

Junior Footballers Tangle Saturday Night In Jamboree

Pocket-sized editions of future gridiron greats take the field Saturday night at Modoc Field to exhibit their football lore to assembled fans, beginning with the opening kickoff at 7 p.m.

In all, seven short games will be played with two different teams tangling about every 15 minutes.

The jamboree is an annual feature and includes teams from all the grade schools of the city plus Altamont's seventh grade and Altamont and Fremont junior high schools.

All money derived from the jamboree will go to individual schools to assist their athletic programs.

The schedule calls for Conger-Riverside "A" team to open the game against Fairview at 7 p.m. Second game at 7:15 will pit Conger-Riverside "B" team against Fairview.

At 7:30 the Pelican-Roosevelt "A" club meets Sacred Heart Academy's grade school club, and at 7:45 it's the Mills "B" team against Pelican - Roosevelt "B" team.

Mills "A" team takes on Altamont II at 8 p.m. with Altamont I tangling with the Fremont "Midgets" at 8:15 and Altamont Junior High meeting Fremont Junior High in the games finale beginning at 8:30 p.m.

Fans have been delighted in past years by the antics of these coming football stars, and have been treated to some surprisingly sound and hard fought football.

Tickets for the Saturday Jamboree are now being sold by all schools and will be available at the gate at Modoc Field Saturday night.

Sept. 24 ended the first portion of the archery deer hunting season. Dr. Earl Nash bagged a deer on Sept. 23 with his 60-pound bow at about 60 yards. The second annual archery league is being formed by the Klamath Archers. Don Stonehill and Roy Daley are league secretaries. Last year's league was such a success that it has been made an annual affair and what a wonderful chance for non-active archers to get back into the swing of things.

Plans now in the making include 12 teams of three shooters plus one or two alternates for each team. Each team will shoot the other teams once or a total of 11 times.

A handicap for each archer will be honored to give the beginners an equal chance with the more professional shooter.

New this year is a Junior Archery League for boys and girls under the age of 18. Rules and handicaps will apply to the junior shooters the same as the adult teams but will give them a chance to compete for honors in their own age group.

Local businessmen will sponsor this year's teams as last year and are invited to actively participate in the league if they wish. The league will open officially Dec. 4 and will run into March, 1962, when the top two teams will shoot for the championship trophy.

Nov. 1 is the date set for the first practice night at Ferguson School gym on Homedale Road. A potluck business meeting will be held at 6:30 and final league plans will be made at that time. Navy Tackles Hurricanes In Leading Battle Today

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS — Navy's football team knows it is in for a tough night when it takes on Miami's Hurricanes in the Orange Bowl tonight. But far be it from the hosts to underestimate their opponents.

There is a mutual respect on both sides, Navy because of the passing and running of quarterback George Mira and the pass catching of end Bill Miller, and Miami because of Navy's all-around good condition, hustle and offensive potential.

Mira, whose action may be limited by rib bruises suffered in the victory over Kentucky two weeks ago, ranks fourth nationally in total offense with 394 yards, 305 of those through passing. Miller has caught 12 for 172 yards and is a pillar on defense.

Navy, loser in its opener 20-10 to Penn State which Miami leveled 25-8 last week, showed good offensive power in beating William & Mary 44-6, with junior quarterback Ron Klemick leading the way.

Penn State tries to regain its touch at Boston against winless (0-2) Boston University while Tulane, which has given only a pair of field goals and touchdowns in two losing games, meets Florida, which has a victory and a tie.

There is full-scale action Saturday, with all the top teams except 10th ranked Baylor in action, plus a bevy of conference games.

Iowa, ranked first in the current Associated Press poll, journeys to Los Angeles to meet the University of Southern California, in a game that will also be televised nationally (ABC-TV, 4 p.m. Eastern Standard Time). The Hawkeyes, who walloped California last week, will be without halfback Larry Ferguson against the Trojans (1-1).

There are some other inter-sectional games involving members of the top ten. Fifth ranked Texas (2-0) plays pass-minded Washington State; Michigan State (No. 6) takes on surprising Stanford (2-0); UCLA travels to meet eighth-ranked Ohio State and Michigan, ranked ninth, is at home to Army (2-0).

Second-ranked Mississippi tackles a tough little customer in Florida State as it goes for its 18th straight game without a loss. Georgia Tech (No. 3) the surprise so far of the 1961 season, has an SEC game against defense-minded Louisiana State while fourth rated Alabama (2-0) has an SEC battle against Vanderbilt, also (2-0). Both are at night.

The other top ten team, seventh-ranked Syracuse, has its most serious test of the year at Maryland.

The Ivy League has a full slate of four games while Virginia Tech and Virginia Military, both (1-0) in the Southern Conference meet. There are three games in the Atlantic Coast Conference and a pair in the Big Ten. The Kansas-Colorado tilt is the top attraction in the Big Eight.

Texas Christian plays Arkansas at night in the first big Southwest Conference action while Utah State and Wyoming play for the lead in the Skyline.

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Huskies Fumbles Ruinous

SEATTLE (AP) — Hoping he has eliminated the play that has been the team's ground-losing special this season—the fumble—Coach Jim Owens said Friday his Washington Huskies were ready for their Saturday football test against the Panthers of Pittsburgh.

A sellout crowd of 55,000—sixth in a row for the University of Washington stadium—is in prospect. Even a possibility of rain is not expected to leave any seats unsold.

But a rain-slickened ball could defeat the Washington determination to banish the fumble. In two games the Huskies have lost the ball six times on fumbles. At least three were costly.

One set up a Purdue touchdown and led to a 13-6 Washington defeat. Two stopped Washington scoring threats last week against Illinois.

Rain or no, both teams can be expected to rely on ground thrusts and use the pass sparingly. Pittsburgh will have a small weight advantage for the infighting in the line, with a forward wall that averages four pounds per man more than Washington's.

Up front, the Huskies are back at full strength with the return of guard Dave Phillips. A hand injury kept him out of the Illinois contest, which Washington won 20-7.

Pitt, victor over Miami and loser to Baylor in close games, is a slight favorite to give the East another decision over the Far West. Syracuse whipped Oregon State two weeks ago.

Pelicans Favored Over Cavemen

The KUHS Pelicans find themselves a slight favorite over the Grants Pass Cavemen in their Friday night encounter for the first time in the past decade.

This comes about because the Pelicans have captured three of their four games to date while the Cavemen engineered their first victory only last week.

However, observers of the perennially tough Cavemen have indicated that the club has just begun to jell and will have a few surprises in store for the high-flying Whitebirds when they play host to them in a vital league game.

Coach Bob Williams has indicated that the Pelicans will be at full strength for the clash and will probably start Kent Franklin and Dana Ash at ends, Ron Hitchcock and Rick Currin, tackles;
