

Yanks Have Edge In Power, Defense; Reds Boast Best Pitching Staff, Good Balance

NEW YORK (UPI) — Crisp, alert defense is likely to be a distinct New York Yankee advantage in the World Series but the Cincinnati Reds may have a clear even decisive edge in pitching.

Manager Ralph Houk says he likes Yankee pitching but he seems to be just about the only expert who does. Their American League rivals regarded pitching as the Yankees' weakness and National League observers are virtually unanimous in that belief.

On the other hand, the experts agree that the Reds have a strong World Series staff — three solid starters, several middle relief men and two finishers, one a right-hander and one a left-hander.

But first, defense. Top-notch defense has always been a trademark of the Yankees and this year's team is no exception. The infield of Bill Skowron, Bobby Richardson, Tony Kubek and Cleve Boyer is the best in baseball and far superior to the Reds' regular foursome of Gordon Coleman, Don Blasingame, Eddie Kasko and Gene Freese.

Rightfielders Weak
There's nothing wrong with Red outfielders Frank Robinson and Vada Pinson but Wally Post, Jerry Lynch and Gus Bell, the alternating rightfielders, are all weak defensively. The Yankee outfield is outstanding from right to left even if it is difficult to get used to the idea that Yogi Berra is an outfielder.

Elston Howard emerged as the best catcher in baseball this year and has a clear edge over Cincinnati's Darrell Johnson, Jerry Zimmerman and John Edwards. And the Yankees actually have three catchers because they can call on young Johnny Blanchard or Berra to supplement Howard.

There is no "hidden" factor which figures to affect standard performance. The only tough field in either park is Yankee Stadium's left field, with its odd shadows, but Robinson should have no difficulty with it. Thus, the fielding values of the season should be consistent with World Series performance — in which case the Yankees will have — a distinct edge.

Favor Red Pitching
Pitching is the most important of all factors in — a short series, however, and it is in that department that observers in both leagues incline toward the Reds. The Reds don't have a single pitcher on their staff who has thrown a pitch in World Series competition.

The reason behind this thinking is that Luis Arroyo, the pudgy little end-game reliever, has played such a major role in the won-lost records of Yankee pitchers. Whitey Ford's 25-4 mark, for example, can be explained by the fact that Arroyo "saved" him 14 times. In all, Arroyo appeared in 61 games — a Yankee record — and had a 15-5 record.

Behind Ford, who'll start the first game, come Ralph Terry (16-3) and Bill Stafford (13-9). Both are right-handers far more highly-regarded by the Yankee high command than by their rivals. Second-liners available for middle-inning relief include Jim Coates (11-5 and highly rated) and Bud Daley (12-17) and rookie Roland Sheldon (11-5).

O'Toole Top Pitcher
The Reds' No. 1 pitcher, according to Yankee scouts and other pre-series experts, is Jim O'Toole, 200-pound hard-throwing southpaw who had a 19-9 record this year. He'll start the first game followed by Joey Jay (21-10), a right-hander, and Bob Purkey (16-12), dealer in knucklers and sliders.

"O'Toole is an aggressive, strong pitcher," the Yankee scouting report reads. "He's tough and can work often."

The Reds have two star finishers — right-hander Jim Brosnan (10-3) and Lefty Bill Henry (2-1) and their middle-inning relievers are Ken Hunt (9-10), Jim Maloney (6-7) and Ken Johnson (6-2).

"A team that has a right and left-handed relief pitcher is a tough team to beat," says the Yankee scouting report. "These fellows Brosnan and Henry are specialists in certain types of pitches and they are brought in by Fred Hutchinson without hesitation when the situation demands."

Out-Hit Yankees
The Reds, who aren't exactly a collection of powder puffers themselves, actually out-hit the Yankees for average during most of the season.

In Frank Robinson and Vada Pinson they have two men who may not be able to slug the ball on equal terms with Maris and Mantle, but certainly are capable of hitting with more consistency. Robinson, who has hit 37 homers this year, and Pinson, with 17, also are capable of delivering the long ball in the clutch. On given days, the two Cincinnati outfielders can be of greater value to a ball club than Maris and Mantle.

Berra undoubtedly will be in left field for the Yankees for most of the Series. He is coming off one of the best seasons in his career but the Reds are amply fortified at their third outfield spot whether Wally Post or Gus Bell plays it.

Infield About Equal
Whatever hitting advantage there is among the infielders on both clubs is small, although the Yanks may have the edge.

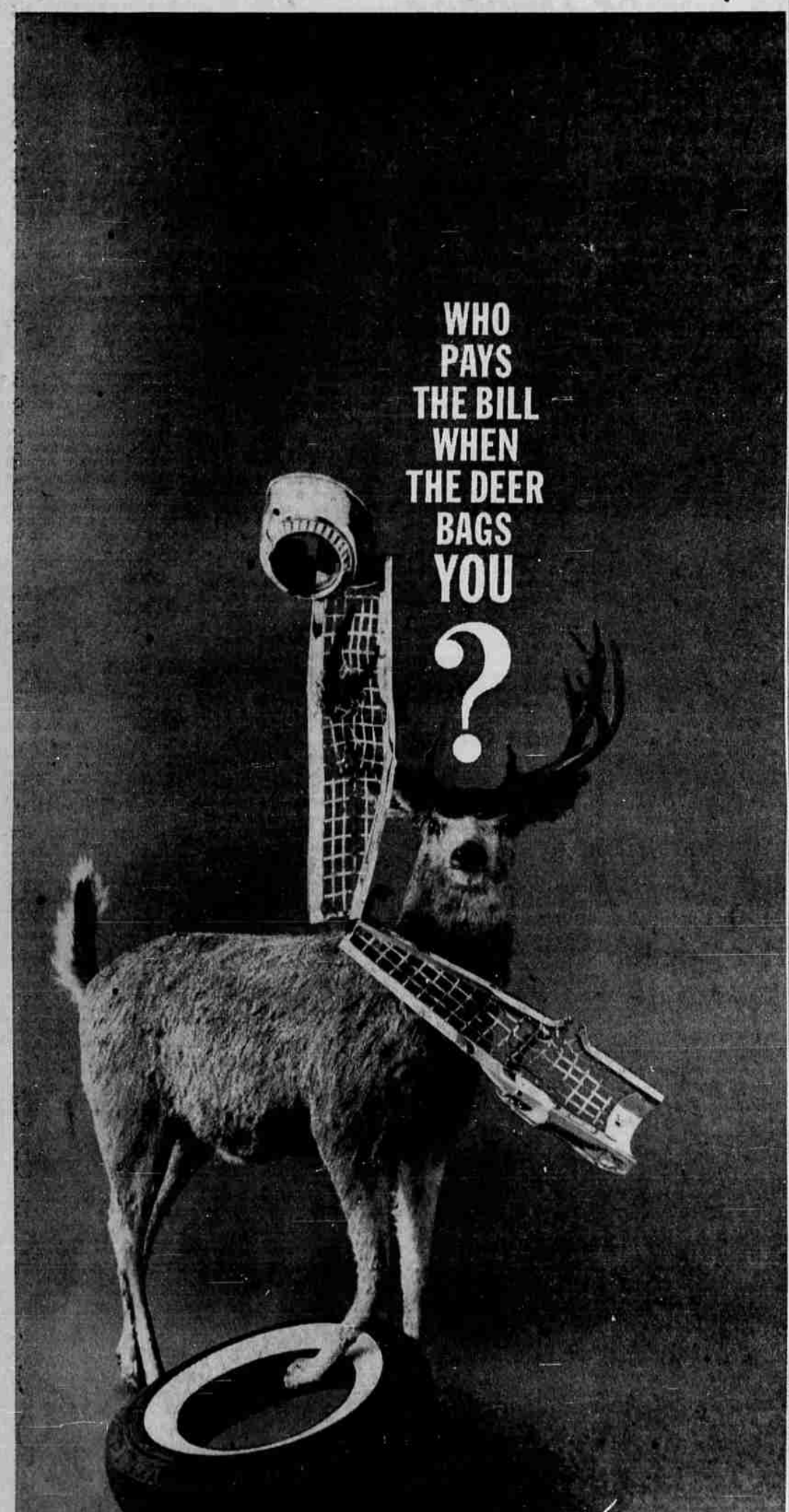
Cincinnati's two power hitters in the infield are third baseman Gene Freese and first baseman Gordy Coleman; the Yanks' big bat in the infield is Skowron.

There is no comparison among the catchers as far as hitting is concerned. The Yankees' three receivers — Howard, Blanchard

DUNSMUIR — After overcoming a half-time lead of 13 points, Dunsmuir bowed to Anderson in the final quarter of the game here Saturday. Richard Lindsey, Anderson's 160-pound halfback, pounded over from the 12-yard line and ran the extra point. This boosted the final score to 20-13.

A pass interception by Anderson followed by a 54-yard pass from Lindsey to Jack Underwood gave the Cubs their first score. Lindsey ran the extra point.

A 20-yard run by Lindsey accounted for the Cubs second touchdown but the extra point failed and the half ended with 13-0.

Dunsmuir's Tigers showed renewed spirit in the third quarter and after a series of first downs, Beamer Hisey threw a screen pass to Eddie Fischer who scampered 25 yards for Dunsmuir's first score. Paul Burton on a reverse ran 30 yards for the second TD.

Anderson's total gain was 310 yards, 255 from rushing and 55 by passing. Dunsmuir gained 298 yards, 171 on the ground and 122 in the air.

Clemente Will Seek Increase

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Roberto Clemente, winner of the 1961 National League batting title, says he expects a salary hike next season from the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Clemente, flashy Puerto Rican outfielder who has one of the best throwing arms in baseball, says he's entitled to a salary boost not for winning the batting crown but "as an all-around ball player."

Clemente won the championship with a .351 average and succeeded teammate Dick Groat as batting kingpin. It was the first time the Pirates have had back-to-back batting champions since 1935 and 1936 when Arky Vaughan and Paul Waner won titles.

Stengel, Others Picking Players For New NL Team

NEW YORK (AP) — Casey Stengel, his two new coaches, scouts and other officials of the New York Mets got down to serious business today, working on the list of players from which they must pick their 1962 National League team. It was all strictly confidential.

The lists were made available to George Weiss, club president, Monday by Warren Giles, the National League president. Each club had to list 15 available men, seven of whom were on the list Aug. 31 and thus came under the regular 25-player limit, and eight of whom were out on option or under control.

Giles refused to disclose any details of the lists, except to say that the seven Cincinnati men who were on the list of World Series eligibles, would not be made known to New York and Houston, the other new NL club, until after the series. The so-called "premium" player lists also will be made available at that time.
