league lead with Maris.

The only hits off Burnside (4-9) were singles by Frank Cipriani in the fifth and by Dick Howser in the ninth. A's starter Jim Archer (9-15) checked the Senators on six hits, but balked home Marty Keough in the fourth inning with the only run Washington needed.

A grand slam homer by rookie catcher Bob Rodgers, his first homer in the majors, gave the Angels their uphill victory over the Indians.
