

Williams NL Rook Of Year

NEW YORK (UPI)—Billy Williams, 23-year-old Alabama-born outfielder who hit .278 for the Chicago Cubs, was named the National League's rookie of the year today by the United Press International's board of baseball experts.

Williams, who went barnstorming with Hank Aaron and Satchel Paige when he was only 16 years old, received the votes of 20 of the 36 experts who took part in the voting. Joe Torre, 19-year-old Milwaukee Brave catcher, was a distant second with five votes.

Ken Hunt of the Cincinnati Reds was third with four votes. Willie Davis of the Los Angeles Dodgers had three and Art Mahaffey of the Philadelphia Phillies and Leo Cardenas of the Reds had two each.

"A native of Whistler, Ala., Williams played in 146 games and batted .278 with 20 doubles, seven triples and 25 homers. He scored 75 runs, knocked in 86 and stole six bases.

Williams went barnstorming with Aaron and Paige in 1954 even before he was graduated from Mobile County Training High School. In 1959, he was one of the Texas League's leading hitters with a .318 average and in 1960 he hit .323 and made the American Association all-star team.

Williams was signed by the Cubs in the summer of 1956, is married and the father of one daughter. He practices carpentry in Whistler during the off-season.

Dodger Maneuver Intricate

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—A complicated 21-player maneuver involving the Los Angeles Dodger farm system has been announced by the club to set up a 1962 40-player roster prior to closing of the annual draft lists.

Dodger vice president and general manager E. J. (Buzzie) Bavasi announced Wednesday that seven players were assigned to Omaha and Spokane and 14 others were acquired from Dodger minor league teams.

The Spokane team took outfielders Sheldon Brodsky and Al Norris; pitcher Nelson Chittum and shortstop Gene Wallace. Pitchers Rick Warren and Rene Valdes and shortstop Ralph Plumlee went to Omaha. Outfielder Gordon Windhorn was assigned to Kansas City.

The club purchased the contracts of the following:

Catchers Mike Brumley and Nate Smith; pitchers Joe Moeller, a rookie sensation who started last year with Reno, Nev.; Pete Richter, Jack Smith, Larry Staab and Charles Spell; infielders Larry Burright, Walter Heckel, Ken McMullen, Dick Nen and Bart Shirley, and outfielders Richard Smith and Roy Gleason.

As first-year men, Moeller, Nen, Shirley, McMullen, Staab and Heckel would have been subject to unrestricted draft if not called.

There had been some question whether the run was 101 or 102 yards but it was cleared up by NFL spokesman Wednesday after pictures of the play taken by the Cowboys revealed the Barnes was two yards deep in the end zone when he intercepted Eddie LeBaron's pass.

Celtic Boss Steams, Says 'Never Again'

BOSTON (AP)—Boston Celtics owner Walter Brown was still steaming today about the incident at Lexington, Ky., Tuesday night when two of his Negro players were refused service at a hotel coffee shop.

"The Celtics will never play another exhibition game in the South or any other place where they might be embarrassed," Brown said. "I didn't want to go down there this time. I had promised that after an unpleasant incident at Charlotte, N.C., previously when the boys were embarrassed."

"I'm not so hungry for money that I'd arrange games where my players might be embarrassed. Never again."

Celtics player Frank Ramsey, who played at the University of Kentucky—in Lexington—apologized for the hotel employee who refused to serve Sam Jones and Tom Sanders.

Jones and Sanders told teammates Bill Russell, K. C. Jones and Al Butler about the refusal of service and all five—plus St. Louis Hawks players Woody Sauldsberry and Cleo Hill—returned to their homes before the exhibition game. All are Negroes.

Pratt, Kan. (AP)—Consider the predicament of the Pratt Junior College football juggernaut, which has topped up 304 points to 21 for six opponents and can't claim a victory.

The ax fell Monday after a rival in the Jayhawk Junior College established that Pratt played an ineligible end in three games. Pratt quickly forfeited all six games it had played, all against conference opponents.

Pratt took some comfort today from the announcement it still may get a bid to the Junior Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. A spokesman for the Junior Rose Bowl Committee said it understands the school was not to blame for the eligibility mixup. If Pratt can get an endorsement from its conference, it still may get the summons to Pasadena.

Whether Pratt can get the endorsement hasn't come up for a decision.
