Two housewives can keep busy for the same number of hours a day. One will accomplish everything she has to do without feeling rushed or tired. The other ends the day tired and frustrated, with half the things she meant to do left undone.

Both are hard workers. Both are conscientious homemakers. The difference: One is organized. The other has never thought of home-making as a job that requires planning and executive ability. The housewife executive doesn't

burden herself with chores and responsibilities that can and should be handled by other members of the family. She divides the work, and expects each member of the family to do his share.

The housewife executive plans her days a week in advance, but keeps her schedule flexible enough to allow her to change it to suit herself, and to meet unexpected demands upon her time.

The housewife executive puts first things first. She does the hardest jobs when she has the energy to tackle them, instead of dreading them all the while she puts them off.

It is organization and executive ability that enables a woman to run her home, instead of letting her home keep her on the run.

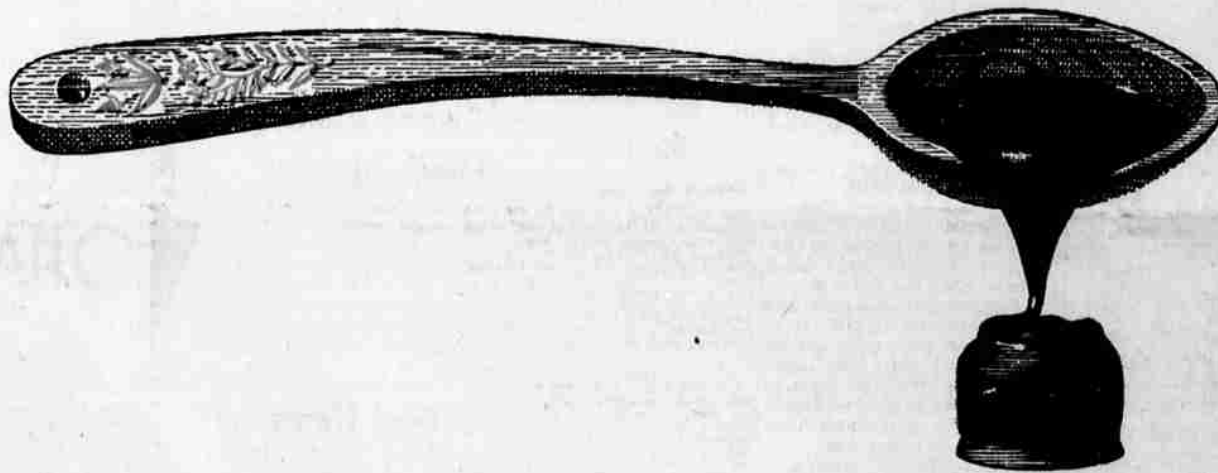
