

EVA ARTHUR CHOSEN WOMAN OF THE YEAR

LAKEVIEW—Mrs. Eva Arthur has been named "Woman of the Year" by the Lakeview Business and Professional Women's Club, and was honored as such at a tea on Oct. 8 to which all business women in Lakeview were invited.

Mrs. Mabel Thornton, president of the BPW Club, reported that 150 women qualified for invitations to the tea held in the Memorial Hall of the courthouse.

The affair also marked the last day of "Business Women's Week," which is observed nationwide.

Like most persons with unselfish dedication to the good of the community and her fellowman, Mrs. Arthur was the most surprised person in the community when informed that she had

been chosen by her fellow club members. Taking part in civic work that can take advantage of her time and ability is just a natural reaction for this 73-year-old woman whose energy and looks belie her years.

Eva Arthur is a real Oregonian and the only member of her family to be born in Lake County. Her mother, a native of Nottingham, England, with the unusual first name of Plyner, came to America and married Joseph Howard in Philadelphia. They heard of opportunity in the West from some of his family who had come out here. Even though they had four children by 1885, the pioneer spirit pushed them on to Oregon and they settled on a homestead in Drews Valley. Here, in 1888, Plyner Howard gave birth to her fifth child, unassisted by midwife, doctor, or anyone else, and so Eva Howard started life with a fighting spirit.

In 1910 she married Charles D. Arthur, who had come west by wagon train from Joplin, Mo. He had been running sheep on share basis for several years. They lived in Lakeview until 1919 and during these years he operated one of the largest livery stables in the state of Oregon, located just north of the building until recently occupied by the Ford agency. This building and adjacent lots are still owned by Mrs. Arthur. In the meantime her parents had died and

the ranch and stock was left in an estate to the five children, none of whom except Eva wished to live there. So she and her husband gradually bought out the shares and, in 1919, stocked the ranch at Drews Valley with 400 head of yearling steers. He operated the ranch and cattle until 1922 when he became associated with the Commercial National Bank in Lakeview. However, in 1936 he again went into the cattle business and the raising of purebred Herefords. He became ill and was taken to San Francisco where he died on Aug. 13, 1938.

Although alone (the couple had no children) Mrs. Arthur, undaunted, assumed the management of the ranch and for nine years she rode after cattle, helped with branding, bought bulls, measured hay, hired men and cooked for them throughout the year, except during haying time when assistance in the house was necessary. In 1946 when Ward and Park Harris of San Francisco came along with a satisfactory offer for the ranch and stock, she sold out and moved to Lakeview.

Life in town is easier but this did not make her lazy. Always interested in politics, she was president of the Lake County chapter of the Republican Council of Oregon Women, a group organized statewide by the late Mrs. George Gerlinger. She is still serving a long term as vice president of the Republican Central Committee for the county. She is a member of the Business and Professional Women's Club, Soroptimists, Rebekahs, Eastern Star, the county Welfare Board, and the Lake County Chamber of Commerce, where she serves on the queen selection committee for the Lakeview Roundup, and then acts as chaperon for the girls.

Probably her most valiant efforts are shown in chairmanship of the cancer drive for the county. She has held this job for

five years and from an intake of absolutely nothing, collected \$1,200 the first year, and now the annual donations amount to over \$2,000. With a number of willing helpers she has been able to make Lake the first county in the state over the top in the drive for four successive years. This money all goes for research, but there are some supplies located here for assistance to needy cases, and Mrs. Arthur's personal help goes along wherever she can offer it. Close contact with many cancer cases has made her almost fanatical in the search for early discovery and fighting of the dread disease, as well as the raising of funds for research in the field. She is untiring in making known to needy persons suffering from cancer that there is help available locally, and she proves the point by personal assistance.

Just three members of the Howard family survive. A sister, Mrs. Ida Casebeer, a resident of Bonanza, is confined to a hospital in Klamath Falls, and there is a brother, Frank, in Phoenix, Ariz. Eva Arthur still shows the signs of the pioneer spirit which has built the West, and she is an interested spectator in the latest exodus to the land evidenced by the promotions which are building up throughout this area. It is difficult for her to believe that the price of the land could spiral to such an extent in one lifetime span.

An so it can be said that the honor coming to her as "Woman of the Year" could justly be applied to many worthy years, with a wish from her cohorts of many more to follow.

Let Teens Tell Teens Of High School Marriage

Most parents are wise enough to know that marriages made in high school may not turn out to have been made in heaven.

But convincing teen-agers of that is quite a different matter. However, a recent survey of high school marriages made by a high school vice principal working on his master's degree reveals a startling fact that ought to be impressive to teen-agers themselves.

According to this survey, 74 per cent of the young marrieds questioned said they do not believe that high school marriages are a good idea... although each and every one of them married before finishing high school.

Adults can argue, preach, persuade and talk themselves blue in the face without convincing young people that they know what they are talking about.

But when almost three-fourths of the young marrieds in a survey are ready to admit that teen-age marriage isn't a happy row to hoe—teen-agers should be ready to listen.

Maybe high schools all over the country ought to make their own surveys to find out what students who marry before they get a diplo-

ma feel about the step they took—say, five years later.

If no names had to be signed to the questionnaires sent out, the answers ought to be honest and revealing.

And they should make the best possible ammunition to use in fighting the growing trend toward younger and younger marriages.

With that kind of ammunition, high school teachers could say, "This isn't what we who are older think about high school marriage, but what our own students who have married in high school have to say about it."
