



The Oregon Tech Owls stuck to their guns as the toughest defensive ball club in the Oregon Collegiate Conference Saturday afternoon but their effort was just a little short.

The Southern Oregon Red Raiders won the "biggest" game of their year by squeaking past the Owls 6-0 Saturday afternoon and no one who saw the game would deny they really had to work for the win.

They came awfully close to losing it, in fact. Except for a couple of untimely fumbles the Owls might well have had a pair of six-pointers... and with a jump like that they would have played mighty hard to catch.

When the Raiders finally did score after being held to the one-

alibing... just stating what they believe to be true. Saturday the Owls were beaten... there's no doubt... but if the two clubs were to meet a couple of times more this season... about the best you could get would be even money.

While Rex Hunsaker had praise for the entire squad's defensive effort against the Raiders he particularly lauded ex-KU player Wayne Dennis.

Dennis, who entered the game "hurting," had been assigned one of the toughest assignments of the day, that of covering the pass receivers in the special defense the Owls had set up. And he came through like a veteran. Of the shy rangy freshman Hunsaker said, "He's a great one."

Incidentally, Howard Hartman, the Red Raider who is the number one pass-receiver in the nation among the NIAA small colleges, was limited to just one completion.

Friday night's Pelican victory over the Springfield Millers was a real thriller... so now all they have to do is handle the Crater Comets... then wait to see what's going to become of the Black Tornado. The Tornado has to beat Grants Pass to keep the Pel hopes for a possible playoff berth alive.

### US Golfers Take Lead In Cup Play

MONTERREY, Mexico (AP)—U.S. amateur golfers rallied for a near sweep of singles after dropping two team matches Saturday and took an imposing lead over Mexico and Canada in the sixth Americas Cup competition. With four players — Deane Beman, Bill Hyndman III, Bob Gardner and Charles Smith — racing up double individual triumphs, the Yanks rolled up 14 1/2 points during the long day's grind over the 7,063-yard Club Campestre course.

Mexico, which got a surprising jump in the morning tandem matches in which players hit alternate shots, followed with eight points. Canada trailed with a 4 1/2.

The competition will be completed with three team and six individual matches Sunday. The United States is overwhelmingly favored to retain the cup that it has held since the event's inception in 1952.

No United States player was beaten in the singles test although the country's national champion, Jack Nicklaus of Columbus, Ohio, was tied in his rugged duel with Gary Cowan, the Canadian champion, and Thomas Lehman, 19-year-old Mexican.

### LSU Defense Beats Kentucky

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Louisiana State slapped a radar defense on Kentucky's awesome aerial game in the second half Saturday night and the 10th ranked Bayou Bengals defeated the Wildcats 24-14 in a Southeastern Conference football game.

LSU, chalking up its fourth victory in five games, rolled to two quick touchdowns in the second period. Quarterback Lynn Arndt, who completed 7 of 11 passes for 113 yards, tossed 2 yards to end Danny Neumann for the first tally and halfback Bo Campbell raced 59 yards down the sideline for the second Tiger touchdown. ## 60 Yard Pass Spells Disaster

ASHLAND (Special) — Despite miserable weather on Fuller Field the Southern Oregon College Homecoming festivities took on a sunny aspect as the Red Raiders eked out a 6-0 win over the Oregon Tech Owls in an important Oregon Collegiate Conference football game here Saturday afternoon.

The Raiders got their big six in the third quarter when quarterback Doug Olson, the number two small college passer in the nation, connected with end Dave Hughes on a looping heave good for 60 yards to the Owl one.

Indicative of the defensive power displayed by both clubs the Owls held the Raiders to no gain for three straight downs but on the last-gasp fourth Olson sneaked over for the TD. As he crossed the line the ball squirted out of his fingers but the officials ruled he was already in.

Olson's try-for-point kick was wide but the six points proved enough. For coach Al Akin's pre-season favorite Raider eleven the win was their second against no defeats in OCC play and their second victory of the season.

The defeat meant a 1-2 record in league play for the Techmen and evened the count between the two pet rivals at six wins apiece since their competition started in 1948.

The Tech squad, which according to coach Rex Hunsaker "put forth a tremendous effort—one good enough to win, but you have to score to win," struggled gamely during the remainder of the third and for 14 minutes of the fourth period but were unable to get a solid drive put together.

Their determination, however, had the SOC rosters and players all nervous, especially when they got their hands on the ball on their own 25 with just :57 left in the game.

Owl quarterback Bill Ransome, who hit 10 of 16 pass attempts for a total of 97 yards for the game, whistled a 40 yard toss to halfback Lanny Myers who was stopped by the "last" Raider on the SOC 35.

On the next play he hit Myers with an eight-yarder but a five yard offside penalty moved them back. The gun sounded on the penalty so the Owls were allowed one more play. Ransome fadded back and tossed to Harvey

### Sugar Ray Outpoints D. Moyer

NEW YORK (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson, the 41-year-old Methuselah of the ring, outpointed baby-faced Benny Moyer of Portland, Ore., Saturday night in an action-packed 10-round bout in Madison Square Garden.

Robinson, who turned professional 21 years ago when Moyer was just a year old, won the verdict of all three officials, but not the crowd of 7,800 who jeered the decision.

Referee Barney Fleish had the 159 1/2 pound Robinson ahead 5-2 and even. Judge Bill Reicht saw it 5-4-1 and Judge Johnny Bran had it 6-3-1. The Associated Press card had Robinson in front, 6-4.

Moyer, who weighed 157 pounds and is 19 years' Robinson's junior, made a good fight of it. He showed no awe for the five-time world middleweight champion and was perfectly willing to mix it up right from the start.

There were no knockdowns and both fighters came out of the Moyer did stagger Robinson with a right to the head in the fourth fray without a scratch. But

After mid-field exchanges during the second frame the Raiders punched down to the Tech 19 but an Olson pass was intercepted by Graham to end the threat.

Ransome completed a pair of passes to Myers on for nine yards and a first down and the other for 10 and a first before the halftime gun sounded.

At the opening of the third the Owls kicked off and the Raiders fumbled on the second play. Andy Cook recovered and the Owls moved down to the SOC 25 in four plays only to lose the ball on a fumble by Myers.

Two plays later the Raiders lost the ball on their own 20 but the Owls returned the compliment on the first play of the new series.

The Raiders moved from their own 20 to the Owl 16 in 13 plays with Barnes doing most of the work. Olson completed a couple of short passes to Hughes on the drive but Graham came up with another interception to get the Owls out of trouble for a few moments.

Ransome then completed an eight yard aerial to Myers but the Techmen were forced to punt on their own 45.

Branson erupted for a 30 yard rambuck of the boot just as the third period ended, and thus began the Raiders' winning touchdown drive.

Starting from their own 48 the SOC eleven was hit with another 15 yard penalty but recovered as Olson connected with Hartman for six yards and then tossed the big one to Hughes.

From here on the struggle was almost even-up until the Owls unleashed their desperation drive in the final minute.

Olson connected on nine of 18 tries for his total. His 60 yarder was plucked off the heads of three Owl defensemen by the rangy Hughes. Hughes was stopped on the one by Owl Wayne Dennis.

"We made a number of offensive mistakes but the big mistake was on defense when we let Hughes get that ball. Still, I'm real proud of my team. They met a good ball team. Al's boys had themselves a great game," commented Hunsaker as his club prepared to board the bus for the long ride home.

Credited with outstanding efforts on defense were tackle Jim Madden and linebacker Jack Williams, both making key stops on numerous occasions.

Fumbles played a big part in the game. Both the Owls and the Raiders bobbled five times, and each lost the ball on four of them. During the first half the loose balls were credited to a combination of fingers numbed by the cold plus the hard defensive play exhibited by each team.

In the second half, which opened with four fumbles, two to a club, in just nine plays, they were credited to a combination of rain and icy sleet.

After taking the opening kickoff the Owls lost the ball in four plays on a fumble by Glass on their own 40.

In 13 plays, including a pair of first downs, both on the ground, the Raiders were on the Owl seven but a 15 yard penalty, the first of a total of 55 for the game, moved them back to the 19 where Olson

### Pro Footballers Ready For Action

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — Arizona State University scored a touchdown and a two-point conversion in the final minute of play Saturday night to stun favored Oregon State 24-23.

The apparently beaten Sun Devils came to life when they pounced on an Oregon State fumble with about two minutes left in the game.

In eight swift plays, ASU went 53 yards for its touchdown. The score came on an 11-yard pass from Joe Zuger to end Herman Harrison.

Trailing by one point, the Sun Devils elected to go for the win. Substitute quarterback John Jacobs flipped a pass that went through the arms of an ASU receiver, an Oregon State defender and finally was nabbed by Dale Keller, who was sitting in the end zone.

Penalty-plagued Oregon State seemed in command as they recovered six of seven Arizona State fumbles and never trailed until those final seconds. The Beavers scored in the first four minutes of play after recovering a fumble on the opening kickoff.

They moved 27 yards in eight plays with Bruce Williams going the final two yards.

Arizona State struck back by blocking an Oregon State punt and then moving 48 yards in 13 plays climaxed by Ossie McCarty's two-yard blast.

Oregon State ran up a 23-lead as John Thomas sprinted 12 yards for one touchdown and Leroy Whittle went eight for another.

The Sun Devils got back into the ball game when halfback Charles Taylor took a screen pass and sprinted 64 yards for a touchdown.

Oregon State had two drives stalled by penalties and let ASU escape from deep in its own territory late in the game with another penalty.

### SHA Tunes Up; Whacks Bonanza

MERRILL (Special) — Coach Mary DelPlanche's tough Sacred Heart Trojans tuned up for next weekend's "crucial" with Malin by overwhelming the outmanned Bonanza Antlers 48-6 here Saturday night.

The one-sided contest was the night game of a day-night pair of football clashes in conjunction with the Merrill Potato Festival.

Malin stomped Merrill 34-6 in the day game. SHA journeys to Malin at 1:30 p.m. next Saturday for the game that will decide the County B League title.

The Bears, who have won three of their last four, must stop San Francisco's powerful, whirling shotgun offense that features three alternating quarterbacks. San Francisco's defense has allowed only 57 points in five games—second best in the league.

Dallas will rely on its fine pass defense that has come up with 14 interceptions, to discourage Sonny Jurgensen's tosses to ace receivers Pete Retzlaff, Tommy McDonald and Bobby Walton.

The Eagles sport a 4-1 mark and are tied with New York for the Eastern lead.

The Giants, fresh off an all winning four-game road trip, begin a five-game home stand facing a Los Angeles Rams squad that may be better than its 1-4 mark would indicate.

The Rams gained a 17-17 pre-season tie with New York, principally on the fine running of Jon Arnett and Dick Bass.

"There's not much difference between 4-1 and 1-4 when you still have nine games to play," New York Coach Al Sherman said.

Each team is expected to alternate quarterbacks. New York has veterans Charlie Conerly and Y. A. Tittle, while the Rams use Zeke Bratkowski and Frank Ryan. Sherman has not yet announced his starter.

Other games pit powerful Green Bay (4-1), co-leader in the West, against the Minnesota Vikings (1-4); Cleveland (3-2) is at Pittsburgh (1-4), St. Louis (2-3) at Washington (0-5) and Baltimore (2-3) at Detroit (3-2).
