GN Retires 2 Employees



Price Floor On Milk Cut

SALEM (AP) — The minimum price that distributors can pay producers for bottle and can milk was lowered for the Corvallis-Eugene-Roseburg area, it was announced today.

Milk Stabilization Administrator Kenneth Sawyer announced the reduced price only the day after announcing that the producer minimum in the Portland-Salem area would remain at \$5.80 per hundred pounds.

Sawyer said the minimum producer price for the bottle and can milk in the Corvallis-Eugene-Roseburg area would be dropped effective Oct. 16 from \$6.09 to \$5.92 per hundred pounds for 4 per cent butterfat content milk.

The minimum price to producers in the Coos Bay area was dropped from \$6.44 to \$6.29 per hundred pounds for 4 per cent milk.

A third order held the producer price in the Grants Pass-Medford area at \$6.23 per hundred pounds. Sawyer said a ruling for the Klamath Falls area would be issued later.

Sawyer expressed hope that the adjustments would tend to halt an increasing trend of lower priced milk in one area to move into another.

The prices were set up under the state milk stabilization act, which permits the state to set a minimum price distributors can pay dairymen for milk.

Sawyer also denied a petition of distributors asking to be allowed to make more deductions.

House Razed By Lightning

BELLINGHAM, Wash. (AP) — Lightning demolished a two-story house here Friday, leaving intact only one room in which the owners escaped injury.

The lightning, occurring during a brief storm shortly after 9:30 a.m., also knocked out radio transmitters and power lines.

Mr. and Mrs. John Smrekar said they were standing in the kitchen when the bolt hit.

"Everything went dark," said Mrs. Smrekar. "I went out on the back porch and there was the roof hanging over the door."

Observers said shingles and broken glass were scattered over nearly half a block. There was no fire.

The lightning knocked out one of the transmitters of Radio Station KPUG and put the State Patrol radio out of commission temporarily.

Housewives across the street from the Smrekar home said articles were knocked from shelves. One woman reported her washer and dryer "lit up like a candle."

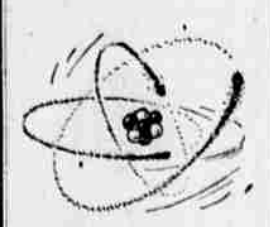
OFFENDED SUSPECTS
