

Badgers Beat Beavers 23-20

Beaver Rally Is Short

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—Wisconsin's inconsistent Badgers packed all their scoring into the first half of the passing wizardry of Ron Miller and then hung on doggedly Saturday for a 23-20 football victory over Oregon State.

Miller piled up 215 yards in the air with a brilliant sharp-shooting display in leading Wisconsin to a 23-0 halftime lead. Then the Beavers from the West Coast took charge in a turnabout and had the Badgers hanging on the ropes in the final two quarters.

Oregon State was held for downs on the Wisconsin 37 with less than a minute and a half remaining. Beaver halfback LeRoy Whittle was stopped a yard short of a first down on a fourth-and-two situation and the Badgers then ran out the clock.

Temper flared as the final gun sounded and several members of both teams threw punches in a general melee near the Oregon State bench. Coaches, police and non-combatant players broke up the disturbance.

Wisconsin, which had scored only 13 points in winning two of its first three games, unleashed its vaunted passing attack to shock Oregon State in the first half. Miller hit on 14 of 24 passes and had 3 dropped by receivers.

With Terry Baker at the controls, the Beavers took the second half kickoff and roared 80 yards for a touchdown. Baker ended the drive with a 10-yard toss to end Roger Johnson in the end zone.

A fumble recovery on the Wisconsin 21 set up Oregon State's second touchdown. Tom Gates dove over from the 1 and Jim Sinyard ran a 2-point conversion to make the count 23-14.

Early in the fourth period, the Beavers went from the 16 to the Wisconsin 36 where Baker launched a long scoring rally to Johnson.

WSU Takes To Ground In Easy Win

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—The weather was fine, but Washington State grounded its famed air attack and pounded through the line Saturday to its first football victory of the season with a 34-0 win over Idaho.

Quarterback Mel Melin passed for two touchdowns and Dave Mathieson for another but it was the running of junior fullback George Reed and sophomore halfback Ken Graham that provided the Cougars with their offensive edge.

The winners gained 391 yards rushing and 116 passing. Both Reed and Graham burst through on runs of more than 30 yards to set up scores.

Substitute fullback Louis Blakely sprinted 61 yards for a fourth quarter touchdown to prove the crisp Cougar blocking could open holes for other backs, too. Idaho appeared dangerous with 105-pound quarterback Mike Mosell running and throwing to 6-foot-6 end Reg Carolan, but the Vandals couldn't keep up the pressure when they neared the WSU goal.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Sophomore halfback Mike Haffner put on a dazzling show in dizzying heat Saturday and led UCLA to a 28-21 victory over a gallant Vanderbilt team.

The 19-year-old, 187-pound Haffner contributed a brilliant 63-yard touchdown run in the third quarter which wrecked any hope Vandy may have had.

A crowd of 23,704 sat in torrid weather, the temperature on the playing field in Memorial Coliseum at one stage was 110 degrees, and the stadium first aid station reported a near-record of 225 persons treated for heat prostration. Five were sent to a hospital.

Much has been said, orally and in print, concerning last week's "farce" football game at Ashland between the AHS Grizzlies and Yreka Miners.

The actual game ended up in a 20-20 deadlock, however, Ashland was declared the winner after the teams had headed for the dressing rooms when it was discovered that Yreka coach Tommy Bice had made, in his own words, "a big mistake."

The veteran Miner coach apparently had okayed the switching of jerseys by Bob Holman, who had been expelled from the game for roughhouse tactics midway in the non-league contest.

After a trip to the dressing room where he changed his jersey and number with a fellow player, Holman returned to the game... not on his own... but apparently with Bice's full endorsement.

The obvious infraction of the rules would have gone unnoticed, however, if the jersey switch hadn't been witnessed by ex-Grizzly grid boss Stan Smith.

Once all officials of both schools had been notified, Yreka school officials immediately announced that the Miners, understandably, would forfeit the game, 2-0.

That was done, but the shouting has just begun. Rogue Valley media have had much to say concerning the incident, some pro, some con.

At the present time, one week later, to be exact, the smoke is clearing somewhat, although the biggest fear is that the two inter-state schools will break off all athletic relations... something that many would consider a "crime."

From an ethical standpoint, it would seem that Bice, who has openly admitted his wrongdoing, would lose his job as a result. Not so... apparently, Yreka school officials have announced that the "matter will be cleared up."

And, as of this writing, Texan Tommy Bice is still head football coach at Yreka High School. As one Grizzly grinner put it when first informed of the forfeit: "That's one heckuva way to win a ball game."

A trip over the Green Springs Friday night to see our old Alma Mater in action against arch-rival Medford was a joyous one... one we'll never regret.

Rich NY Race Is Bumping Duel
NEW YORK (AP)—Donut King from California, son of the 1953 Kentucky Derby winner Determine, beat favored Jaipur by a head after a rough homestretch bumping duel in the \$206,000 Champagne Stakes Saturday at Aqueduct. Sir Gaylor was third in the field of ten 3-year-olds.

But the winner, who may be a colt to be considered in the 1962 derby next May, had to withstand a foul claim before the result was made official.

This was New York's richest race, and Manuel Ycaza aboard Verne Winchell's Donut King and Eddie Arcaro riding Jaipur were all out to win as their horses fought a head and head duel for virtually the last half mile.

UC Bears Surprise Huskies

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—A blocked punt in the final three minutes set up the winning touchdown Saturday as California's underdog Bears upset the defending champion Washington Huskies 21-14 in their Big Five conference football opener.

California guard John Erby broke through and knocked down a fourth down punt by Dave Kopyay at the Huskies' 17. Three players later sub quarterback Larry Balliett scooted left end for six yards and the touchdown that brought California its first 1961 victory. Jim Ferguson promptly booted his third straight conversion.

A crowd of 43,000 watched the improving Bears, who tied Missouri's defending Orange Bowl champs last week, grab a 14-6 lead over the defending Rose Bowl champions after three periods.

Washington came charging back and marched 82 yards in eight plays for a touchdown early in the fourth stanza. Martin Wyatt ran the final 16 yards. Pete Olier pitched a pass to end Lee Bernhardt for the two-point conversion knotting the count at 14-14.

With the clock showing 3:08, Erby smashed through to block the punt. On second down, Balliett ran to his left looking for a pass receiver, found running room and kept going for the touchdown.

Balliett entered the game in the third period when starting quarterback Randy Goff suffered a leg injury on an unsuccessful field goal attempt.

Each club lost the ball three times on fumbles while Washington had two passes intercepted and California lost one. In putting their season record at 1-2-1, the Bears gained 300 yards to 196 for Washington, now 2-2.

Filling in for the injured Wilburn Hollis, Szykowny got good running help from left halfback Joe Williams, who scored two first half touchdowns in the Big Ten football opener for Iowa.

The undefeated Hawkeyes started the rout with only four minutes gone in the game when Indiana's Marv Woodson bobbled a handoff and Iowa guard Sherwyn Thorsen recovered on the Hoosiers' 25.

AFL Leaders Meet Today In Headliner

The first meeting of the season between the leaders of the American Football League headlines the Sunday schedule of three games.

San Diego, unbeaten front-runner of the Western Division, makes its third straight trip into the East to tackle New York, the Eastern Division leader.

Fireworks should erupt because this game will match the top passers of the league—a couple of guys who have thrown for more than 1600 yards and 16 scores.

It will be Jack Kemp of San Diego, who leads the circuit in passing, against Al Dorow, the flinger of New York who ranks No. 2.

Dallas makes its first trip to the East to play Buffalo and the Texans will be most interested onlookers while trying to take care of their own interests in the fight with the Bills.

San Diego needs to lose for Dallas to draw virtually even at the top in the Western Division where San Diego is 5-0 and Dallas is 3-1.

Oakland and Denver play the third game scheduled Sunday afternoon. It will be at Denver where the Broncos are tough as a boot — as Dallas will testify after its hair-raising 19-12 triumph there last Sunday.

This game can only decide who's to be in the Western Division cellar. Denver has the spot now but a victory over Oakland would put the latter in the depths.

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
