

Vietnamese Flay Visit By Taylor

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI)—The North Vietnamese high command today protested to the International Control Commission (ICC) the forthcoming visit of Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor to South Viet Nam, the Communist New China News Agency reported.

Quoting the (North) Viet Nam news agency, the report said the protest "urged the international commission to take measures in good time to prevent Taylor's arrival in South Viet Nam."

The report, monitored in Tokyo, said "the trip would constitute a most serious violation of the Geneva agreements."

"This American general's mission is to intensify U.S. intervention in South Viet Nam and prepare the way for introducing U.S. troops into that part of Viet Nam," the Communist statement said.

President Kennedy earlier this week ordered Taylor to this Communist-threatened country to consider means of combatting the Red Chinese-supported guerrillas who have been intensifying their attacks on loyal forces.

Ho Chi Minh, goateed Communist boss of North Viet Nam, met with Red China's top leaders in Peiping Thursday night, presumably to discuss U.S. efforts to stem the Communist tide in South Viet Nam.

SAIGON (UPI)—A man who claims he is the world's only "anvil firer" was featured at a dedication today at the \$56 million Trinity dam.

Archie Arbuckle, a 74-year-old feed lot operator, banged off the anvil right on schedule.

It sounds sort of like an old fashioned cannon, a mortar shell, a loud clang and a small nuclear explosion, all rolled into one.

What's the origin of the art? Archie was asked.

"Well, I picked it up from my dad, but I don't know where he got it," said Archie. "I think it's been handed down in the family. Maybe my father brought it over from Scotland."

Archie fired his first anvil in 1908 with the help of his father. That was in Siskiyou County. Later the Arbuckle family moved to Weaverville in Trinity County, and that's still where they live.

"I brought the anvils out again at the end of World War I," said Archie. "And I've been firing them every Fourth of July since. It's a regular custom up here."

Court Upholds Oregon Office

SALEM (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said Thursday that his office has been upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court decision which declined to review a lower court order saying Oregon State penitentiary prisoners are not denied access to court.

The Supreme Court left unchanged a previous decision of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco. The Circuit Court ruling had reversed a Federal District Court injunction holding that penitentiary regulations unconstitutionally deprived the inmates of access to the courts.

Seven convicts at the state penitentiary instituted the original legal action in June of 1958, asking relief in federal District Court under the federal civil rights statutes.

The purpose of the proceedings was to stop the warden from enforcing penitentiary regulations which limited the times and places in which inmates could engage in legal research and preparation of legal papers.

The Circuit Court held that there had been no showing that the regulations denied access to the courts and that in fact access was allowed.

The court cited many previously filed legal actions of the petitioning convicts.

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California Dam Power To Be Marketed Soon

REDDING, Calif. (UPI)—Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall said today the Reclamation Bureau would begin immediate negotiations with public agencies for the marketing of 250,000 kilowatts of electric power from Trinity Dam.

Udall made the statement in a prepared address at the dedication of the dam near here.

He also said negotiations were under way with Pacific Gas and Electric Co. to determine whether additional power, over current capacity of 450,000 kilowatts, could be made available from the Central Valley Project.

The secretary announced further that part of a \$150,000 appropriation for the study of pump-back storage would be used in the Central Valley Project.

"Future power supply is a crucial problem in California," Udall said, "and three or more years of lead time are required by the public marketing agencies for planning purposes."

For that reason, he said, it was "essential" that the marketing of at least 250,000 kilowatts of Trinity power.

Udall said it was possible that 330,000 kilowatts or even more might be available.

"Negotiations are now under way with Pacific Gas and Electric to determine how much additional power, over the current capacity of 450,000 kilowatts, can be made available from the Central Valley Project," he said.

7 Klansmen Get Prison

TALLADEGA, Ala. (UPI)—Seven Ku Klux Klansmen were sentenced to prison terms ranging from two to five years Friday for the night floggings of two men and a woman.

The stiffest sentence went to Thomas J. Graham, convicted of assault with intent to murder. Wilburn Parrish, convicted on a similar charge, and four other Klansmen who pleaded guilty received four-year sentences. A two-year term was given another Klansman who entered a guilty plea.

The so-called "finger man" in the floggings is awaiting trial.

The men were charged with dragging Mr. and Mrs. Marlin White from their home one night last spring, stripping them and beating them with a belt, allegedly for permitting a Negro to discipline their son. The other victim, James N. Guthrie, was beaten at his home.

Despite Nixon's Strong Denials 'President' Talk Goes On

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—Richard M. Nixon is back in politics trailed by the shadow of a long-dead general and some very much alive Republicans and Democrats.

The 48-year-old Republican, who lost the presidency last November by a handful of votes, is a candidate for governor of his home state of California, a state which by mid-summer of 1963 will be the most populous in the nation.

From the very start, Nixon has insisted he should be counted out of the presidential race in 1964 if he is elected governor. In his first news conference after his gubernatorial announcement, reporters pinned him down to his statement that "I shall not be a can-

didate for president in 1964."

"Would you amplify that to mean you would not be the nominee in 1964, because there are many candidates and only one nominee?"

"Well, I will not be the candidate or the nominee," was Nixon's reply. "That is correct. You can't be nominated without being a candidate."

Doesn't Close Door

Despite the seeming finality of that statement, many Democrats and some high-ranking Republicans say it falls short of the classic statement of Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman back in 1884 that "if nominated, I will not accept and will not serve if elected."

Satellite Still Talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—Explorer VII is still plowing through space, chattering away as if nothing had gone wrong.

The U.S. satellite two years old Friday, is still radioing back information to scientists at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration by its solar-powered radio.

An automatic cutoff device that was supposed to shut off the transmitter a year ago failed. Consequently, Explorer VII is still faithfully reporting on its journey through space, although the information is largely repetition now.

Scientists now tune in on only two of the satellite's five pass-a-week.

Now that the 91½ pound space vehicle has done its job, NASA officials wish it would shut up, so they could use the 19.904 megacycle frequency for some other space vehicle.

But they say the only thing that will clear the frequency is for the transmitter to wear out or for the satellite itself to be damaged or destroyed, possibly by colliding with a meteor. Otherwise, the satellite has a life expectancy of about 20 years.

The satellite is whirling around an orbit of 340 to 670 miles from the earth at more than 17,000 miles an hour.

Nixon's own party, Rep. William E. Miller, said he feels Nixon would "have to succumb to a draft" in 1964 if the GOP convention delegates want him and polls showed he could win.

Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown, who is expected to be his party's standard-bearer in the state elections again in 1962, already is dusting off the same phrase he used so effectively in beating Sen. William F. Knowland for the governorship in 1958.

"Nixon wants to use the statehouse as a stepping stone to the White House," Brown insists. "There is no question that Nixon will succumb to a Republican draft for president in 1964. And I think he will go further and generate a draft of his own."

Other Obstacles

Nixon faces a number of other obstacles next year in his climb back up the political ladder, not the least of which is strong opposition from within his own party for the GOP gubernatorial nomination in the June, 1962, primary.

Already in the race is 64-year-old former Gov. Goodwin J. Knight, a seasoned campaigner and a man who feels Nixon and Knowland bumped him out of the governor's office in 1953 and forced him into an unsuccessful bid for a U.S. Senate seat.

Knight served notice that he intends to wage an all-out campaign against Nixon when he charged earlier this month that

Nixon sent an emissary to Knight offering him "any job you want" if Knight would get out of the race.

The alleged emissary, Los Angeles financier J. Howard Edgeron, and Nixon both denied the charge and Nixon's former campaign manager, Robert Finch, came back with the statement that Knight himself tried to keep Nixon out of the gubernatorial race by offering to deliver the state GOP presidential convention delegation to Nixon in 1964.

Thus far, with 13 months yet to go before the winner is decided by the state's 4.3 million Democrats and 3 million Republicans, Nixon and Knight have been too busy hanging away at each other to take on Brown.
