KU Eleven Now Seventh In AP Poll

Beaverton and Roseburg moved into the top spots in the Associated Press' Oregon high school football poll this week and Modoc dropped from No. 1 to third after a 7-6 loss to Klamath Falls.

Beaverton, an 18-4 victor over Clackamas, drew 10 first place votes from the 16 sportswriters and broadcasters who took part in the poll. Roseburg, after edging strong North Salem 13-7, was voted No. 1 by five. The 16th first-place vote favored Marshfield, which continued its comeback after a late start by beating Thurston of Springfield.

Beaverton was No. 2 and Roseburg No. 4 last week.

North Salem dropped to fourth place from No. 3.

Benson of Portland, tied by Madison 0-0, was forced to yield a share of its No. 5 ranking of last week with Pendleton, which defeated Redmond, 20-6. Pendleton was sixth last week.

The surprise Klamath victory moved it into No. 7 spot. Marshfield slipped a notch to eighth and Grants Pass, a 6-0 victor over Ashland, fell one to No. 9. North Bend moved into tenth place with a 19-14 triumph over North Eugene.

Jefferson of Portland fell from the top ten despite a 20-13 defeat of Franklin.

Top games this week include Roseburg at Marshfield and Pendleton at Bend, both of which will have strong bearing on league title races.

Machen Hammers London

LONDON (AP) — America's Eddie Machen flies home today after a victory that could bring him closer to a shot at Floyd Patterson's world heavyweight boxing championship.

The victim was Britain's Brian London, who was outclassed by Machen in five one-sided rounds Tuesday night and retired from the scheduled 10-round omnibombing his nose felt like it was broken.

"Now I want a fight with Henry Cooper (British champion) to decide who is the No. 1 contender for the world title," the unmarked Machen told reporters after his light exercise in London's indoor Wembley Stadium.

"I am willing to fight Cooper anytime and anywhere. If some body can arrange the fight, I'll be there."

British promoter Jack Solomons has been negotiating for months to match Cooper against Patterson. Some reports say Patterson may defend his title sometime next year against Cooper, who is in a class by himself among British heavyweights.

London, 27-year-old former British champion who is no longer ranked among the world's top ten, set himself up as a punching bag for the 29-year-old Negro from Redding, Calif.

Audit Shows OSU Athletics In Red

The athletic department at Oregon State University had a deficit of \$87,630 for the 1960-61 year, according to a bookkeeping report released Tuesday by the school.

OSU's athletic department spent \$642,495 for the year and took in only \$54,864, according to the report, by the Corvallis firm of Olsen and Tamus. The school hires an accounting firm for regular bookkeeping reports such as this one.

The deficit will be made up out of reserve funds, said R. S. "Spec" Keene, OSU athletic director. "No taxpayers money will be involved in this deficit," he said.

Keene, visiting in Phoenix, Ariz., did not comment on the actual totals. "The Oregon State Intercollegiate Athletic Department is a corporation and as a member, I'm not authorized to give out any statement," he said. "However, I would have to agree that it financially was one of our worst years."

The Secretary of State Audit Division will conduct a thorough check of the figures later to make the total official. Published reports of the audit division for previous years showed deficits in the school's athletic department for 1958-59 and 1959-60, but they were not nearly as large.

Keene said there were several possible reasons for the athletic department running in the red. "That includes \$35,000 in improvements we made last year — the new track, new bleachers, things like that," he said.

In addition, he said, "we receive approximately \$2 less per student per quarter from student fees than the University of Oregon."

Leo Harris, athletic director for Oregon, wouldn't comment on the fee situation, but he said, "We haven't released our budget figures as yet, but we've never held them back, and I can assure you we will show a profit."

In the audit division reports, Oregon's athletic department has shown a surplus from 1955 through 1960. Oregon State showed an \$8,718 deficit in 1959-60 and a \$5,022 loss in 1958-59.

The three years before that, it had surpluses of \$58,195, \$97,267 and \$78,222.

The biggest loss for 1960-61, came in track, according to the bookkeeping report. The track revenue was \$16,095 and expenses were \$51,273 for a \$35,177 deficit. The report showed that basketball lost \$29,092 and football \$20,820 during the last year.

The athletic program will not be revamped because of the deficit, Keene said. "We will hold our program where it is and make every effort to get more revenue," he said.

US Defense Department Build-Up Tearing Down Packer Title Hopes

Uncle Sam Puts Arm On Green Bay's Hornung, Nitschke

Football stars Paul Hornung and Ray Nitschke, both of the powerful Green Bay Packers, and baseball player George Thomas have been added to the growing list of professional athletes recalled to active duty in the Defense Department build-up.

The over-all list, a check revealed today, now totals nearly a score, and indications are many more are still to come.

None of the call-ups, however, hit with the force of the announcement Tuesday that the Packers, defending Western Division champions of the National Football League, probably will be without halfback Hornung and linebacker Nitschke for the second half of the season. Their loss could cost the Packers of Vince Lombardi a chance to repeat as Western champions. Green Bay shares first place now with San Francisco.

Hornung, 25, a former star quarterback at Notre Dame, has won the NFL scoring championship the last two seasons and so far in front this season with 77 points in five games, including a 33-point spurge against Baltimore Oct. 8. Probably the most versatile back in pro football, Hornung is an ace runner, good passer, and is Green Bay's field goal, conversion and kickoff expert.

Nitschke, 24, former Illinois fullback, became a regular with the Packers last season and has been a standout on the defensive platoon this year. The Packer defense has permitted only 51 points — fewest in the 14-team league.

Hornung, who is single, has been ordered by 14th Army Corps headquarters to report to Ft. Riley, Kan., Oct. 30. Nitschke's orders direct him to report to Ft. Lewis, Wash., Nov. 2. The Cleveland Browns' halfback Bobby Mitchell, another former Illinois player, was recalled to active duty Monday, effective Nov. 2.

In addition to Hornung, Nitschke and Mitchell, NFL players affected by call-ups so far include tackle Dick Schafrath of the Cleveland Browns, defensive tackle Lou Cordileone and guard Mike Magac of the San Francisco 49ers, end Taz Anderson, guard Bob DeMarco and tackle Ernie McMillan of the St. Louis Cardinals, quarterback Lamar McHan of Baltimore, and defensive back Tom Frankhauser of the Dallas Cowboys.

In the American Football League, the players affected include quarterback Jack Kemp and tackle Ron Mix of the undefeated in the 14-team league.

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Negro Cagers Due Apology By Hotelman

LEXINGTON, Ky. (UPI) — The management of the Phoenix Hotel, scene of a racial incident involving players of the Boston Celtics and the St. Louis Hawks Tuesday night, said today the entire matter was one of misunderstanding.

Art Lang, resident manager of the hotel, said he had instructed all personnel to serve all the players of the two teams who were staying at the hotel. He said he had and would apologize to the teams and to the players themselves.

Five Negro players on the Celtics and two on the St. Louis Hawks pro basketball teams left town an hour before a scheduled exhibition game Tuesday night after they were refused service in the coffee shop of the hotel.

The game was played anyway, with all-white players, and the Hawks defeated the Celtics, 128-103, before 9,000 fans.

The players who caught a plane after the incident were Bill Russell, K. C. Jones, Tom Sanders, Sam Jones and Al Butler of the Celtics and Woodie Sauldsberry and Cleo Hill of the Hawks.

McNeeley Can Duck Return Says NBA

TACOMA (AP) — As far as the National Boxing Association is concerned, Tom McNeeley would not be bound by the return bout clause in his heavyweight title fight contract with Floyd Patterson.

"If he wanted to duck out on the rematch clause, we would not suspend him," Dr. Charles P. Larson said Tuesday. Larson, a Tacoma pathologist, is president of the NBA.

Patterson, the champion, has signed to meet McNeeley, an Arlington, Mass., fighter, in Toronto Dec. 4. The contract provides that if McNeeley wins he must offer Patterson a rematch.

Larson said the McNeeley fight would be recognized as a world's championship heavyweight match, but would not relieve Patterson of his obligation to meet the number one challenger by March 13.

The top challenger at present is Henry Cooper of England. NBA rules require the champion to meet the number one challenger at least once a year.

The NBA president said the object was to avoid having a series of rematches of the same opponents, as in the case of Patterson and Swedish fighter Ingemar Johansson.

As for the requirement that Patterson meet the top-rated challenger by the March 13 deadline, Larson declared:

"If there is a legitimate number one man, we are going to insist that the champion defend against him at least once a year."

If Patterson does not do so, he said, the NBA will declare the title vacant. The NBA would then arrange a match or series of matches among top contenders to pick a champion.

SF Rookie Glamor-Boy Among Pros

NEW YORK (AP) — Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung of Green Bay and Milt Plum of the Cleveland Browns held their places atop the National Football League's principal offense tabulations last week. But the glamor boy of ground-gaining was rookie Bill Kilmer of the San Francisco 49ers.

Kilmer, national college leader in total offense last season and most valuable player in the All-Star game at Chicago last summer, found himself as a pro runner when he was installed as one of the three rotating quarterbacks in San Francisco's shotgun offense.

In his last three games, Kilmer has run for 334 yards and scored eight touchdowns. Latest NFL individual offense figures show him as the No. 4 rusher with 356 yards on 59 carries and tied with Baltimore's Lenny Moore for second in scoring with 48 points. He also has completed 11 of 22 passes for 172 yards.

Green Bay's Taylor also scored four touchdowns in the Packers' rout of Cleveland and ran for 153 yards to improve his lead over Jimmy Brown of the Browns. Taylor has gained 518 yards in 81 attempts for a 6.4 yard average. Hornung picked up 13 points on a touchdown and seven conversions to run his point total to 77.

Plum, who took the passing lead the week before, maintained it in the intricate NFL computations by completing 17 of 26 for 193 yards.
