Deer Hunt Violators
Hauled Before Court

Eighteen hunters were charged with game violations late Tuesday in complaints filed by the district attorney's office. All of the charges were filed as a result of alleged violations last weekend, the opening weekend of deer season. Accused hunters are scheduled to appear this week in district court. Most common hunting violation is failure to properly tag deer, according to state police and game commission officers. This was the charge in 15 of the 18 cases filed. Police said some hunters are altering their deer tags in attempts to shoot more than one animal. Hunters must tear out the month and day when they make a kill and affix the tag to the dead animal. Two cases of illegal possession of deer meat have been filed. These are both against withdrawing members of the Klamath Indian Tribe who were caught hunting without deer tags. Game officers have cautioned ex-tribal members that they must comply with hunting laws. One case filed involved a man charged with transferring a deer tag. Officers said he tried to use his daughter's tag. One complaint was filed against an alien who was found shooting without an alien gun permit. District Judge Hal F. Coe said fines for deer tag violations would run from \$25 up to \$300, depending upon circumstances. He said fines would average about \$50.

Fraud Trial
In 4th Week

PORTLAND (AP) — The trial of 10 persons charged with using the mails to defraud continued into its fourth week today and the government said its case may take two or three weeks more. Lewis Carl Swertfeger took the stand for the prosecution Tuesday, and described a car crash on Oct. 16, 1958, which he said was staged. Swertfeger said he deliberately drove his vehicle into the rear of another at a Portland intersection on that date. He said George James Barnard, one of the defendants, showed him which car to hit and what to do after the collision. The 10 defendants are charged with faking car accidents, collecting insurance claims by use of the mails, and conspiracy to defraud.

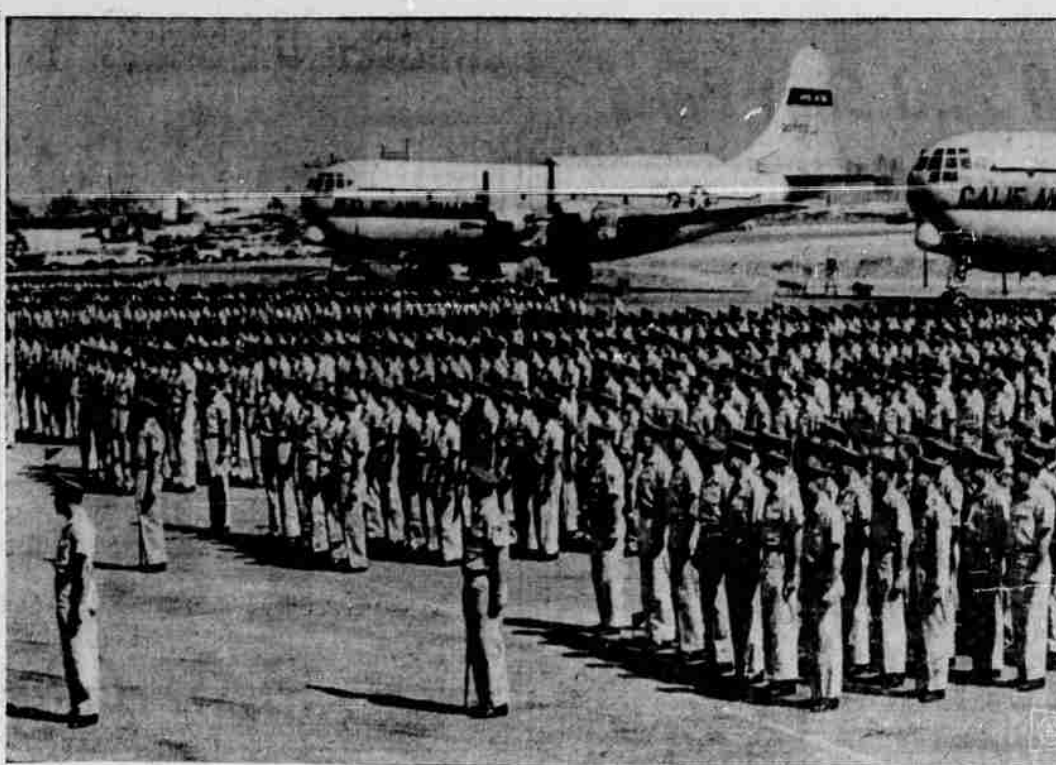
Fall Breaks Hip

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San Quentin
Fight Kills
One Inmate

SAN QUENTIN (UPI) — One prisoner was killed and four others injured Tuesday when fighting broke out among a score of inmates in the recreation yard of San Quentin Prison. Association Warden Dale Frady identified the dead man as Richard M. Rios, 33, of Orange County. He suffered a skull fracture and two stab wounds in the back. Frady said the outburst had its origin in the food line Monday when six inmates, including Rios, got in a fight. Guards quickly broke up the quarrel and isolated all the men but Rios, center of the argument. The five gathered pipes and shovels early Tuesday and, with a few friends, attacked Rios. Guards broke up the battle in about two minutes, but Rios was fatally injured and only the injured men were caught. It was not known if any of the men involved was serving a life term. Lifers convicted of assault, regardless of whether or not death results, are automatically sent to the gas chamber. Prison officials said that as a result of Rios' death, the matter has been turned over to the Marin County district attorney's office for investigation of murder. Shortly after the disturbance, officials reported that a man serving time for robbery and escape was missing at the routine afternoon count. However, the inmate, Charles Clifford Sharp, 25, was found eight hours later in the ventilator of the prison furniture shop. Frady said Sharp apparently planned to sustain himself on candy bars until an opportunity for complete escape presented itself.
