

New Patterns Predicted As Rail Hearings Reopen

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Mergers in the Western Pacific which resume Monday, may set patterns for a revolution in the railroad industry.

Rail executives say "merger fever" is running so high that the United States might have only four to 15 super-giants after another decade.

The Western Pacific case poses these questions:

- Will the Interstate Commerce Commission give great encouragement to "merger fever" by allowing financially sound lines such as the Western Pacific to be gobbled up by bigger companies?
- And if consolidations become rampant, will the ICC favor side-by-side mergers leading to a few, noncompetitive regional lines—or end-to-end unions producing a handful of competing super-giants?

The Denver and Union Pacific have parallel tracks between Denver and Utah where they connect with the parallel lines of the Southern and Western Pacific.

But the ICC, which has approved some mergers, may keep the Western Pacific independent. This would considerably cool the "merger fever."

Such a course is recommended by regulatory bodies of eight western states and by politically potent railroad unions. They fear a loss of jobs and lessened competition.

Claim Economies Needed

However, management of all three railroads—like rail executives all over the country—argue that consolidations are necessary to eliminate duplication. Only by economies, they say, can railroads maintain financial health in the future.

And the Southern Pacific further claims that a railroad's real competition comes from trucks, not other railroads. Since World War II, trucks have tripled their tonnage and the train freight has declined.

With that contention, however, the Santa Fe hotly disagrees. Western Pacific, a reluctant bride, is not forced to seek a consolidation by insolvency. It makes money and foresees a bright future for itself.

But Frederick H. Whitman, its president, believes "merger fever" is so high that some bigger line will inevitably take Western Pacific over.

If so, Whitman prefers the Santa Fe in the hearings.

Whether Whitman is right in his belief in the inevitability of small lines being gobbled up, is a question which ultimately will be settled by the ICC.

Brains Get High Regard

PORTLAND (AP)—The president of Mills College in Oakland, Calif., told a Reed College audience Thursday night that brains were becoming more highly regarded and colleges were going to have to upgrade their curriculum.

Dr. C. Easton Rothwell, a Reed College graduate, spoke at the college's Conference on Higher Education, honoring Reed's 50th anniversary.

He told his audience the country had lost much of its anti-intellectual feelings of the early 1950s, partly because of the Soviet challenge, but more because of "our national tendency to regain our senses after a binge of fear and suffocation of the mind."

There must be more integration of high school and college programs, Rothwell said, along with an increased awareness of the importance of the high school teacher.

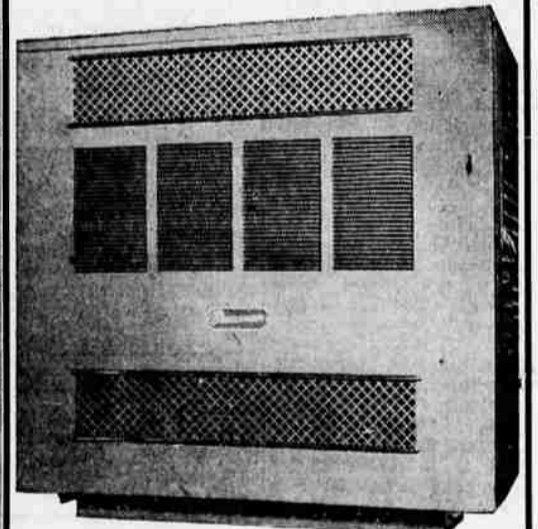
He pointed to the recent Portland Curriculum Study as a good example of what should be done to increase the cooperation of high schools and colleges.

"The observations of this study that call for a more professional atmosphere in the high school classroom, a reduction of housekeeping burdens and teaching loads for the high school teacher, higher salaries and other amenities calculated to attract first class young men and women into the secondary teaching are all to be commended," Rothwell said.

"It is a time of fundamental transition in American education, and a very exciting one," Rothwell said.
