

Pels End Tornado Reign, Celebrate Homecoming

Whitebirds Soar; Silence Big Wind

The "Big Wind" finally blew itself out. And when it did, Medford's seven-year absolute rule of Southern Oregon Conference football dissolved into the turf of Modoc Field.

The Klamath Union Pelicans, ignoring Friday the 13th as they promised they would, carved out a thrilling 7-6 triumph over the Black Tornado to celebrate the biggest Homecoming in the history of KUHS.

The Pels trailed 6-0 for nearly three quarters of the ballgame until halfback Gary Buchholz twisted into the end zone from the 11-yard line on a reverse from running mate Dave Stippich. With 1:18 left in the third period John Ruger guided the ball squarely between the poles to give the Pels their big seven points and from here on the Tornado was never really in the ballgame.

The defeat was the first loss the Medford squad had suffered in league play since 1954.

For the Pelicans the win was the first they had taken from the Tornado since 1953.

Buchholz, who normally works on defense for KU, battled his way into a Friday night starting offensive position during practices this past week after regular Ken Lewis was forced to the sidelines with an injury incurred against Grants Pass. And his run proved he was serious.

The Pelican touchdown was set up by co-captain Ricky Curran who hauled in a Medford fumble on the Tornado 45-yard line late in the third period. Just 10 plays later, including three first downs, a sparkling 14-yard roll-out by quarterback Kent Hunsaker and a 12-yard sprint over right tackle by Stippich, Buchholz hit paydirt standing up.

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Normally when I take a couple of weeks off I return to work scratching for something with which to fill this column.

But the Pelicans took care of that situation for me nicely this time... I've plenty to talk about. The trouble is I'm afraid there isn't enough space available to do the Pels and their coaches justice.

The Whitebird's thrilling victory over the ever-powerful Black Tornado will have the whole state talking for at least a week and our own town buzzing for a long time to come.

Indicative of the feelings of the Klamath Basin fans toward the victorious KU gridders are the comments made by a number of local people.

KF mayor Bob Veatch, who signed the proclamation denoting "Fly Through the Tornado" week, had this to say, "We've waited a long time for this one and we're going to enjoy it to the fullest. I know I speak for most of the city when I say we are all tremendously proud of the Pels and coach Bob Williams and his staff."

Said Dr. George Wright (the first KUHS graduate) who attended the game in an automobile with Hugh Estes, "I'm glad I waited long enough to see this game. I didn't really think we had much of a chance before the game but those boys went out and earned themselves a real victory." Dr. Wright, in his late "eighties," was resplendent in his letterman's sweater, one that sports more "hash-marks" than a school full of athletes could earn.

When Everett Ball, of the local Coca Cola company, checked with coach Williams after the game, to see which three players were to get all the free cokes they could drink, promised as a reward to the outstanding players, Williams' answer pretty well typified the general feeling toward the Pels.

He answered, "I can't pick three players—the whole darn club was outstanding."

Ball rose to the occasion. "Okay—I'll back a truck up here Monday afternoon and they'll all get them."

Another local businessman who will literally have his hands full until at least Christmas, Al of Al's Barber Shop, who promised the Pels free haircuts if they won. They did... so that means about 40 free crew-cuts.

The happy horde of Pelican fans who helped them celebrate in the dressing room following the game heard Williams say this when he stripped off his tie after a prolonged dip in the shower. "Now here's a tie that can be worn with blue... or with grey... or with brown... or with white."

And that deserves a hearty Amen. Williams, hoarse to the point he could barely be heard, was lavish in the praise of his club, mentioning specifically first-time starter Mike Kitching, co-captain Ricky Curran and rugged Bob Dearing. He noted, "It was a terrific team effort—they were all

MEDFORD (Special)—Klamath Union High School's junior varsity football squad failed to follow the varsity's example as they dropped a 21-12 decision to the Medford Jayvees.

The junior Pelicans started out strongly by taking the opening kickoff and marching 80 yards to score. Fullback Vern Petrick drove 15 yards over tackle for the TD. But 90-degree heat and lack of reserves took their toll of the Klamath Falls eleven.

Medford scored twice in the second quarter on long pass plays. KUHS rallied in the third period to drive 75 yards for a six-point play. Petrick scored again, going five yards. The final Tornado touchdown came on a 60-yard march in the fourth quarter.

KU coach Jack Peterson singled out Petrick and halfback Chuck Mills on offense and end John Parisotto and Terry Christianson on defense. It was the sixth straight loss for the Pel Jayvees.

Oregon Tech Mauls Mounts 25-13 For First OCC Victory

The Eastern Oregon College Mountaineers scored first and they scored last but the Oregon Tech Owls pushed them all over the field between quarters and ended up on top 25-13 at Modoc Field Saturday night.

The victory was the third in five 1961 games to date and their first in Oregon Collegiate Conference action. They lost their first OCC start to Portland State College last weekend.

Unveiling a brand new offensive which featured churning freshman fullback Harvey Graham in a starring role, the Techs notched three touchdowns in the second quarter and added another for good measure in the third period.

Graham, a Grants Pass grad, packed the ball 22 times for a net gain of 149 yards and counted two of the four Owl six-pointers. His yardage totals were more than that amassed by the entire Mountie backfield. The Mounts were restricted to 103 yards on the ground by the rugged Owl defense.

Graham's first score came with 11:35 left in the second quarter, when he barged in from the four. With 13 left in the frame he repeated, this time from the one.

The third Tech score came with just two seconds left in the half when quarterback Bill Ransome flipped a 12 yard aerial to end

Jack Fox to set up fullback Stan Glass for a 3-yard counter.

The final Owl counter in third when Ransome hit Larry Myers with a 15-yard pass with :16 seconds left. Myers returned to action in the EQC game after a long absence caused by a knee injury.

The Mounts got on the scoreboard with 1:12 left in the opening stanza when they recovered an Owl fumble on their own 47 and moved across the Tech goal line in 12 plays. Halfback Fred Sayre connected with end Lee Wick with a 19-yard pass for the score. The try for point was wide.

They scored the second time just as the gun sounded to end the game. The Mounts got their hands on the ball for the final time with just 29 seconds left to

play and moved from their own 48 with five pass plays, three of them good. Sayre hit Larry Snook for 24, followed up with a pair of incompletes, then connected with Hal Williams for 14 and ended the drive with a 14-yarder to Bob Bates for the score. Ron Robinson booted the conversion try over the bar.

The Owls out-first-downed the visitors 12-10 and eight of these were credited to the speed-shifting Graham. Glass, the No. 2 Owl rusher with 52 yards in 14 trips, notched two first downs and Ransome aials accounted for the other pair.

Ransome completed four of 10 pass attempts while reserve QB Jim Henson hit his one shot at Fox. In the air the Owls were good for 71 yards which brought their overall yardage figure to 295.

The Mountaineers completed 11 of 21 tosses for a total of 144 yards which gave them 249 overall.

The EOC passing chores were shared by Sayre and halfback Bill Showers. Showers led the Mount ground gainers with a net total of 49 yards in 23 carries. He actually gained 98 yards but he was smothered a number of times by the Pel defenders on pass attempts and lost 40 yards.

Graham's second touchdown was a delayed action affair. He had sifted through the entire EOC squad and broke into the clear when he dropped the ball after traveling 39 yards. The fumble was recovered by big Ed Anderson on the EOC 30 and the Owls picked up where they left off. Graham getting even with his TD.

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Arizona Defeats Oregon

US Defeats Britain For Ryder Cup

LYTHAM-ST. ANNES, England (AP)—The United States defeated Britain 14½-9½ in the Ryder Cup golf competition Saturday with the red-hot putter of Art Wall clinching the golden trophy for the Americans once again.

The U.S. team went to lunch with an 11-5 lead and needed to win only one of the afternoon's eight singles to retain the trophy won at Palm Desert, Calif., two years ago.

Wall made sure the Yanks kept the trophy by putting brilliantly and defeated Britain's long-driving Harry Weetman, 1 up. Wall took only 12 putts in the outward 9 holes.

He was out in a 4-under-par 31, sinking putts of 6 feet on the 3rd, 12 feet on the 4th, 5 feet on the 7th, 6 feet on the 8th, and 30 feet on the 9th.

The Americans held a 6-2 lead at the end of Friday's eight foursomes—all 18 holes—and went on to dominate the 16 singles. Saturday they won 7 singles and halved 3 others with Britain winning 6.

Jerry Barber, the dynamic little American captain, said afterwards: "It was very close although the scores look as though we won fairly easily. I'm very happy with a five-point margin. Before the competition I thought we might win but only by two or three points."

C. Of Idaho Explodes In Third Period

CALDWELL, Idaho (AP)—College of Idaho set off a three-touchdown explosion in the third period with an electrifying 33-yard kickoff return by Gary Matlock to whip defending Northwest Conference champion Willamette University 34-24.

Matlock, the Coyotes' secret weapon, put the spark in the attack at the college's homecoming after Willamette led 12-7 at the half.

The Coyotes took a commanding 26-12 lead even though they had to fight for their lives to hold on in the final quarter. The clinching touchdown by fullback Pat Fulleton came with only 41 seconds remaining on the clock.

75-Yard Runback Breaks Game Open

PORTLAND (AP)—Halfback Bobby Thompson broke open a scoreless battle by returning a punt 75 yards to a touchdown, and started Arizona to a 15-6 victory over Oregon Saturday night.

The run came midway through the third quarter of a game in which Arizona was on the defensive almost all the way.

Besides Thompson's run, Arizona's offense consisted of only two other plays, both set up by the defense.

End Larry Williams of Arizona grabbed a fumble by Oregon quarterback Ron Veres on the Oregon 19 early in the fourth quarter, and on the next play filtered into the end zone and made a leaping catch of a touchdown pass thrown by quarterback Eddie Wilson.

Arizona's other score was a safety. Just before the final gun, when the hard charging Arizona line trapped Oregon quarterback Doug Post in his end zone.

Oregon threatened repeatedly, but was not able to punch over a score until only 1:43 minutes were left in the game. Halfback Lucius Bain capped an 8-yard drive by plunging the final two.
