

U.S. Demands Soviets End Reckless Shooting

BERLIN (AP)—The U.S. command has put it squarely up to the Soviets to halt "the reckless" shooting by East German police along the East-West Berlin border.

An American spokesman said Gen. Albert Watson II, chief of U.S. forces in Berlin, personally protested Friday to the Soviet commandant, Col. A. I. Solov'yev, at East Berlin headquarters.

The United States and other Western allies do not recognize the East German Communist regime, regarding it as a Soviet puppet.

The U.S. protest came only a few hours after East German border guards peppered the American sector with machinegun and rifle fire. U.S. military and West Berlin police held their fire. There were no reports of casualties.

Watson "warned against the consequences of the reckless and illegal conduct" of the East German police, the spokesman said.

"Gen. Watson also protested to the Soviets about other flagrant incidents which recently affected the peace and security of the American sector," he added.

The early morning shooting from the Communist sector came as nine refugees broke through a barbed wire fence to West Berlin in a truck. All scrambled out and raced to safety in a hail of bullets fired by East German border guards.

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Diplomats To Attempt Agreement On Berlin

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senior diplomats of the United States, Britain, France and West Germany will try next week in London to develop some counterproposals to the Soviet Union's demands on the Western powers in connection with the Berlin crisis.

Diplomatic informants said today that exploratory talks with the Soviet government on possible Berlin negotiations have gone about as far as they can until the Western allies decide their own future policy lines.

Such decisions are expected to cover the future status of West Berlin, the issue of nuclear arms in Germany, the possible development of low-level relations between East and West Germany, German reunification and other questions that have arisen in the course of U.S.-Soviet talks on Berlin.

Assistant Secretary of State Foy D. Kohler is scheduled to be the chief U.S. representative in the policy talks, expected to begin in midweek. He is the State Department's top expert on German affairs.

Sir Evelyn Shuckburgh, deputy undersecretary in the Foreign Office, will represent Britain; Karl Castens, state secretary in the Foreign Ministry at Bonn, will speak for West Germany; and Jean Lalois, director of European affairs in the French Foreign Office, will speak for France.

The allied diplomats will be in session during the Communist party meeting in Moscow, which begins Tuesday, and they are expected to be able to make a quick

evaluation of any pronouncements on Berlin that Soviet Premier Khrushchev may make to the Moscow meeting.

High officials in the State Department and the White House attach considerable importance to Khrushchev's expected statement. These officials think it may give new clues to Khrushchev's thinking.

U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson, who has been conferring here with Kennedy and Rusk, Secretary of State Dean is due to return to Moscow sometime next week. He has instructions to resume exploratory talks with Soviet leaders in the near future.

States Get Sewer Cash

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Public Health Service announced Saturday federal grant allotments to the states for a year ending next June 30 to help finance sewage disposal facilities.

The allotments total \$80 million under a law passed this year. For the last five years Congress authorized \$50 million yearly.

Under the new law, the total will increase to \$90 million for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1963, and be \$100 million annually for the following four years.

Surgeon General Luther L. Terry said federal grants of \$225 million actually were made during the past five years, or \$25 million less than authorized.

Child Care Agencies Aided By United Fund

Corrective surgery is one of the most pressing needs of children coming under the care of Oregon's private child care agencies, according to a statement released today by Elda Russell, executive director of Albertina Kerr Homes, Inc. in Portland. Albertina Kerr Homes is supported, in part, by the local Klamath County United Fund.

Citing the case of a girl who graduated from an Oregon high school in June of this year, Miss Russell stated that Becky came under the care of Albertina Kerr Nursery 17 years ago when she was brought to the nursery in the arms of a policeman. Only three days old at the time, Becky had been deserted in a Portland tavern.

Becky was one of the many children born with a cleft palate, she had no valves in her throat and could make no sound whatever, could not even cry. Altogether, Becky had nine separate operations. After the corrective surgery she was adopted through the agency by a fine family. Today she speaks well, sings and is an accomplished pianist, plays the pipe organ and the marimba.

This year she was awarded two scholarships, one for her scholastic standing, the other for her music.

Employed now as a supervisor of children at the same nursery where she received such long and successful care, Becky will be entering college this fall. Today she is a healthy, attractive, polite and talented young lady.

A total of seven children from Klamath County were given care by Albertina Kerr Homes in 1960. Gifts to United Fund help to support such work.

Mrs. Kitchin was riding with her husband, James, 21, who suffered undetermined injuries. A total of five vehicles was involved.

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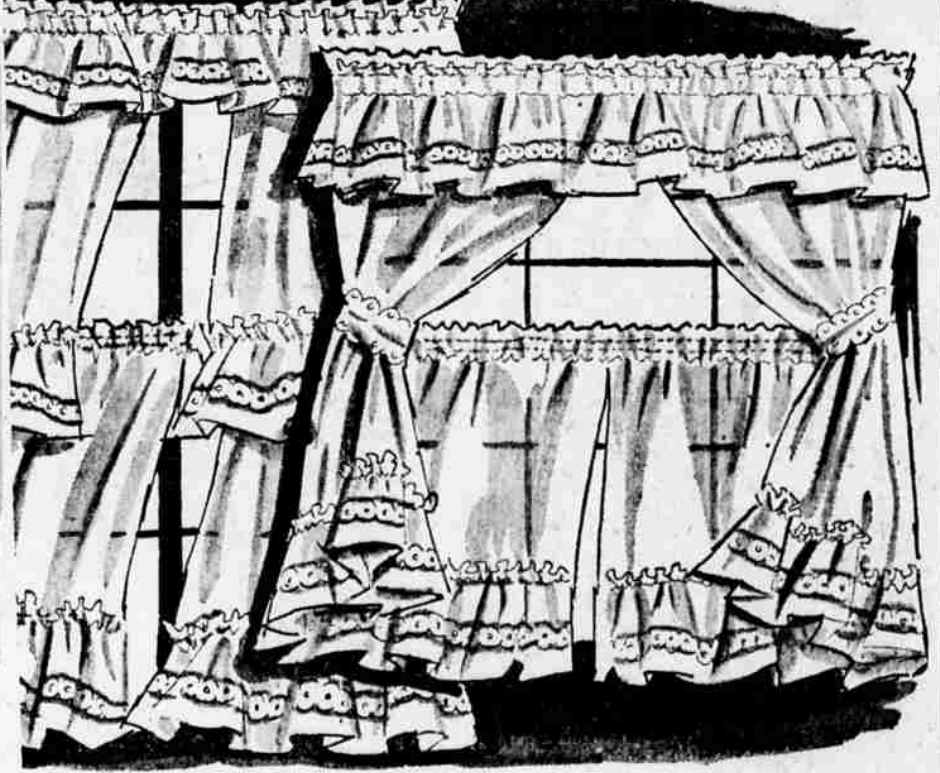
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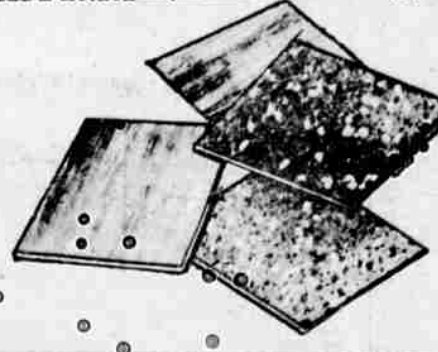


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
