Arch, Rademacher Open Fight Slate

NEW YORK (UPI)—Two champions will fight this week—lightweight ruler Joe Brown in a title defense and light heavyweight co-title holder Archie Moore in an over-the-weight match.

Brown, now boxing out of Houston, Tex., defends his 135-pound crown against Filipino Bert Somodio at Manila, Saturday night. Somodio, an explosive puncher, is ranked sixth among contenders.

Ancient Moore of San Diego, Calif., engages former heavy-weight challenger Pete Rademacher in a 10-round non-title bout at Baltimore, Monday night.

In Saturday night's nationally televised 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden, Farid Salim—middleweight champion of Argentina—makes his United States debut, tossing leather against Teddy Wright of Detroit. Salim's record is 31 wins, one defeat and two draws. Wright has 37 victories, six losses, three draws and one no-contest.

Texan Eyes Mexico Golf Title Role

MONTERREY, Mexico (AP)—Dudley Wysong, one of the individual stars of the United States sixth Americas cup victory, goes out after another international golf jewel today — the Mexican amateur national championships. The 22-year-old McKinney, Tex., insurance man was the only member of Uncle Sam's star-studded Americas Cup Team who could spare the time to compete in Mexico's big tournament here next week.

Wysong figured in 6½ points as the U.S. team swept to another Americas Cup triumph over Mexico and Canada. The Yanks scored a total of 29 points compared with 14 for Canada and 11 for Mexico over the 7,063-yard, par 72 Club Campestre course.

It was a resounding victory and young Wysong's star was one of the brightest on the victorious U.S. team consisting of Jack Nicklaus, plagued with a bad back; former champions Charles Coe and Deane Beman, and Bill Hyndman III, Bob Gardner and Charles Smith.

The U.S. players won 4½ of a possible 6 points in the final day's team matches and 10 of a possible 12 in the individual battles. They had scored 14½ points also on Saturday.

Wysong teamed with Nicklaus to score 4 points without a loss in the team competition and he won 2½ points in individual play.

Suggs Leads Lady Golfers

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—Today Louise Suggs is the biggest tournament winner in the Ladies Professional Golf Association.

Her record 49th victory came Sunday on the final hole of the 34-hole San Antonio Civitan Open when she sank a clutch eight-foot par putt. This enabled her to maintain a one-under par 70 and a total of 212 strokes to edge out Kathy Whitworth, who had one stroke more.

Miss Suggs has won all three women's tournaments held in San Antonio.—this one worth \$1,247. The victory broke the record of 48 she shared previously with Patty Berg.

A scrambling finale on the Brackenridge Park course showed Miss Suggs outlasting Miss Whitworth, Mary Lena Faulk and Ruth Jessen, finishing in that order.

Archie, meanwhile, still is recognized in the world composed of New York, Massachusetts and Europe as the light heavyweight champion. And, while he gives away some 15 to 18 years and about 20 pounds to Rademacher tonight, he is orating about another heavyweight title shot.

"Archie's too old," Rademacher has asserted with somewhat more than expected blitheness when you consider his unremarkable record. "I'll knock him out."

"We'll see about that," old Arch smiles. "Because after this one I figure on meeting Bob Cleroux, the heavyweight champion of Canada, and after I beat him it might lead to a return match with Floyd Patterson."

Archie has nothing at stake tonight except money but can't help padding one of the most eye-opening records in boxing annals.

Oldest Active Champion
Moore, who claims to be 45 come December even though his mother insists he'll be 48, is the oldest active champion in ring history; holds the record of nine successful light heavyweight title defenses, and has won the 175-pound crown longer than any other man ever did. His reign stretches to nine years come December.

Both he and the 41-year-old Robinson have compiled fantastic marks in the ring.

Moore in 213 bouts has won 182, lost 25, drew in six, knocked out 130 opponents and been flattened by six.

Robinson in 158 bouts has won 145, drawn in three, knocked out 93 rivals and lost nine. The one knockout against him was due to the towel against then light heavyweight champion Joey Maxim.

Redleg GM Earns Award

NEW YORK (UPI)—General manager Bill Dewitt of the Cincinnati Reds, a veteran of 45 years in baseball, has been named Major League Executive Of The Year by the United Press International's board of experts.

Dewitt, whose training skill was mainly responsible for the Reds' rise from sixth place in 1960 to their first National League pennant since 1940, received 17 of the votes cast by the 36-man board.

Fred Haney of the Los Angeles Angels was second with 12 votes while Dan Topping and Roy Hamey of the New York Yankees, Gabe Paul of the Cleveland Indians, Ed Short of the Chicago White Sox and Dick O'Connell of the Boston Red Sox had one vote each.

Dewitt's major moves in the rebuilding of the Reds were the acquisition of pitcher Joey Jay and third-baseman Gene Freese. Other important moves were the acquisition of Don Blasingame, Darrell Johnson and Ken Johnson.

Suffers Head Injury
DETROIT (UPI)—Gump Worsley, veteran New York Ranger goalie who suffered a head injury in a Saturday night game with the Detroit Red Wings, may be able to return to action in a week, according to doctors at Osteopathic Hospital. 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NCAA Eyes New Plan

NEW YORK (UPI)—A 16-point program designed to combat the gambling menace in intercollegiate sports will be presented to the policy-directing council of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) during its regular fall meeting opening today.

The program was recently endorsed by the officers of four national administrative and coaches associations. It will be presented to the council by NCAA President Henry B. Hardt of Texas Christian University, chairman of the special committee studying the gambling-bribery problem.

During its three-day meeting, the council also will:

—Review a special report of the NCAA executive committee containing 11 recommendations for improvement of the U.S. Olympic organization.

—Review interpretations of NCAA legislation.

—Consider other legislation for presentation to the 56th annual NCAA convention at Chicago, Jan. 11-13.

—Review a report of the NCAA committee on infractions, the group's fact-finding agency.

Nine Elevens Still Perfect

Nine major colleges retained their perfect football records during the weekend but the overall list of unbeaten and untied schools was reduced from 62 to 46 teams, Alabama, Bowling Green, Colorado, Iowa, Michigan State, Memphis State, Mississippi, Rutgers and Texas remained from last week's perfect major teams after Dartmouth, Detroit, Notre Dame and Villanova tumbled from the list.

Northern (S.D.) State and Stevens Point (Wis.) continue to lead the list in victories with seven each. Nine schools have chalked up six triumphs and 19 others won five apiece.

Game Commission Kills Davis Roach.

On Wednesday, Oct. 11, the game commission moved into this once great rainbow trout producing lake and dumped 350 gallons of the fish killing chemical toxaphene into the roach infested waters.

Roach were showing distress from the slow acting chemical in late afternoon, and by Thursday morning dead roach literally covered the shoal areas and had begun to windrow along the shore line. Great masses of roach were feebly cruising the shoal and shore line areas. It was expected that these undesirable fish would continue to die for a week or more before the last fish was dead.

According to Len Mathisen, regional supervisor for the game commission at Bend, a preliminary survey early this week disclosed about 18 dead roach per foot of shore line. Samples taken in the lake proper showed 10 dead roach per five square foot of sample. A few large rainbow trout were observed among the dead roach. Masses of roach were still dying at the last report. Mathisen would not estimate the numbers of roach killed but ventured a guess it would go into the hundreds of thousands.

The treatment of Davis Lake was a far cry from earlier lake

rehabilitation projects which require a mass of man power and equipment. Six fishery agents under the direction of Bob Borovicka, chief of lake and stream rehabilitation for the commission, completed the entire job in two days. Actual treatment required less than seven hours.

Six outboard motor boats equipped with venturi type pumps coupled to 50-gallon drums of liquid toxaphene were used to distribute the chemical throughout the lake. Each boat crisscrossed its assigned section of the lake. Drifter systems were installed at the head of all tributaries to kill any roach that may be in these waters.

Davis Lake has been under surveillance by the game commission for a number of years. The main obstacle to rehabilitation has been the whereabouts of the outflow of Davis Lake which sumps beneath the lava flows. Intensive investigations during the past two years using rodamine dyes failed to disclose the reappearance of these waters in the spring systems of Wickiup Reservoir and the adjacent Deschutes watershed. It was concluded the waters from Davis Lake either purified during the underground journey or did not reappear in the area.

Davis Lake is expected to remain toxic for several months. Plans call for restocking the lake in the spring with rainbow trout and kokanee. If stocks can be obtained, Atlantic salmon may also be tried in Davis Lake.

WAC May Discuss League Additions

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI)—Expansion of the Western Athletic Conference to include Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State was expected to be discussed today or Tuesday by representatives of conference schools meeting here to formulate a new league code.

Paul Brechler, who becomes WAC commissioner next July 1, Sunday presented a model code for consideration by Arizona State University, University of Arizona, Utah, New Mexico, Brigham Young and Wyoming.

He would not discuss specific provisions of the code, but outlined what the representatives hoped to formulate during the three-day meeting. Tuesday is due to be spent on scheduling.

Brechler, now of the Skyline Conference, said the code would be "pretty restrictive" and would require a certain grade-point average and specific number of hours passed.

"What we want are kids that will benefit from college," Brechler said. "We don't want kids who can't do that. We don't want the so-called bums."

He said eligibility requirements would be established on a qualitative and quantitative basis.

"Thus, an athlete must proceed toward graduation. We want no players who have used up three years of eligibility and are still sophomores," Brechler, acting WAC commissioner, said.

He pointed out that any action taken by the conferees would have to be approved by the presidents of the six universities represented, probably at a meeting in December.

Brechler said the league would be operating fully in all sports but football by 1962. A full league schedule was expected to be completed by 1964.

"Most of the schools will have a chance to play four games against league opponents next year," said Brechler. "This happened by chance, not design."

Moore Asks Morality Instruction

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Commissioner Bernie H. Moore of the Southeastern Conference called on college coaches today to "teach morality to their squads — standards that possibly the kids didn't get in their own homes."

Moore, concerned by the developing basketball gambling scandal, declared "college coaches can do the best job" when it comes to ethics.

"Every SEC football coach talked to his squad this fall on the dangers of gambling and association with shady characters. I sent a telegram that was read to every team and in some cases the university presidents also talked to the squad. We will redouble our vigilance when basketball starts," he said.

Moore advocated tougher entrance requirements, closer inspection of individual backgrounds, and continuing emphasis on good morality as necessary steps to combat the influence of gambling.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (UPI)—Jan Waern, Sweden's top miler, was disqualified Sunday by the Swedish Track and Field Federation for alleged violation of amateur rules. Waern had previously been suspended by the International Track and Field Federation.

Yorba Linda Claims Prize

COSTA MESA, Calif. (AP)—Top money in the \$20,000 Orange County Golf Open has been awarded young Bob McCallister.

McCallister, 27, from Yorba Linda, Calif., reeled off a scorching under-par 278 to win over five others bunched at 280. Al Geiberg of Santa Barbara, Don Fairfield of Costa, Ill., Phil Rodgers of LaJolla, Jacky Cupit of Longview, Tex., and Mary Furgol of Coghill, Ill.



Kelso May Replace Top Money Horse

Kelso seems destined to replace Round Table as the world's top money winning race horse.

The 1960 Horse of the Year, an honor that appears inevitable for him again this year, boosted his career bankroll to \$708,905 with the easiest kind of victory in the \$105,800 two-mile Jockey Club Gold Cup at Aqueduct Saturday.

This leaves Kelso over a million

bucks short of Round Table's \$1,749,869 as well as shy of Nashville's \$1,288,565 and Citation's \$1,085,760. But with the kind of purse money around these days it won't take Kelso long to overhaul the amounts hung up by the three equine millionaires before they were retired to stud.

Kelso is a 4-year-old gelding and, as long as he stays sound, his future is on the race track. His immediate objective is to become the turf's top moneywinning gelding, an honor now held by Calumet Farm's Armed who ended his racing days at the age of nine in 1950 with \$817,475.

Kelso can't overtake Armed this year since his owner, Mrs. Richard DuPont and trainer Carl Hanford, plan only one more 1961 start for him. That will be in the Washington D.C. International at Laurel Nov. 11.

Kelso beat Hillsborough by five lengths in the Gold Cup with jockey Eddie Arcaro looking over his shoulder. "He could have done at least 15 lengths better if he had to," grinned Arcaro. The bettors must have thought so, too. They made Kelso the 1-to-10 choice and he paid a mere \$2.20. There was win betting only for the 4-horse field.

Down Garden State way, in Camden, N.J., Cicada similarly made a show of her field in winning the \$161,883 Gardenia Stakes for 2-year-old fillies. The C. T. Chenery filly, ridden by Willie Shoemaker, won by 10 lengths eased up.

Count Amber turned the tables on Orleans Dodge in the Narragansett Special at the Rhode Island oval. The previous Saturday Count Amber had finished second to Orleans Dodge, but found the longer mile and 3-16th route more to his liking.

Johnny Longden turned in the 5,533th victory of his career in guiding Mr. Wag home first in the Bay Meadows handicap. In other Saturday races Roman Line won the Breeders Futurity at Keeneland, Or Jeep beat Wolfman in the Canadian championship stakes at Woodbine and First Round took the feature at Sportsman's Park.
