

Hard-Nosed KUHS Defensive Unit Sets Up Victory Touchdown March

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After a first-quarter slip which allowed the Tornado to score its six points by capitalizing on a 15-yard line Pelican fumble, the hard-nosed KU defensive unit settled down to business and let the Medford eleven get no closer than the 11-yard line.

Tornado fullback George Clearwater, the "doubtful" starter who was the visitor's big ground-gainer, bombed over from the one with 2:20 left in the first quarter after quarterback Mike Neat-

hamer had recovered the KU fumble on the 15. His six points were wasted since little Danny Miles missed the try for point boot.

Miles, an energetic junior, missed once more to nullify the Tornado's only other scoring threat. In a fourth and eight situation on the KU eleven, Miles attempted a field goal that was time for distance but way wide of the uprights.

Medford got its hands on the ball only four times during the third and fourth quarters and the deepest it was to penetrate

Pelican territory was the 46-yard stripe.

The Pels clamped the clincher on their big win with 2:30 left in the game when Stippich intercepted a long Miles' pass on his own 42.

They slammed the door on Medford's hopes for good as Hunsaker picked up a pair of first downs on his specialty, the roll-out, and workhorse fullback Larry Clure, the biggest ground-gainer of the game, pounded the middle of the Tornado line.

In the final three plays Hunsaker kept the ball to run out the clock.

McClure, who packed the ball 16 times for a total of 72 yards, tore up yards of turf, the longest section of which was a 13-yard charge the second time he got his hands on the ball. The first time he had trouble. The pigskin was jarred out of his hands to set up the Medford score. He added runs of 11 and 12 yards to personally collect three of the Pels' 9 rushing first downs.

Hunsaker, who carried nine times for 49 of the Pels' total 182 yards on the ground, connected with end Kent Franklin on a pass worth 32 of KU's 67 aerial yards.

He also averaged 38.3 yards on four punts, one of which was good for 67 yards to the Tornado one in the fourth frame. A fourth quarter 35-yard kick which went into the end zone cut his average when the ball was brought out to the Tornado 20.

In overall yardage the Pels out-gained the Tornado 249 yards to 173 and notched 13 first downs as compared to 12.

KU quarterback Sherman Allen hit two completions in four pass attempts, both to Stippich, for 19 yards and the other for 16.

Clearwater led the Medford ground attack with 66 yards in 10 trips including one of 18 yards on a near break-away. Teammate Dick Byrd was next with 39 yards in 12 trips and Mike McCullough had a net of 21 in four carries including one 25-yard sprint that was also nipped just in time.

The Pelicans threatened twice in the first half. At the close of the first period they started a march on their own 20 and moved to the Medford six before losing the ball on downs early in the second period. The drive included all three of McClure's first down romps.

With 1:51 left in the half they again started on their own 20 after Miles missed his field goal try, and completed all three of their tries. They had reached the Medford 10, then lost five yards on a reverse just as the gun sounded.

One of the most thrilling plays of the hard-fought struggle came in the fourth period when Medford started on its own one and sprung Byrd for a 16-yarder that could have spelled disaster. Nothing came of it, however, as KU safetyman Hunsaker, the last man between Byrd and the KU goal, stopped him with a diving shoestring tackle.

Colorado used a tough, alert defense and Detroit a brilliant quarterback as the keys for their victories Friday night—each preserving an unbeaten season—as the college football season headed into a Big Ten-dominated weekend.

Colorado, shooting for the Big Eight championship and a post-season trip to the Orange Bowl, showed the bowl committee a determined defense which pounced on a fourth-quarter fumble that set up the winning field goal in a 9-7 victory over injury-weakened Miami.

Junior quarterback Jerry Gross passed for 196 yards—including scoring strikes of 43 and 57 yards—in leading Detroit to a 20-3 conquest of Boston College.

Colorado halted a 78-yard Miami drive one foot from its goal in the first period, then turned around and launched a 99-yard march of its own for a 6-0 half-time lead. Miami was on the Colorado five when the half ended.

The Buffaloes went up 9-0 in the last quarter when big Jerry Hillebrand pounced on a Miami fumble that paved the way for his 37-yard field goal. The three points proved decisive as Miami drove 62 yards to score with four minutes left. John Bennett's 25-yard pass to Bill Miller scored the touchdown.

In Detroit, the gritty little 5-foot-9 Gross was the big show. He entered the game fourth in the nation in individual total offense, and boosted his total to 611 yards passing and 96 running in three games.

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49ers Seek Modern Era Record; 'Shotgun' Aimed At Viking Squad

San Francisco 49ers hope to blend their shotgun attack with stonewall defense today for a modern era National Football League record in a game with the Minnesota Vikings at Minneapolis.

The 49ers, with two shutouts triumphs the past two weeks, could become the first team to record as many as three straight since the 1934 Detroit Lions turned the truck with seven shutouts in a row.

For this reason, the heavily favored 49ers will share the Sunday spotlight with the Green Bay Packers-Browns battle at Cleveland and the New York Giants-Cowboys scrap in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas.

The Giants, the Philadelphia Eagles, the Browns and the Cowboys are hooked up in a first place tie in the league's Eastern Conference, all with 3-1 records. San Francisco and Green Bay are deadlocked at the top of the Western Conference, also with 3-1 marks.

The champion Eagles collide with the Cardinals (2-2) in St. Louis. Other contests send the Baltimore Colts (2-2) against the Bears in Chicago (2-2), the Los

Angeles Rams (1-3) against the Lions (2-2) in Detroit, and the Washington Redskins (0-4) against the Steelers, playing without Bobby Layne, at Pittsburgh (0-4).

San Francisco stunned Detroit 49-0 two weeks ago. Last week

end the 49ers thrashed Los Angeles 35-0. This is the first time since 1955 that an NFL team has been able to score even two straight shutouts.

Some 70,000 spectators will watch the Green Bay-Cleveland fireworks. Some of the league's

greatest running backs will be on display. Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung of the Packers is fresh from his 33-point performance in last Sunday's 45-7 conquest over Baltimore.

The Giants, with the circuit's best defense statistically, figure to beef up their running attack against the Cowboys to half-back. Again, however, they'll lean heavily on the passing of Y. A. Tittle and Charlie Conerly, whose favorite target will be the NFL's No. 1 pass receiver, Del Shofner.

St. Louis handed Philadelphia its only loss so far, nipping the Eagles two weeks ago 30-27 on Gerry Perry's 27-yard field goal in the dying seconds. In that one, Prentice Gautt picked up 135 yards and Sam Etcheberry connected on 11 of 14 passes for the Redskins. Gautt, nursing a badly strained ankle, may miss the rematch.

If the Cardinals duplicate their victory, it would be the first time since 1956 they've swept a series from the Eagles and would just about wreck Philadelphia's chances of repeating as Eastern Conference and world champions.

Owl Rush Defense Tops In OCC Stax

PORTLAND, (Special)—Oregon College of Education took over the team rushing offense and Oregon Tech climbed to the top of the rushing defense departments of the Oregon Collegiate Conference following October 7th football games.

The Wolves of Coach Bill McArthur have averaged 184.5 yards a game on the ground and the Owls from Klamath Falls have given up just 140.7 per contest this season.

Southern Oregon continues to lead the total offense picture with an average of 254.2 yards a game and pass offense with an average of 104.5 per contest. Tech's total defense is best at 218.7 per game and Eastern Oregon tops the pass defense statistics, yielding an average of only 56.0 yards a game.

Tech's Stan Glass continued to hold his individual rushing lead—he has gained 324 yards for a 4.3 yard per carry average—but three others are bunched in the runner-up area. They are freshman Bill Showers of EOC with 283 yards, Bill White of PSC with 247 and OCE's Bob Pennell with 243. There were no changes in other individual departments.

Back of the Week and Line-man of the Week honors both went to Oregon College athletes for outstanding performances against Eastern Oregon last Saturday afternoon in Monmouth. Bob Pennell was named Back of the Week after gaining 172 yards in 25 carries. Teammate Frank Colburn turned in an outstanding defensive job at end to win the Lineman honors.

Other backs nominated were Stan Glass of OTI, Bill White of PSC and Bill Showers of EOC. Honorable mention line-men were Bob Williams of PSC, Jim Madden of OTI and Gordon Myers of EOC and Jerry Putnam of SOC.

Orangemen Begin '61 Cage Drills

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY, Corvallis (Special)—Coach Slat Gills starts his 34th season as Beaver hood mentor Monday when the Orangemen open basketball practice.

"I'm really enthusiastic and looking forward to this season as I always have," Gills said. "And I'm enthusiastic about the boys we have to work with."

The Beavers have only two seniors, 6-7 Jay Carty and 6-8 Bob Jacobson, back from last year's team. Missing via graduation are Karl Anderson, Bill Wold, Jim Woodland, Steve Flynn and Ernie Johnson. All but Wold were three-year lettermen here.

Other returning veterans include Gary Rossi, Steve Pauly, Dave Hayward and Tim Campbell. The latter lettered two years ago as a sophomore, but laid out last season, while the other three earned varsity awards as sophomores last winter.

Football quarterback Terry Baker is expected to join the squad as soon as the grid season is finished. Roger Johnson, former Coos Bay all-stater, is slated to turn out after football. He saw limited action as a sophomore. Wingback Gene Hillard will also be a late candidate.

Heading the list of sophomores is 7-0 Mel Counts, the heralded Coos Bay product who averaged 27 points a game for the Rooks last season. Other top soph prospects are Rex Benner, Lynn Baxter and Larry Clark.

The Beavers have two transfers, 6-4 Ray Torgerson from Portland State and Leroy Butler, a 6-1 guard from Grays Harbor (Wash.) junior college.

Oregon State will open Dec. 23 at Missoula, Mont., against the University of Montana. Their home opener is Dec. 9 against Stanford.

US Davis Cuppers Cinch Moral Victory

ROME (AP)—Even if the United States eventually loses the Davis Cup interzone final to Italy, the Americans already can claim a moral victory.

They have made Italian sports fans and tennis experts eat their words.

Before the five-match series started, Italians were talking of their team winning all the matches and going on to Australia to meet the Australians in the challenge round for the cup.

Now the Italians are not so sure. Jon Douglas of Santa Monica, Calif., and Whitney Reed of Alameda, Calif., have provided the shock for the Italians.

On the red clay court of the Rome Tennis Club, Friday, Douglas came from behind to upset Italian champion Fausto Gardini in the opening match. The score was 4-6, 4-6, 7-5, 10-8, 6-0.

Then Reed took on Nicola Pietrangeli. Reed is virtually unknown here. He is rated only eighth in the United States. Pietrangeli is generally considered Europe's best amateur.

Reed made him look bad, winning two sets, 6-2, 6-6, before the match was suspended because of darkness. At the time of suspension, with Pietrangeli serving, Pietrangeli led 4-3 in games in the third set.

Two days ago Corriere Dello Sport, a sports daily, wrote that the Americans had sent "second stringers" here because they did

not want to play in Italy on clay.

Communist-line Paese Sera said ticket prices should be cut because Chuck McKinley and Bernard Bartzen did not come. McKinley remained in the United States because of studies, Bartzen because of bursitis.

Now Italian newspapers were taking another line.

Giorgio Bellani, Corriere Dello Sport's tennis expert, had made an unqualified prediction that Italy would be standing on the good side of a 2-0 score by Friday night and would be buying airline tickets for Australia by Saturday night.

"This has been a disastrous beginning for Italy," Bellani wrote Saturday. The airline tickets apparently forgotten for the moment, he continued: "Let's face it: We are heading for a severe setback."

David Freed, nonplaying captain of the U.S. Davis Cup team, said he would not name his doubles team until he knows the Reed-Pietrangeli result.
