

# Alert Hornet Defense Brings 13-7 Victory Over Lakeview Honkers

An alert gang of Henley Hornets swarmed all over loose footballs Friday night to earn a 13-7 victory over the visiting Lakeview Honkers.

A blocked punt and a recovered fumble led to the two Hornet touchdowns in the evenly played contest under the new Henley lights on a cool, crisp autumn night. It was the first time the two traditional rivals have met in a Rogue League football game as the Honkers joined the league this year.

Henley took an early 6-0 lead but Lakeview came back to score and held a 7-6 halftime edge. The Hornets scored early in the third quarter and hung on to win. All three touchdowns resulted from breaks.

Dave Trapp, the Hornets' speedy halfback, brought the crowd to its feet when he bobbed the opening kickoff, scooped it up and took off down the right sideline on an apparent 90-yard

Albritton went back to pass but Honker guard Don Farris knocked the ball loose and fell on it at the Henley 45-yard line. Unable to move, Mobley punted to Charley Phillips, who fumbled. Honker center Jim Morton recovered on the Hornet 29.

Lakeview moved the 29 yards to score in seven plays with Mobley carrying the final three yards up the middle behind strong blocking. Tailback Chuck Cossey, a workhorse all night in the Honker single wing, ran the point and Lakeview had a 7-6 lead at halftime.

The Hornets threatened once more in the first half but the threat ended with a pass interception by Honker Fred Williams. Shortly after the second half began, Mobley fumbled and Charley Thompson, a standout Hornet tackle, recovered on the Lakeview 47. Mixing his plays nicely, Albritton relied on halfback Steve Reiling on the ground and took to the air on the seventh play of the drive with a pass to end Mike Tacchini for 13 yards and a TD. Tacchini smashed through two would-be tacklers for the six-point. Albritton connected with Tacchini for the point.

Lakeview wouldn't quit but the Hornets kept them bottled up in their own territory. Crucial penalties and a 30-yard quick kick by Henley fullback John Crumrine helped keep the Honkers in the hole. The Honkers could get no closer than the Henley 20.

The statistics were fairly even although Henley showed a more diversified offense. Lakeview netted 137 yards, all on the ground, while Henley netted 148, with 53 on the ground and 95 in the air. Albritton and Reiling hit on seven of 14 passes for the Hornets while Cossey and Williams were unsuccessful in nine attempts. Cossey led Honker ground gainers with 84 yards in 19 trips. The versatile Reiling, had 42 yards on the ground, 26 through the air and

added 23 yards on three laterals after pass plays. Henley coach Len Weber said he was "not too pleased." He said his team has "much work to do" before it will be ready for the St. Mary's Crusaders next weekend. He praised Albritton and Reiling and liked the line play of Thompson and end Mike Beyer.

Lakeview mentor Howard Hopper said it was a close game and figured, "with a few breaks, we could have won." He said Cossey worked hard as did linemen Farris and Vern Platt. Lakeview is now 1-3 on the season while Henley has four wins and a tie.

Both teams were unable to launch a sustained drive in the first quarter. With four minutes left, Honker halfback Bob Mobley dropped back to punt from his own 29-yard line. Hornet lineman C. Thompson broke through to block the kick and teammate Bob Elliott, a 210-pound guard, grabbed the ball on the Lakeview 20 and steamrolled into the end zone. An attempted run for the point failed and the Hornets led 6-0.

## KU Runners Cop Second

Spurred by the efforts of a state champion miler, the Klamath Falls cross country to a second place finish in a triple-team meet at Grants Pass. Krimigan of Roseburg was the winner over a field of 30 runners from Klamath Falls, Frants Pass, and Roseburg. The Roseburg sophomore miler finished with a time of 8:01 over the mile and eight-tenths course.

The Grants Pass Harriers ran off with meet honors, however, capturing second, third, fourth, fifth, seventh and ninth places for the low meet total of 21 points.

Three Klamath Union tracksters placed in the first 10 finishers as the Pelicans picked up a total of 47 points and third place. Roseburg was third with the high meet total of 32.

Individual high performances for Klamath Falls were turned in by Steve Lawrence, sixth place, Paul Sandoval, eighth place, and Bill Sweetland, 10th place. KU runners Dan Michaels and Craig Lea took 11th and 12th places respectively in a tight finish.

Next Friday, the Pelican cross country runners will take on a strong Medford High School aggregation in a dual meet at the Klamath Falls course in Moore Park. The race will be run over a two-mile course, starting at 4:30 p.m.

Allen who not only set a school record in the spear-throwing event (his specialty) in his senior year last spring at KU but also recorded one of the best javelin distance marks in the nation while in high school couldn't be happier at the Spartan school.

"It's a tremendous school and campus," pointed out Al, who also said that he was "very impressed" by the friendliness of fellow students.

"I wasn't on campus but a few days when Lloyd Winters, the head track coach, had me out on the field practicing with the javelin," he said. "They are really enthusiastic toward track down there, and should be one of the top teams in the nation next year."

Winters, incidentally, is a real veteran when it comes to coaching track. He was on the coaching staff of the United States Olympic Games teams at both Melbourne and Rome.

"He certainly knows what's what," said Phillips. "He and the other coaches have a weight-lifting program outlined for me, which will certainly help me," noted the wiry ex-Pelican who still weighs the same as he did in high school—155 pounds dripping wet.

Allen said he didn't as yet have any idea about the brand of competition he will run into as a member of the Spart frosh tracksters. "The school javelin record for freshmen down there is 225 feet—but I hope to improve myself enough to beat that by the end of next season."

If determination and dedication in the field of sports are any indicator, Allen Phillips should have no trouble breaking that record.

And the odd part is that the 22-year-old 195-pounder who spent part of the 1961 season with Indianapolis isn't receiving the praise because of the two scoring

a pitcher (Joey Jay) much his senior in experience. In fact, just about the only person connected with either team who seems to take Edwards' performance in stride is Fred Hutchinson, the stone-faced manager of the Reds.

"If a catcher doesn't have enough confidence in himself to do that, then he doesn't catch for me," says Hutchinson. "He's either got it or I got to get somebody else who has."

Real Fine Catcher Hutchinson allowed himself a rare smile and went on: "This kid is going to be a real fine catcher," he said. "That's because he's got good basic talent and he's willing to work at his job."

Edwards, who got his series chance because of a pulled muscle suffered by Darrell Johnson, was acquired by the Reds after they dealt Ed Bailey to the San Francisco Giants. He delivered a run-scoring single and a run-scoring double each time after the Yankees deliberately walked Gene Freese to pitch him—in Thursday's second game at New York.

And now it looks like he'll be doing all or most of the Reds' catching for the rest of the series.

## Chargers Continue Invasion

San Diego makes its second straight trip into the East Saturday to get the American Football shortened schedule on the way.

The Chargers, only unbeaten club in the league, will be after their fifth victory, with Boston the proposed victim.

There are only three games on the schedule this weekend, with New York, secure on top of the Eastern division, and Oakland, in a tie for last in the Western Division, taking a rest.

Dallas journeys to Denver, and Buffalo invades Houston for Sunday afternoon games.

San Diego went into the East last week and ran into a hornet's nest at Buffalo. The Chargers, slowed to a walk by Buffalo's tenacious defense, had to rely on defense and kicking to win 19-11.

Boston may offer about the same problem. The Patriots haven't been winning much more than Buffalo, but they have been giving the opposition plenty of trouble. New York edged Boston 21-20 and 37-30, and the Patriots crushed Denver 45-17 and nosed out Buffalo 23-21.

San Diego leads the Western Division with a 4-0 record, while Dallas is in second place with 2-1. Should Boston upset San Diego, Dallas might draw into a virtual tie with San Diego for the lead.

San Diego has the league's top defense with 252.2 yards allowable per game, but Boston is only a dozen yards over the pace. Boston's Butch Songin is one of the league's top passers and is ahead of even Jack Kemp, the talented Charger thrower.

Houston has to win to retain much hope of repeating with the championship. The Oilers are in third place in the Eastern Division as the result of losses to San Diego and Dallas and could drop two full games behind leading New York by taking another licking.

Houston's defense became quiporous in the game with Dallas last Sunday. The Oilers gave up 528 yards to the Texans while losing 26-21.

Coach Lou Rymkus also is dissatisfied with George Blanda at quarterback. Blanda is one of the League's top passers, but he has had eight of his throws intercepted. He sustained an injury to his right arm.

## Cardinal, Giant Game Leads NFL

The St. Louis Cardinals, known as "the incredible cripples," will have two more players watching from the sidelines Sunday when the Redbirds play the New York Giants in a game that should help to unscramble the five-way tie for first in the National Football League's Eastern Conference.

The game will open the Cardinals' home schedule. The latest injured Cardinals are offensive end Hugh McInnis and a flashy punt return specialist, rookie Pat Fischer.

McInnis injured his left knee, and Fischer suffered a shoulder separation in last weekend's 30-27 upset of the world champion Philadelphia Eagles.

Two other Cardinals, fullback Frank Mestnik and defensive end Joe Robb, may see only limited action. Mestnik has a sprained arch and Robb a sore foot.

The Cardinals and the Giants both have 2-1 records along with the Dallas Cowboys, the Eagles and the Cleveland Browns. Philadelphia is host to the Pittsburgh Steelers (0-3), who likely will play without old-timer Bobby Layne. Cleveland is at home against the Washington Redskins (0-3). Dallas steps over into the Western Conference to meet the Vikings at Minnesota (1-2).

## Medford Crushes Crater; Roseburg Still Unbeaten

The top four high school football teams in the Associated Press Friday rolled to impressive victories.

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Third place North Salem kept pace with the leaders by downing eighth-ranked Corvallis, 26-7 and Roseburg, the number four team, remained undefeated with a 21-6 victory over North Bend, ranked No. 7.

The night's action left the top four with identical 5-0 records. Benson of Portland, rated No. 5 by the pollsters, plays Cleveland Saturday Wilson, which was tied for tenth, will meet Grant, a pre-season favorite before its opening loss to Madison.

## Sports Parade.. 'Ghost' Writers Prevail

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Fearless Fraley's facts and figures from the World Series.

This may seem a far departure from baseball, which hasn't had a scandal in the majors since the Black Sox dump of 1919, but the NCAA is keeping its eyes on a Duke University football player.

Investigators became suspicious as result of the UCLA upset of Duke last year, and there is a feeling that some "business" may have been done. "With billions of dollars being spent each week, believe it or not, on football cards," one college official declared, "we have to think about being particularly watchful."

Jim Murray, writing in the Cincinnati Post, calls the Reds a team of "spooks" because they are winners despite the fact that they don't seem to be able to field, run or hit. But actually, this is a series of "ghosts".

That's what they call a writer who devotes his talents to setting down on paper a story under somebody else's byline. This series has more than its usual share with ghosted articles daily by such as Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris, Whitey Ford and Yogi Berra of the Yankees and Eddie Kasko and Jim Brosnan of the Reds.

Kasko's "ghost" made it clear in one article that the Reds all were perturbed over their reception in New York and the scathing manner in which the Gotham press described them.

"If they run true to form," Kasko-via his ghost—penned in equal acidity, "they wrote that Gordy Coleman's second game homer was a wind-blown pop fly; that a Red player ran out of the dugout and tackled Elston Howard to prevent him tagging out Elio Chacon, and that how could the Yanks expect to win with a National League umpire, Jocko Conlan, behind the plate helping Joey Jay, who was a villain for throwing nasty old breaking pitches when he knows the Yanks feast on fast balls."

Which reminds Old Fearless of the tribulations that Christy Walsh had when he was "ghosted" by a World Series daily article under the immortal Babe Ruth's byline. When the Yanks went to Chicago during one series, Walsh, back in New York, kept wiring Ruth for more detail.

Finally, the Babe hit two home runs in one game and his wire to his ghost—who had to write 500 words of poorly wisdom—consisted of two words: "Hit two."

Walsh in desperation wired right back to Ruth: "Need more detail." Within the hour he had it. Ruth's reply was: "Hit two. Fast balls." ... And, as one current ghost groaned, "If you think that's not a lot, you ought to try working with the guy I'm writing."

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
