

Experts Don't Agree On Weekend Football Picks

Claassen Favors Arizona

NEW YORK (AP)—Be sure to equip your TV set with a shutter proof screen for this weekend's viewing of the Michigan State at Michigan football game. Each again is a Big Ten power and they hate each other athletically as only rival state institutions can.

You and some 100,000 spectators-in-the-flesh will see Michigan wear down the Spartans and eke out a narrow victory. There's a .723 chance that this prediction is correct. That's the average for the season after four weeks. Last week's figures showed 31 correct and 15 wrong picks.

Each team has powerful and mobile linemen. Each, also, has speedy and versatile backs. But Michigan also has Bill Tunnicliffe, a 230-pound fullback and he gives the Wolverines a slight edge.

Iowa over Indiana: The Hawkeyes have been sputtering in their first two games, but despite a long injury list among the Iowa backs the Hoosiers haven't enough to hold their foes in check.

Alabama over North Carolina State: The Crimson Tide has yielded an average of only four points each to three foes stronger than State.

Texas over Oklahoma: The one-time Big Eight power will wear itself out trying to catch Jim Saxon and Jack Collins.

Mississippi over Houston: The Rebels' biggest worry will be to decide which of their three top teams to start.

Ohio State over Illinois: The Illini still too green even if the Buckeyes aren't as fierce as they were rated to be.

Notre Dame over Southern California: The Irish are on the way back as any team would be that had their backfield array.

Elsewhere: Baylor over Arkansas; Maryland over North Carolina; Louisiana State over South Carolina; Northwestern over Minnesota; Washington over California; Georgia Tech over Duke; Miami over Colorado; Navy over Cornell.

'Clutch' Passer Honored

Colorado's Buffaloes looked in helpless straits against Kansas last Saturday, down 20-0 with 10 minutes to play. But on came Gale Weidner, their eagle-eyed quarterback, to throw three touchdown passes, gunning down the Jayhawks 21-29 with a fantastic exhibition of clutch passing and play calling.

Today, it earned the senior Colorado quarterback top honors as The Associated Press' back of the week of college football.

Weidner started the comeback by throwing a 57-yard scoring strike to end Ken Blair. The next time the Buffaloes had the ball, he hit Blair with a 47-yard touchdown pass.

He got the winner, a 16-yard pass to Jerry Hildebrand with less than three minutes to go, culminating an eight-play, 63-yard drive.

In all, Weidner completed 12 of 23 passes for 209 yards and ran seven times for 10 yards.

Another quarterback, Pete Olier of Washington, got a strong recommendation for his play in leading the Huskies to a 22-17 victory over Pitt. Playing in his first varsity game, Olier tossed two touchdown passes, including the winner in the last period, and directed the Huskies on their other scoring thrust.

The junior from Vancouver, B.C., completed six of 11 for 188 yards, and also completed two conversion passes.

Yanks Face Loss Of Four Men

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Yankees stand pat? Don't be silly. "We are eager to get another starting pitcher and we may need more bench strength," General Manager Roy Hamey said Tuesday after the Yankees arrived back in New York from Cincinnati, where they completed a five-game rout of the Reds in the World Series.

Hamey said he planned to sit down with Manager Ralph Houk within the next few days to discuss winter trades aimed at further strengthening the roster of the world champions.

The biggest problems facing the Yankees is whether the international situation may cause pitchers Ralph Terry and Bill Stalford, shortstop Tony Kubek and rookie infielder Tom Tresh to be summoned to military service. All are in the reserves.

Houk also must decide what to do with Johnny Blanchard. The Yankees' reserve catcher-outfielder who hit two key homers and wound up with a .400 batting average in the series. National Leaguers were astonished that such a premium player did not play every day.

Blanchard, most likely will wind up in left field next year. With Mickey Mantle patrolling center and home run king Roger Maris in right, that's the only position open to the rangy Minnesota native.

Following the series, it was reported that Yogi Berra was considering retiring.

The 36-year-old Yogi, who broke nine records and equaled two in this year's series, was non-committal. However, his wife, Carmen, dropped a hint on Yogi's future plans when she remarked: "He'd never be happy out of baseball."

Berra's present salary presumably would preclude any retirement plans he might be considering. He received \$55,000 for playing half a season in left field last season and is too good a businessman to pass up more than a grand a week for playing baseball.

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
