## Ray Bitney Death Told

Raymond H. Bitney, 62, former superintendent of the Klamath Indian Agency, died at Rochester, Minn., recently, following a month's illness.  
According to information received by a close friend and one-time co-worker, O. E. Brooks, 1122 North Eighth, this city, Mr. and Mrs. Bitney had gone to Mayo Brothers Clinic for treatment for Mrs. Bitney. During a checkup it was discovered that Mr. Bitney needed surgery, from which he apparently failed to recover.  
He was at the agency during the 1930s, later returned after a period of administrative work with the Bureau of the Interior as an agent in 1948. The family remained here for another two years before going to Everett, Wash.  
At the time of his death he was an assistant area director at Andover, Okla., and had received a distinguished service medal from the Interior Department only a year ago.  
Mr. Bitney was a member of the Chilquin Lodge 197 AF&M, of the Oregon Consistory, a 32 degree Mason, member of Al Kader Shrine in Portland. He had served in World War I and II and retired as a lieutenant colonel.  
Surviving are the widow, Vivian; three sons, seven grandchildren and brothers and sisters.

## Board Studies Fund Requests

OREGON TECHNICAL INSTITUTE—A tentative listing of requests from Oregon's colleges and universities for Federal Housing and Home Finance Administration advance planning funds was presented to the building committee of the Oregon State Board of Higher Education at its first session here today.  
President Arthur S. Flemming of the University of Oregon had made no advance planning funds requests of the board as had seven other institutions.  
Dr. Flemming mildly criticized the board's mechanics in asking for these planning funds. The board's staff has asked each institution for a priority list of its building needs.  
The staff then worked out recommendations for funds for advanced planning totaling \$38,080 on seven "top priority" building projects over the state.  
Dr. Flemming's criticism was that his institution had two projects for which there was an urgent need. "We are facing here a critical biennium," he said, citing college population projections for the next few years.  
"I would like to see us in a position where we have federal funds to plan for all these buildings." The board staff had worked out planning estimates for only top priority projects.  
The two projects which Dr. Flemming equated in importance  
at the University of Oregon were a library addition and a second addition to the science building.  
Estimates on these two buildings based on 1961 price levels were \$5,260,000. Since Flemming had asked that he be allowed to submit at least these two buildings for proposed planning funds, the board agreed to delay at least his request until their December meeting.  
Dr. Flemming acted as a self-appointed spokesman for all the higher education institutions when he gave his plea for establishing and requesting planning funds for all proposed buildings in the 1963-1965 capital construction plan.  
Decisions of the finance, building and curriculum committees made Monday will be in the form of recommendations to be passed or rejected at the formal board meeting Tuesday.  
The committee also recommended for formal approval the final plans and specifications for an addition to Erb Memorial Student Union at the University of Oregon.  
The addition, to be constructed under a total allocation of \$683,000, will include eight bowling lanes with automatic pin spotters. The student union will be built on a self-supporting and self-clearing operational basis.  
A board spokesman said that no state or tax funds will be used. Building committee members tabled for two scheduled meetings approval of a preliminary scheme for parking facilities at the University of Oregon Medical and Dental Schools. An elaborate plan, including an architect's drawing, was presented for the committee's consideration.  
However, opposition from Dean David W. E. Baird, of the medical school, who said he had no recommendation as yet, succeeded in temporarily stalling committee approval.  
Baird told the committee that he wishes to try a shuttle bus system from a parking area some eight-tenths of a mile from the medical schools before the board goes further. The committee granted him until the regular board meeting after next before continuing with the parking study.  
The Westmoreland Village Housing facility for married students at the University of Oregon, Stage Four, was recommended to proceed.

## 3 Injured In Crash

A Klamath Falls man and his two young sons were injured Sunday evening in a head-on collision on Highway 97 three miles south of Dorris.  
Taken to Klamath Valley Hospital for treatment were Blayne E. Thompson, 34, 1320 Martin Street, and his sons, Lyle E., 8, and Clarence A., 10. Also injured was the driver of the other car, Larry W. Pettit, 19, Kingsbury, Calif.  
According to a report from the California Highway Patrol, Thompson, northbound on Highway 97, attempted to pass a car and truck that were stopped in the highway and collided head-on with Pettit's car, which was southbound.  
Police said the accident was caused by a third car, driven by Allen H. Russell, 76, Selah, Wash. A wire had come loose in Russell's car and police said he stopped in the highway to fix it. Russell's car had no lights. A potato truck, driven by Norbert Krebs, stopped behind Russell's car.  
The Thompson's pet dog was killed in the wreck. The accident is still under investigation.

## Charles Arave Death Reported

Word has been received here of the death of a former Klamath Falls man, Charles Arave, 24. Mr. Arave was instantly killed about dark, Friday night, Oct. 20, when the pickup truck he was driving was struck by a speeding passenger train at a crossing at Nampa, Idaho.  
An older brother, known here only as "Sonny," was critically injured and is not expected by hospital authorities to survive. Information reported the cab of the Arave vehicle was struck and the truck was totally demolished.  
Mr. Arave was employed for a short time by Sears Roebuck in Klamath Falls and was an employee of the Kuhlman Insulating Service at the time he left Klamath Falls.  
Among survivors are the widow, Karen, and three small sons, all of Nampa.
