

Eugene Gets Educational Stage Meet

The 1961 conference of the American Educational Theater Association will be held on the University of Oregon campus next Aug. 20-22.

The meetings will be held in conjunction with conferences of the American Community Theater Association, the Children's Theater Conference, and the Secondary School Theater Conference.

Horace W. Robinson, professor of speech in the University of Oregon and director of the University Theater, will be in charge of local arrangements.

The last western meeting of the groups was held in Denver, Colo. Usually these meetings are held in large cities, according to Robinson. The 1961 meetings, which drew 1,100 delegates, was in New York City.

Robinson, who is a member of the AETA executive committee on appointments and research, estimates that more than 700 delegates will be on the Eugene campus for the combined conferences.

Dr. Marjorie Dyck of New York City will preside at the 1962 session of AETA. She is president-elect of the group. The program will be arranged by Dr. Arnold Gillette of the State University of Iowa.

OTI Gets 898 Pupils

Friday's enrollment at Oregon Technical Institute at Klamath Falls, with one week left for late registration, was 898. This figure shows a 25 per cent increase in freshman students over 1960 and an almost 28 per cent increase in new students. There is also an 18 per cent increase in women students, according to Dr. W. D. Purvine, director of the institute. Students are enrolled from all but one of Oregon's 36 counties. There are also students from 21 states and five foreign countries. Foreign students are registered from Argentina, Chile, Hong Kong, Ghana and Thailand.

"Oregon Tech found it necessary to open an additional building wing for a residence hall for women," George Crowe, manager of Auxiliary Enterprises, stated.

Basin Area Men Pledge

Twenty-one fraternities on the University of Oregon campus concluded the fall term rush period by pledging 443 men.

The majority of the pledges are freshmen and will live in university dormitories during their first year on the campus. Upperclassmen will move into the houses of their choice.

Largest pledge class was named by Tau Kappa Epsilon with 45 pledges. Other pledges included Sigma Phi Epsilon and Sigma Chi.

Tahoe Bridge Not Wanted

LAKE TAHOE (UPI) — Lake Tahoe vacationers don't want a bridge crossing scenic Emerald Bay, but lake-side residents prefer the bridge to beauty.

That was the summary of evidence presented Friday at a state Division of Highways hearing here. The division must decide whether to build a \$6.3 million highway high around the bay or a \$6.5 million low-level highway that would bridge the bay.

Division hearing officer A.L. Legarra said that of about 150 letters received, mostly from persons who live away from the lake, about 86 per cent favored the high level road.

But the El Dorado County board of supervisors, county planning and road commissioners, the South Lake Tahoe Chamber of Commerce and others from the area testified that they would prefer the less expensive, less scenic route.

The estimated costs would go to \$18 million for the high level road and \$11.2 million for the low level if they were built with four lanes instead of two.

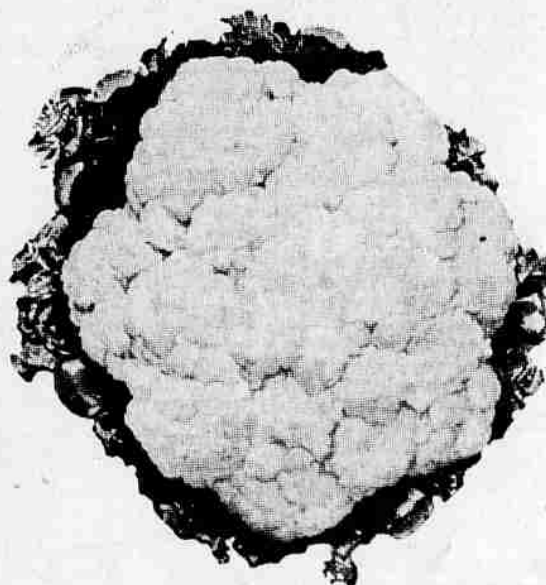

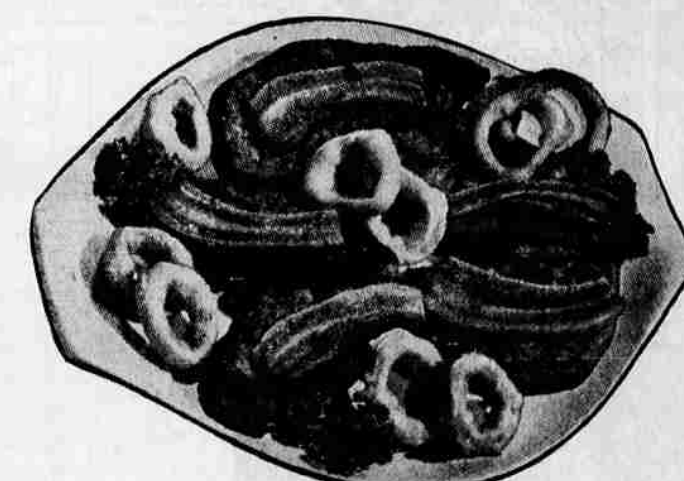

West Bears Some Fault In Crisis

LONDON (AP)—U.S. Sen. J. W. Fulbright told a news conference Saturday night the West is not entirely blameless for development of the Berlin crisis.

The Soviet Union is not the only culprit, the Arkansas Democrat said.

"We bear heavy responsibilities for the stupidities of this situation, which is to my shame, as it is to anyone in the West," he said. "Certainly it was not just the fault of the Russians," he added. "The Americans contributed much to this. I do not know how much the British and others contributed. I do not want to be self-righteous about it."

Sen. Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, was here as an observer at the British Commonwealth Parliamentary Conference, which discussed the projected entry of the United Kingdom into the European Common Market. He was showered with many questions as to the American attitude toward the Berlin crisis and the related problem of the economic future of Western Europe.

Fulbright said it is urgent, in weighing the Berlin crisis, to determine what the Soviets mean by such terms as "free city" and "free access." He said he believes the matter of such definitions is now being considered by U.S. Secretary of State Rusk and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko in their talks in New York.

The Soviets, he added, are with good reason concerned about the possibility that atomic weapons might be given to West Germany. Asked whether atomic weapons should be given to West Germany in any circumstances, the senator said the question does not arise now. Such weapons should be withheld from West Germany if there is a reasonable prospect of progress in reaching some kind of an acceptable agreement with the Russians, he said.

New Space Fuel Needed

MONTEREY (UPI) — Members of the California State Bar Friday heard a congressional space expert say that the U.S. cannot hope to overtake Russia in space achievements by relying solely on chemically-fueled propulsion.

Rep. Cluet Hollifield, D-Los Angeles, speaking at the final session of the week-long assembly, told the lawyers that America's only hope was nuclear propulsion. "If we are to overtake the Soviets and engage in really serious long-range space exploration," he said, "then we must proceed with all possible dispatch in developing a nuclear propulsion system for spacecraft."

Hollifield, chairman of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, added that this country is far ahead of the Soviet Union in developing such power.

He said that the atomic-powered "Transit IV" satellite, which was launched last June and still aloft, is the forerunner of America's nuclear-powered space vehicles for interplanetary exploration.

"The complete silence from the other side of the Iron Curtain on nuclear applications in space may be a grim warning that the Russians are very hard at work in this field. Unless we keep pushing ahead with our own work, we may be forced to accept a secure but sorry second place," Hollifield warned.

He said he and other members of his committee were pleased that President Kennedy resumed nuclear tests. He said in his opinion underground testing would serve all purposes for the present, but atmospheric tests should be conducted if necessary.

Hollifield said he will attend the U.S. tests in Nevada this week. He noted that they will include tests of nuclear-propelled rocket engines.

San Francisco attorney Theodore R. Meyer was installed as president of the association at Friday's session, succeeding James C. Sheppard of Los Angeles.

Jail Suspended

BERKELEY (UPI) — Six pacifists were given suspended sentences in Municipal Court Friday for blocking a public passageway. The six, who protested nuclear tests by barring the doorway to the Atomic Energy Commission office here, were Michael O'Quinn, 22; Jerry M. Wheeler, 27; Dean W. Plagowski, 26; Bruce McIntyre, 21; Byron Wall, 36, and Karin Deohl, 19.

In U.S. history, only one man (Warren G. Harding of Ohio) has been elected to the presidency while serving in the Senate.
