

Civil Defense Chief Tells How To Survive

DUNSMUIR — "Do what you can with what you have," Mrs. John Sleeth, San Luis Obispo, state civil defense chairman for the California Federation of Women's Clubs, old women's clubs of Siskiyou County Oct. 10.

Learn disaster and emergency signals and what they mean, learn of the community disaster plans, plan for family shelter and emergency measures, learn first aid and learn how to depend on Conelrad warnings, Mrs. Sleeth emphasized in her preparedness message at the luncheon meeting in Travelers Hotel.

She said that every family should be prepared to sustain themselves for two weeks in event the United States is attacked. She displayed various food packs that are available as emergency rations but also said a well planned and stocked pantry shelf can offer as much security.

Camp stoves should be stocked with fuel in case of power failures and every family should have battery-operated radios and flashlights, she warned.

California's Three-Way Duck Season Open This Weekend

California's three-sided waterfowl season, split down the middle and at both ends, opened Saturday over most of the state. But not all.

It lines up this way: Opening Saturday at noon — all of the state for the first half of a split season except the Tule Lake-Klamath Basin area, which will have a straight 75-day waterfowl season.

Already open — The Colorado River for the first half of a split season.

It was a glum opening day in most respects. The duck counts are way down from last year — as much as 75 per cent in the Tule Lake-Klamath Basin area and about 50 per cent in the Central San Joaquin and Imperial valleys.

The reason for this is drought and poor nesting conditions in the northern prairie provinces of Canada.

But there is a bright spot. During the past few weeks, there has been a steady buildup of duck populations in Central Valley.

And another bright spot is geese. They're in fine shape this year. Fortunately for California hunters, the major goose production areas are in Alaska and along the Arctic coast of Canada, where waterfowl nesting conditions were good this year.

In September, the annual inventory of waterfowl showed only 738,000 ducks, a drop of 49 per cent from the same time a year ago and compared with 2,034,000 only four years ago.

The first split general season that opens Saturday will close Nov. 20. The second half will open Dec. 9 and close Jan. 7.

Hunting regulations for ducks are as complicated this year as ever. Here's a rundown on them: Limit — five bag and five possession for ducks; six for geese but not more than three of the same species.

Limitations — no canvasbacks or redhead ducks or Ross' geese may be taken; only one wood duck and one hooded merganser permitted in daily bag and total possession limit.

Hours — hunt started at noon Saturday but from then on it's from one half hour before sunrise to sunset.

For those hunters who like bonuses, the coot and gallinule seasons also opened Saturday and

the bag and possession limit is 25, separately or together.

Four of the state's waterfowl hunting areas opened for shooting Saturday — Grizzly Island, San Luis Waterway, Honey Lake and Imperial's Wister and Ramer units. Los Banos and Mendota open Oct. 21 and Gray Lodge, Colusa, Sutter and Merced open Oct. 23.

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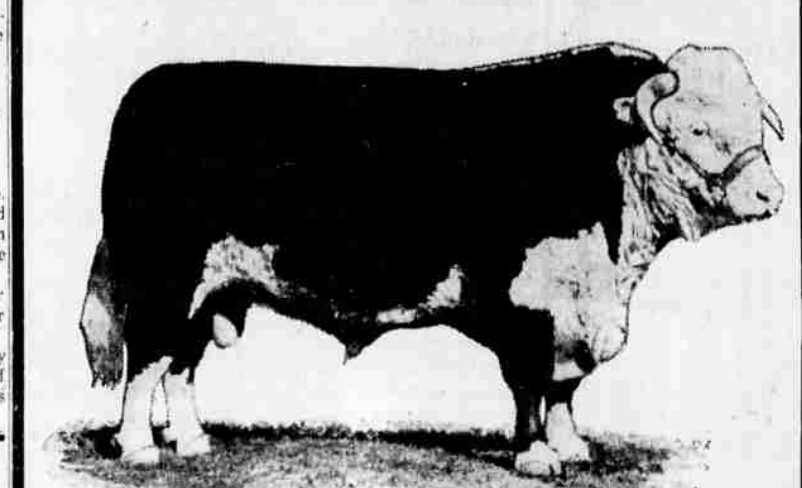
