

Pels On Bottom Of OHS Ladder; Medford On Top

Two new teams climbed into the top 10 in Oregon high school football this week, but they failed to disturb the leaders in the Associated Press poll.

Medford again ruled as No. 1 and again was followed by Marshfield. Grants Pass, Jefferson of Portland and Benson of Portland.

Below the top five, though, there was considerable shuffling of teams. Pendleton climbed to the No. 6 spot, followed by Marshfield. Grants Pass, Jefferson of Portland and Benson of Portland.

Medford won 13 first-place votes from the state's sports writers and broadcasters. Only one other team got any backing for the No. 1 spot. That was North Salem, which picked up two first-place votes.

The six top teams all are undefeated. All but Benson have won five straight. Benson has played only four games.

Pendleton, the No. 6 team, has not given up a point to opponents this season.

Marshfield, tied for eighth place last week, climbed to seventh

place with a 29-6 victory over North Eugene.

Grants Pass made its first appearance in the top 10 this season after upsetting Klamath Falls 13-7. Grants Pass lost three pre-conference games, but now is in the running for the Southern Oregon playoff spot.

Jefferson of Portland is back in the top 10 after a three-week absence. Jefferson, upset earlier in Portland play, was idle last week. Klamath Falls' loss dropped it from No. 6 to No. 10.

North Bend, Wilson of Portland and Corvallis dropped from the top 10. North Bend, No. 7 last week, lost to Roseburg 21-6. Corvallis, tied for No. 8 last week, was downed by North Salem, 26-7. Wilson, tied for No. 10 last week, was shaded by Grant 19-18.

The top games of the coming weekend will send Medford to Klamath Falls and pit North Salem against Roseburg. There also will be Benson vs. Madison, Beaverton at Clackamas, Pendleton vs. Redmond, Marshfield vs. Thurston, Grants Pass at Ashland, and Jefferson vs. Franklin.

Miss AMERICA BOWLS

The thing that makes the four-step delivery click is the pendulum swing.

Just as the pendulum on a grandfather's clock moves forward, back and forward, so does the bowling ball.

The first step, the pushaway, has gotten the ball in motion. It begins its descent on the second step. If the timing is right, the ball will be alongside the right knee as you put the weight on the left foot. During the second step the arm should be close to the body and straight.

The second and third steps should be so carefully rehearsed and practiced that they become automatic.

Ed Lubanski, all time American Bowling Congress all-events record holder, passes along these tips:

"Take the left hand from the ball as you begin the second step. If you hold the ball with both hands too long, your timing will be off and you will be ahead of the ball. If you take the left hand from the ball too quickly, the ball will be ahead of you at the foul line. Practice coordinating your motions."

Lubanski suggests you check to see that the arm is straight during the downswing by putting a towel under the arm while practicing. If the towel falls out on the second step, you know you are not swinging straight.

Not swinging straight causes the ball to veer to the side.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Heavyweight contender Sonny Liston and Albert Westphal of Germany have signed for a feature bout in Philadelphia Dec. 5 contingent upon Liston's reinstatement by the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission, boxing sources said today.

At the same time, it appeared that Liston, who was suspended by the commission last summer for run-ins with the law, would be reinstated in the near future.

Al Klein, a member of the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission, said Monday night that Liston has applied for reinstatement through his attorney, Morton Witkin.

Klein said he could not say immediately when the commission would act on the application for reinstatement.

Johnny Waited Patiently

CINCINNATI (UPI)—It was Johnny Blanchard admitted, a long wait before he came out of the shadows and climbed to the very top of the baseball mountain.

He's there today as a member of the world champion New York Yankees. He played a big part in putting them there, too.

"I'm numb," he soberly admitted the young man from Minnesota.

"I can't smile and I can't tell you how great I feel but it's the greatest feeling I ever had."

The realization that no matter what happens from here on in as far as his baseball career is concerned nothing can ever top the World Series win over the Cincinnati Reds was difficult to absorb.

For Blanchard was one of those men—until Monday—who was too good to let go and yet, by some razor's edge deficiency, not quite good enough to crack it big. As a catcher he stood behind such as Yogi Berra and Elston Howard. As an embryo outfielder there were guys in front of him such as Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris, Bob Cerv and Hector Lopez.

Catching Original Forte

But catching was his original forte and the blue-eyed six footer wandered the minors almost in despair... Kansas City... Birmingham... and Denver before coming up to the Yankees to stay in 1959.

He played only 49 games that year and a mere 53 in 1960. And the joy of just being a part of a pennant winner was ruined by the defeat at the hands of the Pittsburgh Pirates although as a part-time player and pinch hitter last year he batted a rousing .455.

This spring, veteran Wally Moses, who spent most of his years playing the outfield for the Athletics and the White Sox, took Johnny in hand and taught him the intricacies of catching fly balls.

"I didn't care whether I caught or whether I played the outfield," said Blanchard. "I just wanted to play."

Big Chance Arrives

The lessons helped and this past season Johnny appeared in 94 Yankee games. He could hit, proving it by delivering four pinch hit homers in the regular season and one early in this World Series.

But Monday came the big chance.

Mantle was benched by an aching thigh and Berra joined Mickey with a wrenched shoulder. So Johnny got the call in right field.

He made good, in spades.

For Blanchard drove in the first two Yankee runs with a homer, added a double and a single, scored three of the 13 runs which clobbered the hapless and helpless Reds and drew a pair of walks which were a testimonial to the respect in which the Reds held him.

Houston, New York Select Players

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP)—At a cost of nearly two million dollars each, Houston and New York have assembled teams today that probably will battle it out for ninth place in the now expanded 10-team National League.

The only hope for the Colts and Mets to finish among the first eight is to improve the club through trades, purchases or the sudden emergence of thus far unheralded bonus youngsters.

Despite the seemingly meager pickings in Tuesday's regular and special drafts of players from the eight established National League clubs, both President George Weiss of the Mets and General Manager Paul Richards of the Colts appeared satisfied, at least outwardly.

"We have a strong nucleus for a fine club in a short time," said Richards. "From now on, we ask no favors from anyone."

"We went for fellows who had been top players," explained Weiss, "and we got most of them. We went for young pitching and hitters tailored for the Polo

Grounds. I think Houston has the edge over us in infielders while we have the edge in pitching."

"I honestly feel both new clubs obtained some excellent young prospects," said National League President Warren Giles, who presided over the draft meeting, attended by officials of all National League clubs. "I am hopeful that these players will give them a nucleus in which to build a pretty good club next year."

If the Colts and Mets were to open the 1962 National League season tomorrow, here is how the starting teams probably would shape up:

Don't bet that these lineups will prevail opening day. Both clubs already have asserted they intend to be active in the trade mart this winter.

"Please don't think this is our opening day lineup," said Weiss. "We hope to make some trades and acquire new players by purchase. We already know we can trade a couple of the players to other clubs, who have expressed an interest in them. I look for lots

of interleague trading this winter."

The Mets, in an effort to get power, concentrated mostly on veteran players, except for pitching. The Colts stressed youth, speed and defense. The Mets picked up 22 players which cost them \$1,800,000. The Colts spent \$1,850,000 for 23 players.

New York took 7 pitchers, 6 infielders, 6 outfielders and 3 catchers. The premium \$125,000 players included Don Zimmer of Chicago and infielder-outfielder Lee Walls of Philadelphia.

Houston got 9 pitchers, 7 infielders, 5 outfielders and 2 catchers. Its premium players were catcher Hal Smith of Pittsburgh, pitcher Dick Farrell of Los Angeles, infielder Joey Amalfitano of San Francisco and outfielder Al Spangler of Milwaukee.
