

Court Holds State May Outlaw Agency Shop Agreements

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court refused today to reconsider its decision in the case of **"Oldat 40.50.60?"** Man, Get Wise! Pep Up

view—and thus let stand—a Kansas ruling that agency shop agreements are illegal in that state.

The action was an important development in a major national issue: Whether in states that ban compulsory union membership unions may make agreements requiring that nonunion workers pay union dues.

The union argument runs that such agency agreements, as they are called, simply recompense the union for acting as collective bargaining agency for all workers.

On the other side, the argument is that the device has the practical effect of pressuring workers into the union.

The Supreme Court refusal to consider the Kansas case took on added importance because the National Labor Relations Board ruled Sept. 29 that agency agreements do not violate the federal Taft-Hartley labor law.

Rejected petitions for reconsideration of a number of its major decisions of last term. They included its holding that the Communist party must register as an agency of the Soviet Union and its decision upholding state blue laws against commercial activities on Sunday.

Refused to review the Federal Communications Commission order canceling the 1957 award of TV Channel 10 in Miami, Fla., to Public Service Television, Inc.

This was the channel award involved most prominently in the congressional investigation of whether commissioners had yielded to improper influence in making awards.

GOP Plan All-Out Drive To Cut Civilian Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy's probable request for a \$50-billion defense budget will be met in the next session of Congress by an all-out Republican drive to cut civilian spending.

Sen. Styles Bridges, R-N.H., and Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois are expected to put before the Senate Republican Policy Committee early in the session proposals for a concentrated attack on New Frontier domestic programs.

Bridges is committee chairman. Because of recurring world crises, Republicans are unlikely to offer any serious challenge to increase in military outlays, which could set a new peacetime record in the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

The current year's \$48.66-billion arms budget is up about \$6 billion from the last year of the Eisenhower administration.

The Republicans are certain to call for cutbacks in domestic spending and to resist new programs Kennedy is likely to suggest. In this effort, GOP members expect strong support from Southern Democratic conservatives.

This informal alliance has demonstrated that it can work effectively in both the House and the Senate, particularly on budgetary issues. On this common and familiar ground, most Dixie Democrats have no political qualms about opposing their president.

Administration leaders have predicted Kennedy will submit a balanced budget in January. But if military outgo is to approximate \$50 billion in the new fiscal year, any such balance would depend heavily on skyrocketing revenues.
