

Henley, Phoenix To Clash

The Henley Hornets could be involved in an "out of the frying pan into the fire" situation this weekend. They'll come to blows with the Phoenix Pirates in a Rogue League football battle on the Phoenix home grounds Friday night at 8 o'clock.

And, according to the dope-sheets, Phoenix figures to be even tougher than the St. Mary's Crusaders who measured the Hornets 25-6 last Saturday night.

For the Pirates, 6-1 for the overall season, the Hornet invasion is their final Rogue League of the season. Their only loss to date was a 13-0 decision dealt them by the Ashland Grizzlies.

In other RR action slated Illinois Valley and Rogue River travel while St. Mary's is to be tested at Eagle Point.

Henley has a problem involving the charley-horsed thigh of halfback Dick Reeling, but they have an even bigger one in trying to figure out the way to stop the onslaughts of Pirate All-State fullback Mike Construk. Construk, a 190-pounder, likes the middle or off-tackle slants, so the Hornet defensive line has its work cut for it.

The Hornets will appear on their home grounds next weekend when they host Eagle Point in a league wrapup.

Yellow Jack Guard Earns Line Honors

Dave Watson, a guard, played the best game of his college football career at Georgia Tech against Duke last Saturday. Today he was named the lineman of the week by The Associated Press as a reward for his sterling play that played a major part in knocking Duke from the unbeaten list.

It was the 14th consecutive game Watson, a 211-pound junior from Eufaula, Ala., started for the Yellow Jackets, and he can be proud to put the clippings of it in his scrapbook.

Bobby Dodd, Georgia Tech coach, backed up the sports writers and broadcasters who picked Watson in the weekly AP poll.

"He played his greatest game for Tech," Dodd said. "He made a lot of tackles and his recovery of a fumble led to our third touchdown (in a 21-0 victory) over a fine Duke team."

Films of the game showed Watson making 10 solo tackles and numerous assists. He was graded by the Tech coaches as 90 per cent in blocking, a rare performance. Even more rare, he received a perfect mark on defense. He broke through and threw Duke backs for losses to halt the Blue Devils on the only two occasions they reached Tech territory.

Pat Holmes, Texas Tech guard, drew high praise for his performance against Texas Christian. He made tackles all over the field.

"He stopped their fullback all night," said Tech Coach, J. T. King. TCU never got beyond Tech's 48-yard-line.

Others nominated for the line-man honor included:

Al Swenson, Princeton center, who intercepted a pass on the goal line in the final seconds to save Princeton's 9-3 victory over Pennsylvania; Bob Richards, Louisiana State tackle, who set up two touchdowns by recovering South Carolina fumbles; Gary Collins, Maryland end and last week's lineman, who again played a hangup game in a losing cause against North Carolina; and Ken Byers, Cincinnati tackle, for his tremendous blocking and defensive play against the Air Force.

Mich St. Boss Earns Week Honor

Shorter Season, Fewer Ducks Face '61 Waterfowl Hunters

Continuing drought conditions in the northern nesting areas means that hunters are faced with both a shorter shooting season and fewer ducks when the waterfowl season opens Saturday, Oct. 21, at noon.

The open season will continue through Jan. 3, 1962. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset daily, except for opening day when they will run from noon until sunset.

According to all reports geese should appear in approximately the same numbers as last year.

Canvasbacks and Redheads have been especially hard hit by the lack of water on their nesting grounds this year so the closed season on these two species will be continued through the 61-62 season.

Hunters are urged to use extreme caution when hunting in areas where these birds may be found. Normally they will be found on rivers, sloughs and open waters and it is suggested that those hunters unable to identify waterfowl readily hunt in fields or other places where they are not concentrated.

A great deal of publicity has been given these birds over the past year and a pamphlet entitled "Know Your Ducks" has been prepared by the U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. It is available at nearly all sporting goods stores and license vendors. Waterfowl regulations for 1961-62 are available at post offices this year upon the purchase of waterfowl stamps, a limited

Mountaineers' Colt Sharp-Shoots Win

"Have Gun Will Travel." This is the slogan of West Virginia's renovated football Mountaineers today.

The gun? He's Fred (Colt. 45) Colvard, the sharpshooting sophomore quarterback who has sent West Virginia traveling the victory path that eluded them from the sixth game of the 1959 season, until the fourth game this year—19 games in all.

Then all of a sudden, Colvard sent West Virginia winging 28-0 against Virginia Tech and last week led the Mountaineers to a 20-6 upset victory over Pitt.

"In our system Colvard will be running more," Coach Gene Corum said in September. "Colvard is considered our best runner and that talent is suited to the wing-T so there is no use wasting it."

But the fastest gun on West Virginia's football field took his lumps last week against the bruising Pitt line, sustaining a cut under his left eye that took eight

supply of these regulations will also be available at sporting goods stores.

The daily bag limit on waterfowl is four and the possession limit eight. The bag and possession limit may not include more than one wood duck or one Hooded Merganser. In addition to the limits on other ducks the daily bag limit on American and Red Breasted Mergansers is five and the possession limit ten.

The daily bag limit on geese remains at six provided that not more than three are of the dark species. The possession limit on geese is six.

In the counties of Baker, Gilliam, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallawa, and Wasco, in addition to other bag and possession limits on ducks, an additional two Mallard ducks are allowed in the daily bag and an additional four Mallard ducks are allowed in the possession limit.

Following are the restrictions applicable to possession, as detailed by the 1961-62 Federal Waterfowl Regulations:

Transportation and Importation
Section 10.6 — Transportation into, within or out of any state: If migratory game birds, except mourning and white-winged doves, are dressed, the head, head plume, and feet must remain attached in such manner as to permit identification of their species while being transported between the place where taken and the personal abode of the possessor or between the place where taken and a commercial preservation facility.

Any package or container in which such birds are transported shall have the name and address of the shipper and of the consignee and an accurate statement of the numbers and kinds of birds contained therein clearly and conspicuously marked on the outside thereof.

Section 10.9 — Possession for purposes of processing, transportation or storage: No person, other than the person who has lawfully taken such birds, shall receive, possess, or have in custody migratory game birds for cleaning, processing, shipping, or for transportation or storage (including temporary storage) unless such birds have a tag attached signed by the hunter stating his address, the total number and kinds of birds, and the date killed.

Section 10.10 — Termination of possession by hunters: For the purpose of this part, the possession of birds legally taken by any hunter shall be deemed to have ceased when such birds have been delivered by him to a post office, a common carrier, or a commercial cold storage or locker plant, for transportation by common carrier to some person other than the hunter.

Section 10.11 — Wounded live migratory birds: Every migratory game bird wounded by hunting and reduced to possession by the hunter shall be immediately killed and become a part of the daily bag limit.

Section 10.14 — Wanton waste of migratory game birds: No person shall kill any migratory game bird pursuant to this part without making a reasonable effort to retrieve the bird and include it in his daily bag limit.

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Lakeview Honkers Improved

LAKEVIEW (Special)—A definitely improved Lakeview Honker football team will tangle with the Alturas Modoc Braves this Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock on the grassless Honker home field.

Despite the fact they were belted 33-7 by the Rogue League leading Phoenix Pirates last weekend, coach Howard Hopper was not displeased, pointing out that the game was never a "runaway" regardless of the final score.

He added, "The Pirates' experience was the big factor—and we aren't helped a bit in our practices by the fact we have to work without the benefit of grass. It keeps us from running a lot of drills that would help us."

The Honkers, 1-4, in the win-loss column, have bowed to each of their Rogue League enemies thus far. The record is the worst compiled by a Hopper coached club during his tenure at Lakeview.

The Honker backfield against Alturas will include quarterback Chuck Cossey, halfbacks Dennis Barry and Fred Williams and fullback Bob Mobley. The offensive line includes ends John Griener, tackles Fred Baldwin, and Dave DuBoise or Jim McNeely, guards Gary Reynolds and Don Faris, and center Otis Mobley. Faris may be sidelined this weekend because of a bad ankle, Hopper said.

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Today's Sport Parade Irish Tom's Fury 'Controlled' Admits To 'Superstitions'

NEW YORK (UPI)—Irish Tom McNeely's life today is a crazy, mixed-up thing of genealogy and dreams, psychiatry and superstition.

McNeely is the 24-year-old Boston strong boy who challenges Floyd Patterson for the heavyweight crown at Toronto in December. He is a 9-1 underdog on the basis of inexperience.

But the six foot, two inch 200-pounder counts on the fists which have produced 18 knockouts in 23 straight pro victories to equalize the situation.

"John L. was my mother's father's second cousin," explained the former Michigan State tackle with the light brown crew cut. "And when I was a kid, I had to fight. All the kids called me 'Fatso' and tried to make me run. I wouldn't run."

Thus it was that, when he turned pro, McNeely went at it as if he still was an alley fighter gone berserk. They had trouble stopping him at the bell and his manager, Pete Fuller, finally sent him to a psychiatrist.

"I thought they were only for nuts, or something like that," McNeely grinned. "But I went and I think it helped. Now I fight with a controlled fury."

Prays For Opponents

It isn't, he hastened to add,

that he delights in punishing an opponent.

"As a matter of fact," he recounted, "I go to church before a fight and pray that nothing will happen to my opponent. To me, either."

McNeely is undecided whether he will pray for Patterson.

"I keep thinking how hard it has been to get him in the ring," he grimaced. "They kept putting us off, with one thing and another. Now it's all signed up and I hope to make my dream finally come through."

This dream is one he had right after the bout became a distinct probability.

"I woke up in a sweat," he remembered. "In my dream, my corner was going wild with delight. I could see Patterson being held upright on his stool and my hand was being raised in victory. I knew I'd been in a hard fight, but I'd won."

Admits To Superstition

McNeely admits cautiously to "a certain amount of superstition."

"I always visit the zoo just before a fight," he said. "I did that before my first fight and I've done it ever since and haven't been beaten yet. Also I always eat the same things the day of the fight and go through a set routine which never varies."

There is a suspicion in the fight mob that, dreams and tigers in the zoo aside, McNeely is in the

position of a man about to be fed to the lion.

The bout was moved out of his native heath because Cus D'Amato, manager of Patterson, insisted on naming all the conditions for the fight except the round in which it would end. McNeely's manager was asked to submit a list of six acceptable referees for the Toronto embroglio and with the faith of an Alice in Wonderland decided that this was outside his province. D'Amato naturally submitted his list.

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
