

Yankees Wrap Up World Series With 13-5 Smashing Of Reds

Yanks Grab Early Lead Over Reds

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI)—The New York Yankees won the World Series, four games to one, today when they beat the Cincinnati Reds, 13-5, in the fifth game.

FIRST INNING

YANKEES: Richardson singled. Kubek flied to Pinson. Maris flied to Robinson. Richardson went to second on an error. Blanchard hit a home run, scoring Richardson ahead of him. Howard doubled. Skowron singled. Howard scored. Lopez tripled, scoring Skowron. Boyer doubled, scoring Lopez. Terry struck out.

Five runs, six hits, one error, one left.

REDS:

Terry tossed out Blasingame. Kasko singled. Pinson popped to Boyer. Robinson flied to Lopez.

No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

Reds Claim A-Sub Fleet Operating

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union claimed today it has the world's fastest fleet of nuclear submarines, faster than the swiftest Atlantic liners.

A writer in Izvestia, the government paper, reported all are armed with long-range nuclear rockets.

The paper hinted that Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov was fired as defense minister and from the Presidium of the Communist party on Nov. 2, 1957, for opposing Soviet sailors as "the father of the nuclear fleet which today guards our Soviet state."

The crews of Soviet nuclear submarines already are training for underwater battle with nuclear submarines of other countries, the writer said, in a report on a cruise aboard one of the subs. The only other countries which have nuclear submarines are the United States and Britain.

"In such battles," Izvestia said, "that side will win whose subs have the greater speed, higher maneuverability and better armament. Soviet nuclear submarines are the fastest in the world. Their speed is much greater than that of the fastest liners plying between Europe and America."

Pilot's Body Discovered Still Strapped In Plane

The body of a Medford businessman, who died last month when his light plane crashed into Gearhart Mountain 22 miles northeast of Bly, was found Saturday in the wreckage of the plane by two deer hunters from Grants Pass.

Hunters Bob Rice and Bob Isham found the plane, a cream-colored Piper Comanche, at about 3 a.m. Saturday. It contained the body of Max L. Terzenbach, owner of the Medford Gun Store, who disappeared Sept. 22 on a flight home from Boise, Idaho.

Klamath County Sheriff Murray (Red) Britton and his deputies went to the crash scene, removed the body and conducted an investigation. Sheriff Britton said it was snowing and there was about one inch of snow on the ground when he arrived at the scene. The snow made the search for parts difficult.

Deputy Lou Bogart said in his official report that Terzenbach's plane apparently hit some trees on the side of the 8,364-foot mountain, flipped over and crashed into a large pine tree about 30 feet above the ground. Bogart said the plane's engine and cockpit were folded back over the top of the aircraft and Terzenbach's body was hanging from a safety strap. Parts of the aircraft were scattered from 100 to 150 yards from the point of impact.

Terzenbach's body was taken to O'Hair's Memorial Chapel. Sheriff Britton notified the Federal Aviation Agency at Kingsley Field and the Jackson County Sheriff's Office.

Relatives said Terzenbach had flown to Boise on Sept. 22 and was scheduled to return later the same day.

Survivors include the widow, May; a son, John, a student at Oregon State University, and a daughter, Mrs. Stanley Fern, Medford.

JFK Flies To Dallas To Visit Sam Rayburn

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP)—President Kennedy undertook today a sad, sentimental journey to Texas to comfort ailing Sam Rayburn.

The President switched plans and ordered his Air Force jet to head for Dallas, Tex., instead of back to Washington at the close of a weekend in Newport.

The 79-year-old speaker of the House is gravely ill in a Dallas hospital, combatting incurable cancer.

Distinguished national leaders and politicians have been phoning or dropping in to see him. Kennedy himself has been kept informed constantly of Rayburn's condition. He has been checking for several days to find out whether it would be wise for him to visit the speaker's bedside.

The decision was reached this morning to make the trip. As the man who served longer than any other as speaker, a "Mr. Democrat" to both political friends and foes, Rayburn was a powerful ally of the President in Congress. He left Washington a sad, sentimental journey to Texas to comfort ailing Sam Rayburn.

Rayburn has not been told by his doctors that cancer is striking down his long lustrous career in politics.

Court Rules Red Signup

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Supreme Court refused today to reconsider its ruling that the U.S. Communist party, its officers and rank-and-file members must register with the Justice Department as agents of a Soviet-dominated conspiracy.

The court stood by its decision of last June 3 in a brief order denying a Communist party appeal for a rehearing of the case.

This means the registration order which was held up last June by Justice Felix Frankfurter should be on its way to a lower court in a few days. Following last session's decision, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said the government was prepared to prosecute if the Communists refused to register.

Although Frankfurter had spoken for the majority in the original decision ordering registration, he issued a stay after the court had adjourned for the 1960-1961 term. He did so after attorneys for the Communist party had petitioned for rehearing on a number of grounds protesting the constitutionality of the 1950 Internal Security Law.

Laos Heads Force Delay

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI)—Rightwing Laotian leaders today forced a 24-hour delay in seeking King Savang Vatthana's approval of a plan to form a coalition government with Prince Souvanna Phouma, Communist-backed nationalist, as premier.

The basic agreement was reached Sunday at a conference of the three princes of Laos in a candy-striped tent on the banks of the Nam Lik river in Hin Heup village.

Souvanna Phouma and his half brother "Red" Prince Souphanouvong, agreed that Prince Boun Oum and Gen. Phoumi Nosavan, premier and vice premier of the present pro-Western government, should go to the royal capital at Luang Prabang today.

They were to arrange an audience with King Savang Vatthana for Souvanna Phouma at which the nationalist would seek authority to try to form a coalition government.

But today the two government leaders announced they would not leave for Luang Prabang until Tuesday. They gave no reason but it was assumed they wanted to prepare strategy for bargaining still to come on the makeup of the new cabinet.

Shah Gives Up \$133 Million

TEHRAN (AP)—The Shah of Iran today formally surrendered all rights to his personal property, estimated to be worth \$133 million in a decree transforming it into public property.

The revenue will be spent by the Pahlavi Foundation on Education and Religious and Social Welfare. The foundation is named for his family.

Slim Pushed For U.N. Post

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Thant lately has been mentioned as most likely to get the job.

Both the United States and the Soviet Union reportedly are willing to accept U Thant, Burma's ambassador to the U.N., as a temporary successor to Dag Hammarskjöld.

But Asian-African sources said the Burmese would take the job only if the two big powers could agree on all aspects of the arrangement and both would vote for him.

They said Slim, president of the current General Assembly, would take the job even if the Soviets were so cool to him as to abstain from voting. They said he would not take it if the Soviets voted against him.

Slim and Frederick H. Boland of Ireland, president of the last assembly, are both acceptable to the United States to serve out Hammarskjöld's term expiring in April, 1963. Boland has said several times he would not take the job, but some delegates believe he could be persuaded. Many doubt the Soviets would approve him.

Soviet delegates have told some colleagues they oppose Slim. But they apparently have not told the Tunisians. The Asian-African sources said that Slim's candidacy said the Tunisians were upset at reports that the Soviet Union was against giving Slim the U.N. post because they feel neither he nor Tunisia is neutral.

Soviet Group Embroiled In Free-Swinging Fight

AMSTERDAM (AP)—A free-swinging fist fight broke out at Amsterdam airport today between Dutch police and Soviet Embassy officials, including Ambassador Panteleimon K. Ponomarenko, who was heard to shout at one point: "Do you know I am the ambassador?"

The brawl erupted in a dispute over the passport of a Soviet woman tourist who police feared was being taken back to Russia against her will.

The Soviet officials were bundled bodily from the police office—at least one of them nursing a bruise.

Premier Jan de Quay then summoned the Soviet ambassador to the Hague for a conference while the woman remained at the airport.

The Soviet tourist, Mrs. Alexei Golub, is the wife of a 35-year-old Soviet chemical engineer who defected Saturday and asked asylum here. She was brought to the airport today, accompanied by Soviet officials, to board a plane back to Moscow.

Soon afterward 15 Soviet Embassy men, including Ponomarenko, stormed into the police office at the airport demanding Mrs. Golub's passport. The policeman in charge, Frits Veltman, refused to hand it over until he talked with Mrs. Golub and had her assurance she was returning of her own free will.

Witnesses said a fist fight then broke out, involving at least six Dutch police and a similar number of Soviet officials.

Chamber Raps Free Spending

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Council of State Chambers of Commerce said Sunday the congressional session just ended was "the freest spending session in the nation's peacetime or cold war history."

A council analysis of the financial actions of the first session of the 87th Congress predicted the effect of this record "will not only be a \$7-billion increase in expenditures over the original budget for 1962, but also a further rise to at least a \$90-billion budget in 1963."

The analysis, prepared by Eugene F. Rinta, director of research for the council, said that while the Eisenhower administration and Congress cut the final 1954 budget recommendations of the outgoing Truman administration by over \$12 billion in appropriations and \$10 billion in expenditures, the Kennedy administration and Congress increased the Eisenhower budget for 1962 by \$9 billion in appropriations and \$7 billion in expenditures.

Menon Said Doing Well

NEW YORK (AP)—Indian Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon is "doing very well" in Montefiore Hospital following surgery to remove a collection of blood from between his skull and brain.

Menon, who underwent surgery Saturday, received visitors Sunday. He was expected to leave the hospital by the end of the week.

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
