Who forgot to load the shotgun? That was the big question in the National Football League today after the Chicago Bears completely muffed San Francisco's high-powered shotgun offense and knocked the 49ers out of a share of the Western Conference lead with a 31-0 walloping.

Clicking with an effective aerial combination with castoff quarterback Billy Wade pitching to rookie end Mike Ditka, the Bears moved smoothly Sunday against the usually stubborn 49ers defense and shakkled San Francisco's three-barreled shotgun with a 5-2-4 defensive deployment.

Chicago allowed the 49ers, who had averaged over 40 points in three previous games, to penetrate past midfield only once while Wade's accurate passes found their target for four Chicago touchdowns. Ditka grabbed two covering 47 and 15 yards.

The defeat left the 49ers and Bears with 4-2 records, a game behind the first-place Green Bay Packers, who whipped the Minnesota Vikings 33-7 and may have located a replacement for Army-bound Paul Hornung in hard-running Tom Moore.

Philadelphia's league champion Eagles rolled to a 43-7 victory over Dallas and remained in a tie for the top spot in the Eastern Conference with the New York Giants, 24-14 winners over the Los Angeles Rams.

Cleveland (4-2) stayed one game back of the Eastern leaders by beating Pittsburgh's ambitious Steelers 30-28 with the key help of Lou Groza's three field goals. Baltimore edged Detroit 17-14 and St. Louis blanked Washington, the only winless team in the circuit, 24-0.

Wade, acquired from Los Angeles, arched a 29-yard touchdown pass to John Farrington for the first score of the game. Ditka scored in the second and third periods before Wade lobbed a seven-yard flip to Johnny Morris for the Bears' final score. The 49ers Chicagoans with alternating quarterbacks Billy Kilmer, John Brodie and Bob Waters equally ineffective.

Moore averaged 9.9 yards in 16 carries after entering the game for the Packers (5-1) in the first quarter when Hornung league leading scorer to report for active duty Oct. 30, aggravated a knee injury. Hornung, however, kept at his kicking duties against the Vikings (1-5), and booted field goals of 13, 18, 17 and 16 yards plus three extra points to run his point total to 92.

The Eagles (5-1) used the bull-like charges of Billy Barnes and the passing of Sonny Jurgensen to outclass the Cowboys (3-3). Jurgensen picked up 134 yards in the air and Barnes led the ground gainers with 80 yards, including a five-yard TD burst. Clarence Peaks scored twice for Philadelphia on one and eight-yard runs.

With the Giants (5-1) trailing 14-10 in the fourth quarter, old reliable Chuck Conerly, benched for Y.A. Tittle earlier this season, passed 10 yards to Kyle Rote and 37 to Del Shofner for the clinching score against the Rams (1-5). Los Angeles had built its lead on a 33-yard pitch from Frank Ryan to Jim Phillips and a 35-yard dash by Dick Bass.

Bobby Mitchell scored three TDs on short runs for the Browns (4-2), but it was Groza's third field goal—a 12-yarder in the fourth quarter—that subdued the Steelers (1-5). Rudy Bukich passed for two Pittsburgh scores, hitting Buddy Dial with 12 and 80-yard tosses while Tom Tracy added a pair on the ground on one-yard plunges.

Steve Myhra booted a 45-yard field goal with eight seconds remaining as the Colts (3-3) came from behind in the final period and edged the Lions (3-3). Jim

Oregon College of Education and Southern Oregon College came up with crucial fourth period touchdowns in weekend football action to run their records to 2-0 and share the Oregon Collegiate Conference lead.

End Bruce Carpenter grabbed a 32-yard pass from Chuck Burns as the final gun sounded to give OCE a narrow 26-24 victory over Portland State.

SOC quarterback Doug Olsen slipped into the end zone from a yard away on fourth down to climax an 80-yard, fourth-period drive that gave the Red Raiders a 6-0 victory over Oregon Tech.

A 60-yard pass from Olsen to Dave Hughes highlighted the drive. Eastern Oregon, winless in league play, lost a non-conference battle to Olympic J.C. Quarterback Gary Price threw two long touchdown passes in the bitter cold and snow at La Grande for an 18-7 Olympic victory after EOC had taken an early lead.

Powerful Linfield stood alone on top of the Northwest Conference heap after weekend action, and the Wildcats showed Saturday they deserved the honor, with a crushing, 52-0 victory over the Whitman Missionaries.

Paul Durham's team rolled up 453 yards against Whitman. Steve Beguin, Bill Dressel and Bill Parrish led them to 39 points in the first half.

Beguin, the nation's fifth leading rusher among small college players, rolled up 132 yards Saturday, although Dressel made 163. Both scored twice. Quarterback Parrish accounted for three touchdowns with his passing.

Lewis and Clark showed surprising power in stunning favored College of Idaho 46-0. At one point, LC scored six touchdowns in 20 minutes of play. Mickey Hergert led the Pioneer attack, gaining 106 yards in 11 carries. LC began its onslaught with less than three minutes gone when Mike Gilbert picked up a Coyote punt and rambled 51 yards to score.

Willamette University scored its first victory of the season with a 31-14 conquest of Pacific University.

Jim McCaffery and Tom Tombs scored two touchdowns apiece to lead the Beacres, who ran Pacific's losing streak to five straight.

San Diego's Chargers undoubtedly favor a change in coaches—for some other team. Especially a team that could do them some good as a result.

Not that San Diego needs any help in the American Football League race since it has won all its games. But when Houston beat Dallas 38-7 through the inspiration of a new coach, it virtually wrapped up the Western Division championship for the Chargers.

With seven games to play San Diego is 3½ games ahead of second-place Dallas.

San Diego clouted Oakland 41-10 Sunday for its seventh straight league triumph. Dallas took its worst licking in its AFL tenure when Houston, directed by new coach Wally Lemm who succeeded the fired Lou Rymkus, broke the Texan hex.

The first thing Lemm did was to bring George Blanda off the bench, where Rymkus had sat him, and let the pro veteran pass for three touchdowns and kick a 53-yard field goal. It was just one yard under the league record of 54 yards set by George Fleming of Oakland against Denver Oct. 1.

Oakland took the lead on San Diego with a 28-yard pass from Tom Flores to Bob Coulough but Paul Flores ripped off a couple of long touchdowns runs to shoot the Chargers out front. They added to it steadily as they went along.

While the status quo was maintained in the Western Division all was turmoil in the Eastern. Leading New York took a 27-10 whipping from Denver and Boston clouted Buffalo 52-21 and that brought about a tie for the lead between New York and Boston. Buffalo is only a half-game back and Houston the same although fourth in percentage.

Denver shoved over 17 points in the last quarter to break a 10-0 tie and go on to victory. Versatile Gino Cappelletti scored 16 points in spearing Boston's triumph and it increased his league scoring lead. He now has 96 points—42 more than second-place Jack Spikes of Dallas.

San Diego plays Denver next Sunday while New York will be at Oakland, Boston at Dallas and Houston at Buffalo.

Briton Wins Pacific Race

MONTEREY, Calif. (AP)—England's Stirling Moss drew on 15 years of racing craft as he relentlessly pushed his ailing car to a new course record and a double victory Sunday in the Pacific Grand Prix.

Moss hit top speeds of up to 126 miles an hour over the tight 1.9-mile Laguna Seca track at nearly 100-mile heats of the feature race. His average speed was 91.1 miles an hour, 4.3 miles an hour faster than the record he set last year when he scored a similar sweep.

Sunday's win before 62,500 was worth \$7,000 to the balding Briton. In each heat, Dan Gurney of Riverside, Calif., was closing fast at the finish, but Moss took the checkered flags with several seconds to spare.

Australia's Jack Brabham was third each time in a Cooper Monaco which had a 2.7-liter engine developed for his challenge at Indianapolis this year. New Zealand's Bruce McLaren was fourth in each race in another Cooper Monaco.

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Spartans Lead Title Probables; Ol' Miss, Alabama Still In Race

With the college football season at the halfway point, Michigan State's big and bruising Spartans today headed the list of candidates for the national championship.

Duffy Daugherty's club has five Big Ten opponents in a row on its schedule starting with Indiana this Saturday. But it's unlikely that the Spartans will see another team as rough as Notre Dame.

Michigan State (4-0) just did beat the Irish, 17-7, Saturday after sputtering along well into the third quarter. Notre Dame (3-1) scored the first touchdown of the year against Daugherty's behemoths.

The big factor in Michigan State's favor is the schedule. The Spartans do not meet either Iowa, (4-0) which steamrolled Wisconsin, 47-15, to remain one of the nine major teams still undefeated and untied, or Ohio State, (3-0-1).

The Buckeyes had a tough time with Northwestern Saturday, finally pulling it out, 10-0. They, too, have had only one touchdown scored against them in four games.

Minnesota, the defending Big Ten champion, could be a problem for Michigan State in two weeks and so could Northwestern on Nov. 18. The chances are the Spartans, No. 1 in the current Associated Press weekly poll, will take them in stride.

Iowa and Ohio State still are very much in the running for the national title, but they come to grips on Nov. 4.

Mississippi (5-0), Texas (5-0) and Alabama (5-0) also have a chance of coming out on top. Ol' Miss and Alabama, two Southeastern Conference powers, do not tangle, so there's no chance of killing each other off.

Mississippi, knocked out of first place in the AP poll by Michigan

State, clobbered Tulane Saturday night, 41-0. Texas smothered Arkansas, 33-7, and Alabama cut down Tennessee, 34-3 in a regional TV game. This week Mississippi engages Vanderbilt, Texas takes on Rice, and Alabama meets Houston.

On Nov. 4, Mississippi must play Louisiana State (4-1), another big boy of the SEC, which whipped Kentucky, 24-14. Alabama does not have LSU scheduled, either. However, Alabama plays Georgia Tech, ranked No. 8, and a narrow 7-6 winner over Auburn.

Besides Michigan State, Mississippi, Texas, Iowa and Alabama, the other major teams with perfect records include Rutgers, (4-0) Colorado (4-0), Memphis State (6-0) and Bowling Green (5-0).

Dartmouth, Detroit and Villanova all topped from the all-winners list, were the weekend. Holy Cross turned back the Indians, 17-13; Navy, possibly the class of

the East, polished off Detroit, 37-19, Friday night, and Villanova bit the dust at the hands of Boston College, 22-6.

assured of the Rose Bowl bid—the Trojans of USC and UCLA. They don't meet until Nov. 25. Washington, California and Stanford have each lost one Big Five tilt already.

Washington lost its conference opener to California 21-14 but rebounded for a 13-0 triumph over Stanford at Seattle last Saturday. That left USC leading at this early stage with 1-0, Washington and California at 1-1, Stanford 0-1 and UCLA without a Big Five outing, but victories the past two weeks over Vanderbilt and Pittsburgh, the latter by a 20-6 count.

Only the Bruins and Stanford play conference games this week. Southern California entertains Illinois, Cal plays at Penn State and Washington meets Oregon at Portland. In the other Western

games, San Jose State goes against Washington State at Spokane and Idaho plays at Utah State with Oregon State enjoying an open date.

Things were tough indeed for Westerners this past weekend when they ventured outside their area. Army pasted Idaho 51-7, Indiana whipped Washington State 33-7 while Arizona State edged Oregon State 24-21.

Oregon, meanwhile, downed San Jose State 21-6. UCLA's one-two punch with tailbacks Mike Haffner and Bobby Smith provided the Bruins with a 13-0 halftime lead over independent Pittsburgh and that proved enough.

Southern California sophomore quarterback Pete Beathard drew a starting assignment because of an injury to Bill Nelsen and scored one touchdown and passed for two others.

A pass interception and fumble recovery led to Washington's pair of touchdowns with Pete Oler running two for the first and half-back Bill Siler streaking 44 for the second.

UO Escapes Injury In Win Over SJS

EUGENE (AP)—Although he was impressed with the overall play of the Oregon Ducks in their 21-6 victory over San Jose State Saturday, head coach Len Casanova seemed most pleased about the injury situation.

The Ducks got by without the help of regular halfbacks Mel Renfro, Mike Gaechter and Ben Brown, fullback Jim Josephson, and guard Al Weigel—all hurt in earlier games.

"And we didn't pick up any more injuries," he smiled. Casanova praised the defensive play of centers Rich Dixon and Bill Swain, sophomore halfbacks Lu Bain and Monte Fitchett, and quarterbacks Doug Post and Ron Veres.
