

Sugar Ray To Start 3rd Comeback

GREENWOOD LAKE, N.Y. (AP)—At 41 Sugar Ray Robinson is right back where he started more than two decades ago—at the bottom of the middleweight ladder.

But, he said today, he intends to do something about it Saturday night when his current comeback campaign—his third—rolls into high gear with a scheduled 10-round bout against young Denny Moyer in Madison Square Garden.

"I'm back shooting for the middleweight championship again," chirped the irrepressible Sugar Ray as he prepared to break up his training camp here. "I'm a prizefighter, and at this stage in the game I've got to prove it all over again. As soon as I win, everyone will be back on my side."

Robinson has won the middleweight crown an astounding five times. He last lost the title to Gene Fullmer on March 4 of this year. He didn't fight again until Sept. 25, when he outpointed Willie Greaves. That started comeback campaign No. 3.

"After this, I'd like to fight either Fullmer (NBA champion) or Paul Pender (New York-Massachusetts-Europe champion). I know Fullmer is interested in meeting me again. A lot of promoters are interested in me."

What if he loses to Moyer, 19 years his junior, and who has been fighting middleweights only six months or so?

"I only think positively," he replied blandly. "The way I look at it, I've never been a failure. The next time I'm a failure will be the first time."

He acknowledged he never has seen Moyer fight.

With all his double-talk and fast answers, Robinson is worried that he will have to take his place in a long line to get another title fight.

"If I have to wait too long," he observed seriously, "I'll have to make a decision whether to quit for good."

TOP AHL SCORERS

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Springfield Indians, picking up where they left off last year, boasted the top scorers in the American Hockey League after the opening week's play.

Floyd Smith and Brian Kilrea were tied for first with seven points each. Smith, who scored the league's only "hat trick," leads the AHL in goals with four and has three assists. Kilrea has two goals and is tied for the league lead with five assists.

SF Giants Wearing New Look, Swaps Net Estimated 450 G's

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The San Francisco Giants took on a new look today—with an 18-man player shift in the wake of the National League draft that saw them lose five others.

The big name gone from the staff this time is Billy Loes, the eccentric right-hander who was peddled to the New York Mets for an estimated \$25,000.

Adding that to the \$125,000 obtained from Houston for infielder Joey Amalfitano, and \$75,000 each for pitchers Sam Jones, Ray Davila, and Catcher Hobie Landri, from the New York Mets, the Giants took in an estimated \$450,000 during the past 10 days.

And that's faster than the turnstiles click at Candlestick Park.

Hot Prospects

The new look next spring will include some of the finest young prospects from the minor leagues in the country.

Heading the cast is Gayle Perry, 23-year-old right-handed pitcher from the championship Tacoma team of the Pacific Coast league.

Perry, who stands 6-4 and weighs 205 pounds, won 18 and lost 8. He led the PCL in the earned-run average with 2.44. He is rated by all scouts as an outstanding prospect.

Going clear down to the end of the list there is Joe Cardenal, a 19-year-old outfielder from El Paso of the Class D Sophomore league, who will try to make the big jump to the majors.

Cardenal, a Cuban, broke into organized baseball by hitting .355 in 128 games, including 35 homers, 7 triples and 39 doubles. He scored 159 runs and had 108 runs batted in. Additionally, he stole 64 bases.

Old Faces Gone

The Giants sold pitchers Dom Zanni and Don Choate, catcher Cecil Hundley and outfielder John Weekly to Tacoma. And they peddled pitcher Dick Denton to Springfield of the Eastern league.

The rest of the new talent obtained included:

Outfielder Bob Perry, right-handed hitter from Tacoma, where he clouted .290 in 144 games, including 21 homers.

Pitcher Verle Tiefenthaler (14-6), a relief ace from Tacoma.

Outfielder Manuel Mota, who hit .291 at Tacoma. He's a fast lead-off man.

One youngster who'll get a long look is Hal Lanier, a first-year man who played for Quincy of the Midwest league last season. Hal is the son of Max Lanier, former St. Louis Cardinal pitching star. He batted .315 playing shortstop.

Others obtained include outfielder Jose Tartabull, Victoria of the Texas League; infielder Dick Phillips, Tacoma; pitcher Dan Rivas, Victoria; pitcher Roger Sinner, Springfield; pitcher Paul Colacoechi, and Pitcher Matt Gayeski, both from Quincy of the Midwest League.

Cleveland Misfortunes Continuing

CLEVELAND (AP)—"Ever since the opening game in Detroit when Gene Hickerson broke a leg, our boys have had nothing but bad luck."

That was the reaction from Coach Paul E. Brown when he learned Monday that the Cleveland Browns' powerful one-two running combination, Halfback Bobby Mitchell has been called to active duty.

Mitchell and fullback Jim Brown make one of the most fearsome running duos in the National Football League. Bobby, always considered a scoring threat because of his great speed and elusiveness, just a week ago against Washington had scoring runs of 61 and 31 yards and caught a 52-yard touchdown pass.

The fleet ex-Illinois back is to report to Fort Meade, Md., Nov. 2, which would make him available for only two more games—next Sunday at Pittsburgh and the following Sunday at St. Louis.

However, an Army representative said some 90-day deferments have been granted "for personal or community hardship." That was the case with Baltimore passer Lamar McHan, who was deferred until the end of the football season.

Leg Injury Stops Star Beaver End

CORVALLIS (AP)—Oregon State will meet Arizona State Saturday without its standout end, Roger Johnson.

Trainer Bill Robertson said Monday a leg injury suffered in the team's 23-20 loss to Wisconsin last weekend will keep Johnson from playing.

Johnson is quarterback Terry Baker's favorite passing target. He caught two touchdown aerials against Wisconsin and was the team's defensive star.

Halfback LeRoy Whittle also was injured but may be able to play at least part of the Arizona State contest.

'PK' Patient With Zimmer Won't Explain

CHICAGO (AP)—P.K. Wrigley, president of the Chicago Cubs and center of controversy over his multiple coaching system, still says "he who explains is lost."

Making little effort to explain the complex system, Wrigley patiently commented on remarks made against his roving coaches by Don Zimmer, former Cub infielder who doubled as team captain before being claimed by the New York Mets last week in the National League player draft.

Zimmer rapped the multiple coach setup in a first person article appearing in the St. Petersburg, Fla., Times and claimed the system was the big reason for Chicago's seventh place finish.

Zimmer said he felt sorry for his ex-teammates who have to play under the system next year and said the roving coaches were baffling Ron Santo, a fine, young third baseman.

Wrigley said Zimmer was one of those persons who has trouble making up his mind.

"When we first announced the system," said Wrigley, "Zimmer was against it. Then in spring training he changed his mind and thought it was great. Because of his enthusiasm we made him team captain. As the season went on, Zimmer switched over again."

Barnes' Run Focal Point For Rhubarb

NEW YORK (UPI)—How far did Erich Barnes run last Sunday?

That's the title of the National Football League's "Movie of the Week" following the controversy over the New York Giant's run-back of an interception against the Dallas Cowboys.

The official scorer at the Cotton Bowl listed the touchdown run as 101 yards and the Cowboys said their films of the game agree with him. But the Giants contend their Cinemascope (wide-angle) cameras, the same used by the Cowboys, showed Barnes running 102 yards.

Why squabble over one yard? Well, the NFL record of a 102-yard return of an interception set by Bob Smith of Detroit in 1949, could be tied by Barnes if the Giants are right.

In order to settle the matter, league officials will review both sets of films later this week and make a decision.

How does Barnes feel about the controversy?

"I was too busy avoiding going out of bounds to notice how far I was behind the goal line," the Giants' defensive halfback said.

UCLA Back 'Big Five' Rush Leader

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Bobby Smith, UCLA tailback and jack of all trades, added the individual rushing leadership to his dominance of Big Five individual statistics as the result of play last week.

Smith replaced Southern California's Willie Brown, who sat out the Notre Dame game, with a net rushing yardage of 329 off 77 carries for a 4.2 average. Brown dropped to second with 282 yards in 38 carries, an 8.1 average.

Teh UCLA flash continued his leadership in scoring—37 points on five touchdowns, one field goal, one two-point conversion and two one-point kicks and in punting. Actually, Smith has punted only once for 50 yards, while his UCLA teammate Keith Jensen, in second place, has booted 17 times for a 41.4 average.

Of the remaining three departments, quarterback Bill Nelsen of USC heads two of them and is second in scoring with three TD's and 18 points.

Nelsen is top man in total offense with 338 yards gained, 32 on the ground and 326 through the air, the latter also constituting the most aerial yards thrown by anybody in the conference.

Smith is second in total offense with 381 yards, while Stanford quarterback Rod Sears trails Nelsen in passing with 158 yards. Nelsen has thrown 28 completions for three touchdowns, and Sears has 16 passes, good for one TD.

End George Honore of Stanford leads in passes received. He's caught 14 for 139 yards. Brown is second with nine catches and 127 yards.

Vandals Prep For Cadets

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—The Vandals of Idaho began work Monday on what they hope will help them in next Saturday's football game against Army.

Coach Skip Stahley had his charges running pass plays against a dummy Army defense for a half hour. Then he sent the Vandals through an hour of defensive work.

Idaho came through its defeat by Washington State last Saturday without injuries, but the five walking-wounded already on hand probably won't be able to make the trip Thursday to West Point, Stahley said.

Those who probably will have to keep the home fires burning are linemen Dick Monahan and John Hanson, end Bob Ruby and quarterback Gary Mires. There's a chance halfback Wade Thomas may be in shape for the game.

Houston Pass Ace Records AFL Standard

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Jack Lee got his second chance as a starter last week and he took full advantage of it—he passed 41 times against Boston and connected on 27 for an amazing 457 yards as Houston and Boston played a 31-31 tie.

It was a league record and shot Lee from ninth place to second in American Football League passing.

Jack Kemp of San Diego still leads with 50½ efficiency points to 48½ for Lee under the six-point system that decides the passing title in the AFL. Kemp has thrown 157 times and completed 73 for 1156 yards.

Ken Lowe of San Diego continues to lead the rushers. He worked a better margin into his lead by gaining 58 yards against New York while second-lace Jack Spikes of Dallas managed only 11 against Buffalo. Lowe has gained 412 yards on 93 runs. Spikes 337 on 35.

Missouri U Cage Coach Leaves Post

COLUMBIA, Mo. (UPI)—Wilbur N. (Sparky) Stalcup, whose name had become synonymous with University of Missouri basketball during the past 15 years, announced his resignation as coach Monday to accept the position as the school's assistant director of athletics.

Stalcup, who made the announcement at a meeting of his squad said he will coach the coming season but give up his position on the bench in March to devote all his time to the new duties.

"The opportunity to move up to administrative work was offered me," Stalcup said, "and I could not turn it down, even though it was one of the most difficult decisions of my life."

As assistant athletic director, Stalcup will work under another former Missouri coach, Don Faurot, who gave up his job as Missouri football coach in 1956 but stayed on as director of athletics.

Brave Boss To Emphasize Development

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Manager Birdie Tebbetts said today "lack of competition" had hurt the Milwaukee Braves the past two years, and cited the case of pitcher Joey Jay as a player who wasn't used enough.

Jay, traded to the pennant-winning Cincinnati Reds last December, won 21 games for his new team last season, and was cited by UPI for a "comeback of the year."

It's possible Jay might still be with Milwaukee if he'd been given a chance to pitch, Tebbetts said.

"You learn by mistakes, and I'm not going to make the error of having three men start something like 100 games in a season. That leaves 54 games for seven others."

Youngsters To Get Chance

"There's not much chance for development in a situation like that," Tebbetts said. He apparently was referring to the 1959 season when, under former manager Fred Haney, Warren Spahn, Lew Burdette and Bob Buhl, the Braves "big three," started 100 games. Jay opened 19 games.

Tebbetts said young pitchers like Tony Cloninger, Bob Hendley, Bob Nottebart and Ron Piche, will be given a greater chance for starting jobs in 1962.

In fact, the whole atmosphere of 1962 spring drills will be one of competition, Tebbetts said.

Promoting Competition

"We've got competition at the catching spot right now between Joe Torre and Del Crandall. We'll try to get some in other places," he said. "This doesn't mean we're trying to bench fellows like Aaron and Mathews, but if we have a young, outstanding player, we're going to give him a chance."

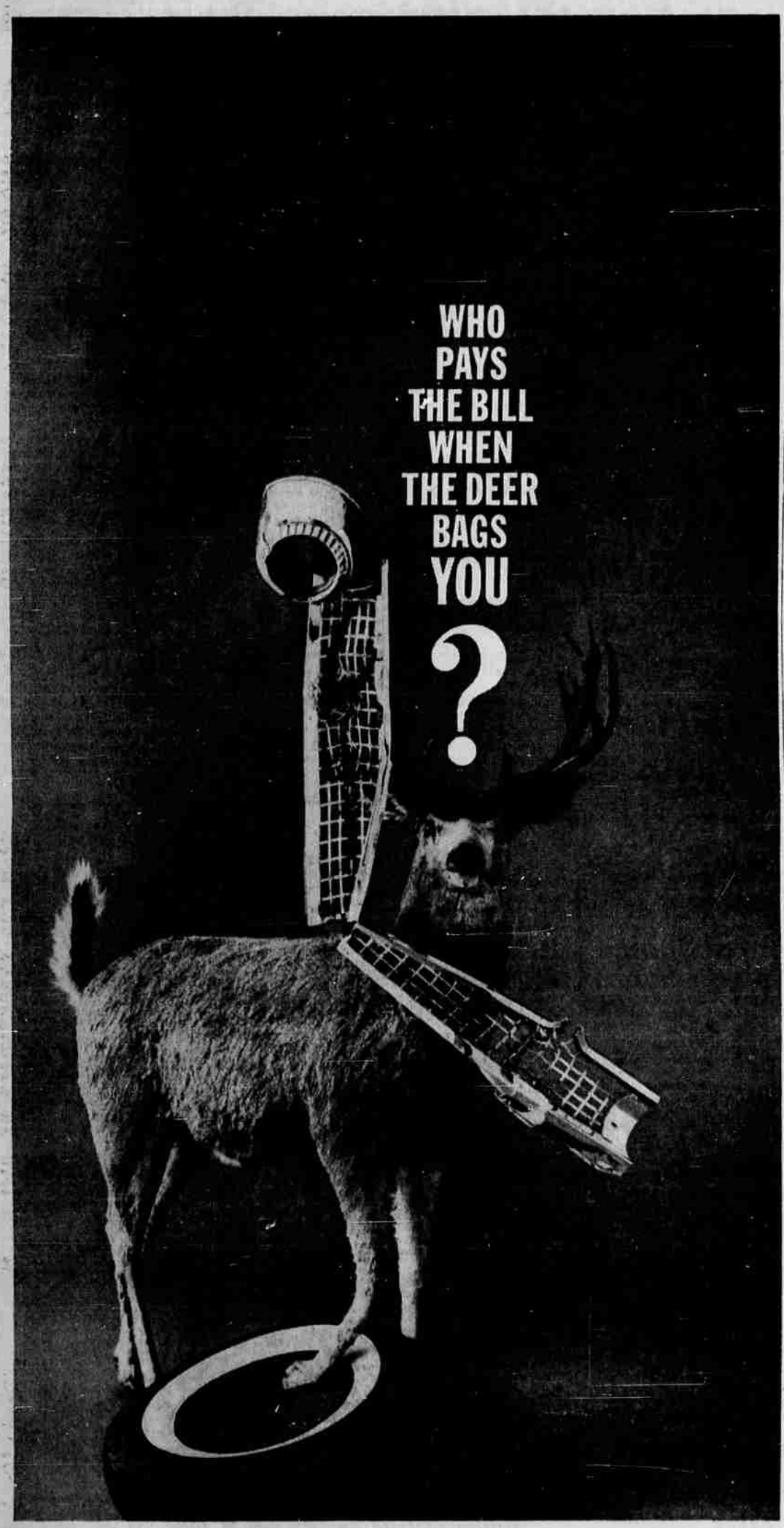
General Manager and President John McHale has called this "revitalization." Many have felt the Braves have had the best personnel in the league the past two seasons, and should have been red-hot pennant contenders.

Tebbetts said the Braves will be seeking a "blending" of old and new players next spring to "effect a balance" the club hasn't had the past two years.
