Michigan State Converts ND Passes Into Scores

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Michigan State turned two pass interceptions into touchdowns and beat down Notre Dame 17-7 Saturday in a grueling defensive battle between two football giants.

The undefeated Spartans, ranked first in the nation, were bottled up by sixth-ranked Notre Dame until they cashed in for two touchdowns late in the third period.

The Irish, previously unbeaten with three victories, seized command early and dominated play until Michigan State's lightning comeback from a 0-7 deficit.

George Saimes, a barreling 186-pound fullback, struck for both scores and put the Spartans ahead after their long uphill battle.

He lumbered 24 yards for the first touchdown, after Herman Johnson had intercepted Daryle Lamonica's pass at the Spartan 22.

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP)—Unde-feated Iowa bottled past Wisconsin 47-15 Saturday behind the deadly passing of Matt Szykowsky.

The junior quarterback tossed three touchdowns, scored on a plunge and kicked five extra points. He completed 14 of 17 passes, including all nine he attempted in the first half, for 172 yards.

The fourth-ranked Hawkeyes, making their most impressive showing of the season in their homecoming game, were helped by Wisconsin bobbles. Two badger passes were intercepted and they lost the ball on a fumble in the first period. The Hawkeyes turned all three opportunities into touchdowns.

In marking up their fifth straight landslide victory, the Texans blitzed Arkansas statistically with 402 yards offense to Arkansas' 124. All but 48 of Texas' yards came on the ground.

SEATTLE (AP)—Two bursts of offensive fury by Washington in a football game filled with fumbles and pass interceptions earned the Huskies a 13-0 Big Five conference victory Saturday over the Stanford Indians.

Indiana U. Has Feast On Cougars

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP)—Indiana University's hungry Hoosiers chewed up Washington State's football team 33-7 Saturday and ended an eight-game victory famine.

The Hoosiers were so charged up the boys on the bench carried Coach Phil Dickens off the field before the final play was run.

Halfback Marv Woodson, a sophomore from Hattiesburg, Miss., scored Indiana's first two touchdowns on short plunges. Junior quarterback Woody Moore also got two on a 1-foot keeper and a 62-yard run with an intercepted Mel Melin pass.

Fullback Jim Bailey plunged for the other Hoosier touchdown, set up by a Cougar fumble.

Campbell, one of the nation's great pass catchers, hauled down nine for 115 yards. Melin completed eight of 21 for 121 yards, and Dave Mathieson five of nine for 50 yards.

Indiana tried only nine passes, with Byron Broome hitting two of six for three yards and Moore two of three for 42 yards.

USC Soph Engineers Cal Upset

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Southern California sophomore quarterback Pete Beathard, starting his first game, ran for one touchdown and passed for two others Saturday as he engineered the Trojans to a 28-14 victory over favored California.

With the 19-year-old youngster from El Segundo, Calif., at the controls and 215-pound fullback Ben Wilson furnishing the power, Southern California dominated from the start in the Trojans' Big 5 Conference opener.

Wilson smashed seven yards for a first period touchdown and Beathard went three to score in the second. Carl Skvarna's first two of four conversions put the halftime count at 14-0.

Early in the third stanza, the 6-foot-2 Beathard hit his favorite pass receiver, sophomore end Hal Bedsole, with a touchdown pass covering 46 yards. Bedsole took the ball at the 25, eluded defender Larry Balliett and raced in for the score. A Beathard-to-Bedsole pass for 13 yards brought the Trojans their fourth tally after California had scored early in the final period.

Cadets Rout Outclassed Idaho '11'

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP)—Army used every able bodied man on the roster and every means of scoring but the field goal in overwhelming a beefy but outclassed Idaho football team before a crowd of 18,275 at Michie stadium Saturday, 51-7.

Only in the first quarter was it a ball game, and only in that period did the westerners have a moment of glory. That came after the Cadets had taken a 7-0 lead on Dick Eckert's 36-yard dash on a burst through right tackle.

On the next kickoff fleet Gene Marrow, Idaho right halfback, sprinted down the sideline for 95 yards and a touchdown as Army's new "kickoff team" was caught flat-footed.

That tied it at 7-7, and that was the way the first period ended.

The Cadets picked up a safety as the second period opened as Idaho center Jim Decko sent his snapback over the end zone. And shortly after a 42-yard Army drive ended with Al Rusatz plunging for a touchdown from the Idaho one.

The score was the largest rolled up by an Army team since Dale Hall took over as coach in 1959. The high was 54 registered against Villanova.

Fix Attempt Fact Study Is Renewed

DETROIT (AP)—The reported attempt of unknown gamblers to "fix" last year's Michigan-Oregon football game came under renewed investigation Saturday.

Halfback Mickey Bruce, Oregon player who told of gamblers approaching him before the game, is being asked to come to Detroit to make a formal statement and sign a complaint.

The move results from a recent hearing of a Senate group which has been proving gambling in sports. The reported Oregon-Michigan "fix" attempt was a subject of the hearing.

Wayne County's (Detroit) Chief Assistant Prosecutor, Samuel Brenner, asked Michigan State Police to request the University of Oregon to send Bruce here as soon as convenient.

Brenner made his request in a letter to state police. This apparently was routine procedure. At East Lansing State Police Headquarters, a spokesman said the letter probably was still en route.

Bruce told his athletic director at Oregon that two men had approached him prior to the game at a hotel in Dearborn, near Ann Arbor, suggesting he could "make a lot of money" if Michigan were to win.

The game was played at Ann Arbor. The Oregon team spent the eve of the game in Dearborn. Michigan won 21-0.

Police swooped down on the hotel but by that time the men had checked out. They were reportedly from Miami, Fla.

Syracuse Battered

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. (AP)—Chunky Galen Hall threw two touchdowns passes against battered Syracuse Saturday and led Penn State to a 14-0 victory.

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
