

# Blanchard, Maris Bomb Cincy 3-2 In Third Tilt

## Arroyo Winner; Mantle Failure

CINCINNATI (AP)—Roger Maris, hitless in 10 official trips to the plate in the World Series, blasted a home run into the right field bleachers to lead off the ninth inning of the third game with the Cincinnati Reds and give the New York Yankees a 3-2 victory and a 2-1 game advantage in the annual fall classic Saturday.

It was a see-saw game, with first the Reds leading, and then the Yankees battling back to tie the count at 1-1 in the seventh inning, and 2-2 in the eighth. John Blanchard hit a Yankee homer in the eighth to knot the score.

Bob Purkey held the Yankees to one hit, a double by Elston Howard, for six innings, as the Reds took a 1-0 lead on Elio Chacon's single and a double by Frank Robinson in the bottom of the third.

Tony Kubek's single, a passed ball and Yogi Berra's bloop single to short right scored the first New York run in the seventh. But the Reds scrambled back to take a 2-1 advantage in the game played before 32,589 fans in Crosley Field in near 80-degree weather.

Catcher John Edwards, who was charged with the passed ball on a pitch by Bob Purkey to put Kubek in scoring position, doubled with one out in the last of the seventh. Eddie Kasko's single put Cincinnati ahead 2-1.

Blanchard pinch hit for pitcher Bud Daley in the eighth, and tied the score again, setting the stage for Maris' blast in the ninth.

The fourth game will be played here Sunday, and the fifth on Monday.

Luis Arroyo, who pitched the last two innings for New York and gave up one hit, was the winning pitcher. Purkey went all the way for the Reds.

## Cal Bears Outplay Favored Missouri

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS California's Golden Bears outplayed the favored Missouri Tigers Saturday to earn a 14-14 tie but two other Pacific Coast schools dropped decisions to nationally ranked Big 10 opponents.

Stanford lost its first game of the year to sixth-ranked Michigan State, 31-3, while UCLA put up a game battle before falling 13-3 to Ohio State, ranked No. 8.

Pine passing by Randy Gold, California's ace quarterback sidelined until Saturday because of a knee injury, kept Missouri off balance much of the way after the Tigers had driven 98 yards in the first quarter for a 6-point lead.

Gold completed four passes in a 78-yard drive that ended with halfback Jerry Scattini scoring from the one-yard line in the second quarter. Place-kick specialist Jim Ferguson kicked the first of his two conversions and the Bears were not to be beaten.

**Stanford Dropped**

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Michigan State, banking on a gambling offense to sustain two long touchdown drives, overcame its fumbling mistakes Saturday for a 31-3 intercollegiate football victory over Stanford.

The Spartans, ranked sixth in the nation, kept on the ground almost throughout this brilliantly sunny and warm afternoon and smashed out drives of 77 and 80 yards before striking for two lightning fourth quarter touchdowns.

**Bucks Beat UCLA**

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Ohio State turned loose a pair of sophomore halfbacks for fourth-quarter touchdowns Saturday to defeat the firing hot tenacious Bruins of UCLA 13-3 in an intercollegiate football game before a shirt-sleeved crowd of 82,992.

The highly favored Bucks, after trying some fruitless fancy frills for the first three quarters, were forced back to their "grind-it-out" type of play to snatch their first victory of the season.

Stung by criticism of the drab offense in last week's 7-7 tie with Texas Christian, Ohio State tried numerous Buckeye innovations to no avail in the early going.

The Bruins, sparked by tailback Bob Smith, one of the handiest players ever seen here, went ahead in the second period on Smith's 32-yard field goal.

The Bucks moved out front with less than a minute of the fourth quarter gone as sophomore Paul Warfield climaxed a 65-yard, seven-play assault with a 13-yard scoring dash over tackle. Three minutes later, Matt Snell of Locust Valley, N.Y., went over the same spot for 33 yards and the final counter.

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# Cavemen Put Dimmer On Pelicans; Ash Injured In Bruising Battle

GRANTS PASS—Fighting right down to the final horn, the Klamath Falls Pelicans had their Southern Oregon Conference and District 6-A-1 title hopes dampened Friday night by a 13-7 setback at Grants Pass.

Injuries that sidelined two key players hurt the Whitebirds cause as end Dana Ash was taken to the Josephine County Hospital with a dislocated shoulder and Ken Lewis was sidelined with an injured knee. Ash was reported in good condition Saturday morning after reduction of the left shoulder dislocation.

The two teams battled through a scoreless first quarter with a

stubborn Pelican defense refusing to let the Cavemen scoring machine reach pay dirt on two successive drives. But a Klamath fumble recovered by the Cavemen's Gary Schmidt on the Pel 25 paved the way for the first touchdown of the game with Bob Lewellyn turning a stymied pass play into a 21-yard scoring play by dodging and squirreling through to the right, finally being downed as he hit the righthand corner of the end zone. The attempted PAT kick went wide, leaving the scoreboard read Grants Pass 6, Klamath Falls 0, with nearly five and half minutes left in the first half.

The third quarter had both teams taking turns with the ball until Doug Puckett recovered a Caveman fumble on the Pelican 35 with the Pels marching downfield 65 yards to pay dirt in nine plays and a Caveman penalty with Larry McClure picking up most of the yardage. McClure scored on an eight-yard plunge.

John Ruger crossed the Cavemen up by making elaborate preparations for a place-kick for the extra point and then took a direct pass from center to dash around left end for the PAT that put the visiting Whitebirds out in front 7 to 6 with a minute and 48 seconds to go in the third quarter.

Sparked by the kickoff return by sophomore Gary Van Koten who took the ball on the 10 and returned it to the 37, the Cavemen took seven plays to march the 63 yards to collect the winning touchdown with fullback Eddie Hall romping the final 24 as he slanted to his left to reach the end zone standing up. Johnnie Summers kick split the uprights for the 13-7 score with nearly 11 minutes left in the game.

The two teams were forced to punt twice apiece during the remaining moments of the game with the Pels gaining possession with 25 seconds to go. And the spirited Whitebirds who had foiled Cavemen efforts to run out the clock by calling time outs, kept their hopes alive for a possible tie right down to the dying seconds as Ken Hunsaker held the ball despite an eight-yard loss

when no receiver got into position, then with time for one last play. Hunsaker got off a 40-yard aerial that could have gone all the way to a Pelican score except for Dan McIntire's leap high in the air to snag the ball at midfield after the final horn had sounded to end the ball game.

For the Pels, Larry McClure, Dave Stippich, Ken Hunsaker, Ken Lewis and Doug Puckett were the shining lights.

For the Cavemen, sophomore halfback Terry Isabell carted the

mail 29 times for a total of 148 yards while Eddie Hull, senior fullback, had 21 carries for 96 net yards. Bob Lewellyn picked up 60 net yards in eight tries. Gary Schmidt led the linemen for the Cavemen with nine clean tackles and three assists in addition to recovering a fumble.

The Pels tried a total of 12 forward passes, completing one for 12 yards and had the final one intercepted. In net yardage, the Cavemen ground out a total of 305 to 126 for Klamath. The cavemen tried only one pass which was incomplete.

The Mustangs scored at will, racking up 14 points in the first period and 21 in the second for a 35-0 halftime lead. Malin added 12 points in the third and seven in the fourth to complete the rout.

Leading the Mustang touchdown parade were Steyskal with three, Rick and Dick Johnson, two each and Holt. In addition, Johnson had two conversions, and Clark, Halousek, Cox and Rick one each.

The Mustangs have an open date this weekend, and will tangle with Merrill next.

Leading the Honker attack was Ron Kreizenbeck, sophomore halfback. He scored the game's lone touchdown when he sliced off tackle for five yards in the first quarter. Troy Wooten ran through center for the PAT.

Kreizenbeck racked up 71 yards of the total of 132 the Honkers gained on the ground. He averaged 6.4 yards for the 11 times he lugged the ball.

The Honker score came after a sustained drive from the Panther 40-yard line.

Both teams had touchdowns nullified by penalties. A Tulelake TD was called back following an offside, and Chiloquin lost a TD on a 45-yard run around end on a clipping penalty.

Statistically, Chiloquin dominated the play, piling up 13 first downs to five for the Honkers. The Honker defense was impenetrable once they had their backs to the goal posts. Fumbles hurt the Panther offense and Tulelake recovered four.

Leonard Daughenbaugh, Honker senior, was the defensive workhorse of the battle. Playing defensive tackle, and offensive end, Daughenbaugh made 16 tackles individually, and piled up 10 assists. He caught the only completed Honker pass, good for a six-yard gain.

The Honkers, with a season record of two wins and one loss, travel to Alturas Friday afternoon.

ALHAMBRA, Calif. (AP)—Opening of the high school football season Friday night triggered a teenage riot which embroiled police and between 500 and 1,000 adolescents early Saturday.

When the battling was finally finished, police from every department in the area had rounded up 88 boys—54 of them under 18 years of age. Those over 18 were booked for failing to disperse and the younger rioters were turned over to their parents.

Nobody was hurt seriously.

Police said the trouble stemmed from football rivalries when restive students from Alhambra and Monrovia high schools gathered in a five-block area. It spread when police stepped in.

The fighting started at a drive-in restaurant and, like a lit chain of firecrackers, spread to other restaurants.

Alhambra police quickly broadcast for help to nine neighboring law agencies.

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
