

Select 100 Rookies Make Grade In Pros

An even 100 rookies, ranging from headlined stars who gained glory for high-powered college teams to unheralded youngsters who placed in relative obscurity for small schools, have made the grade in the National Football League.

To stay on with the 14 NFL clubs these select 100 have survived the rigors of preseason training, a lengthy exhibition schedule and six weeks of league competition without being lopped off in the various squad cutdowns or suffering the damaging injuries that have wrecked many rookie hopes this year.

Most of the first-year men are

serving their apprenticeships in secondary roles, as reserves or as spot players on kickoff and punting units. A few, however, have shown brightly enough to win regular status.

Seven stadiums from coast to coast will provide proving grounds for the newcomers again this Sunday in a full schedule of games—Philadelphia at Washington, Dallas at New York, Cleveland at St. Louis, Green Bay vs. Minnesota at Milwaukee, Chicago at Pittsburgh, Chicago at Baltimore, and Detroit at Los Angeles.

So far the rookies who have flashed most brilliantly this fall are Mike Ditka, the All-American end from Pitt, and Bill Kilmer, a multiple threat back from UCLA. Ditka took over as a first stringer for the Bears in the first exhibition game and since has established himself as a top-draw receiver, averaging over 23 yards on 19 catches and scoring four touchdowns. The versatile Kilmer is a triggerman in the San Francisco 49ers' celebrated shotgun attack and his sparkling runs have put him among the league's leading rushers.

Ditka overshadowed Kilmer last Sunday, grabbing two scoring passes as the Bears spiked the shotgun and routed the 49ers 31-0.

Longhorn Rushing Leader

NEW YORK (UPI)—Texas added the rushing offense lead to its first place hold on total offense among the major college football teams today.

The Longhorns of Texas have accounted for 437.2 yards per game overall and 321.4 per cent on the ground to go along with their unbeaten and untied record.

Mississippi, another powerhouse with a perfect record, was second in total offense, according to the latest National Collegiate Athletic Bureau figures. The Rebels have gained an average of 427.4 yards a game.

Detroit leads the nation in passing with an average of 228.3 per game while Mississippi is second at 189.0 per cent.

The total offense yardage accumulated by Texas and Mississippi established them as the best one-two punch in the country since 1952.

Notre Dame, last week's leader in ground gaining, dropped to second place with 238.0 yards per game.

West Texas State had the best scoring average, tallying a total of 198 points in five games for a 39.6 point average. Memphis State was second at 38.0 points per game.

Today's Sport Parade Good Losers Get Bum's Rush; 100 Per Cent Effort A Must

NEW YORK (UPI)—This was two years ago and the smiling little man accustomed to winning was grim in defeat.

"I don't want to be a good loser," growled Buff Donelli, coach of the long-tattered Columbia Lions. "I've taken over this team to build a winner. If I find any 'good losers,' out they go."

Now it was last Saturday and Columbia might have been expected to be walking nine feet tall.

It had won for the third time in four contests; racked up Harvard, a six point underdog, 26-14,

and beaten Yale and Harvard back to back for the first time in a decade which, incidentally, was the last time the Lions had scored two victories in a row.

But captain Billy Campbell walked off the field with the disconsolate attitude of a hard loser. "We played a bad game," he told the inquiring Donelli. "We should have won it more decisively. We didn't play up to our potential."

Donelli, privately confessing that a one-point victory was good enough for him, had to hide a smile.

"It is the attitude I've been try-

ing to create," he glowed. "Now they're not satisfied with victory. Now they want to be certain that they won by playing their best."

"This," he added with a contented chuckle, "is the kind of character I like to build. The toughest job is getting done when you not only have eliminated the team acceptance of defeat but also the acceptance of less than total victory."

Donelli's creed is that defeat of your full potential has to be acknowledged. But he will settle for nothing less than 100 per cent output. He got it in a 50-0 win over Brown, the highest Columbia grid score in 29 years.

It is his feeling too that the long-scorning Ivy League since organizing into a working conference has found the magnet which will attract, and is attracting, better football talent and eventually will put the league into a football class with any other in the land.

Top Marks Needed

"You have to be a top student in the Ivy League schools," he explained, emphasizing that it wasn't his intention to downgrade any other conference. "But with the many more high schools and better high school coaching, good students are playing good football too."

That, he figures, is where the Ivy League has an edge on some other schools.

"Let's face it," he argued. "Being a graduate of an Ivy League college has a connotation of good breeding and good education. Not that innumerable others don't have it, understand. But it's accepted as a matter of Ivy League course. There is a historic pride in being a Yale, a Columbia, a Harvard or a Princeton man."

This post-graduate value always has been recognized by good students, Donelli holds, but the scholarship standards were too demanding for many great football players.

"Now there are a great many good students who are fine football players," he summed up. "It's simply a matter of mass education. And with a swinging well-balanced conference, the Ivy League will be certain to get its share."

But, talent aside, with Columbia headed for its second winning season in 14 hungry years, Donelli is happiest over elimination of the incentive killing "good loser."

Bruins Hold Edge In Big '5' Stats

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The football season is half over and UCLA, although it has yet to play a Big Five Conference game, has indicated that as a team its Bruins will be reckoned with before the 1962 Western Rose Bowl entrant is settled.

The Bruins, along with Southern California's Trojans, lead in three team statistical departments after last week's fifth round of action. The Bruins are tops in total defense with 220 yards allowed per game; rushing defense with 132 yards a game and rushing offense with 228 yards.

The Trojans are tops in scoring—90 points; passing offense, 158 yards a game, and total offense with 309 yards a game. USC also has allowed the most points, however, 122. UCLA is second in scoring with 76 points.

Stanford leads in two categories—scoring defense with 57 points allowed and passing defense with 60 yards allowed per game. The Indians also have the most interceptions, 11.

Stanford limited Washington to only 24 yards passing last time out and the effort dropped California from its one team statistical lead. The Bears are now second behind the Indians in passing defense with 80 yards allowed per game.

Stanford is second to USC in passing offense with 107 yards.

Maris Story Voted No. 1 By Experts

NEW YORK (UPI)—The United Press International's board of baseball experts voted unanimously today that New York Yankee slugger Roger Maris' home run feats constituted the No. 1 story of the 1961 major league season.

Maris' assault on Babe Ruth's 34-year-old mark of 60 and his ultimate feat of setting a new record of 61 homers for a 162-game season were chosen as No. 1 by all 36 experts who participated in the voting.

The Cincinnati Reds' National League pennant victory ranked second in the voting with 44 points and Warren Spahn's attainment of 300 victories for his career was third with 37 points.

The firing of Frank Lane as Kansas City general manager was fourth in the voting with 12 points and the unexpected showings of the new Los Angeles Angels and Washington Senators in the expanded American League was fifth with 11 points.

Ranger Hot, Has To Be

MONTREAL (AP)—Andy Bathgate of the New York Rangers continued his hot streak last week but failed to gain any ground on his closest pursuer—Eddie Lizenberger of the Detroit Red Wings—in the National Hockey League individual scoring race.

Official NHL statistics released today show Bathgate, 29-year-old right winger, scored one goal and collected six assists in four games to extend his league-leading point-total to 15.

Lizenberger played only three games in which he scored three times and helped set up four other goals to run his point production to 12.

Bathgate leads the league in assists with 11 while Lizenberger is tied with the Montreal Canadiens' Ralph Backstrom for the lead in goals. Each has six.

Buck Claims Hockey Lead

SEATTLE (AP)—Art Jones of Portland, last season's scoring champion, was back in the tally lead this week in the Western Hockey League with nine points in the five games his team has played.

Rudy Filion of Seattle, leader after the first week of action, dropped to a three-way tie for second with his teammate, Don Chiupka, and Nick Mickoski of San Francisco. Each has eight points.

Edmonton's Denny Rigging, giving up only two goals in the last two games, cut his average to 1.67 to lead the netminders. Larry McNabb, Spokane rookie, was the penalty leader with 35 minutes of off-ice penance.

SD Stingiest

DALLAS (AP)—A glance at the team statistics shows without hesitation why San Diego is leading the American Football League by a mile.

Washington has five seconds. They include total offense, 1,547 yards; total defense, 1,266 yards; rushing offense, 1,078 yards; rushing defense, 812 yards; and scoring defense, 58 points.

USC leads in the conference standings with an 1-0 mark. Cal and Washington are at 1-1 and Stanford is 0-1.

Overall, UCLA, Washington and Stanford are 3-2, USC is 2-3 and Cal is 1-3-1.

Gentile AL Soph Of Year

NEW YORK (AP)—Jim Gentile of the Baltimore Orioles, who tied a one-season major league record with five grand slam home runs in 1961, was named American League Sophomore of the Year today.

The strapping first baseman was picked by 149 of the 170 members of the Baseball Writers Association taking part in the annual poll conducted by The Associated Press. Pitcher Steve Barber, a teammate of Gentile's, was a distant second with 12 votes.

Gentile, 27, a southpaw swinger, wielded a sizzling bat, both for average and distance. The California hit .302 and tied for seventh among the league's leading batsmen.

His 46 home runs tied him with Minnesota's Harmon Killebrew for third in the American League home run derby behind Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle. He drove in 141 runs, one less than Maris, the RBI leader.

Among Gentile's other accomplishments in his sophomore season were two grand-slam home runs in a game to tie a major league mark, two homers in a game seven times and nine RBI in a game. He scored 96 runs and his 147 hits included 23 doubles and 2 triples.

Gentile spent eight years in the Dodgers' chain before the Orioles bought him for \$25,000 on a conditional basis after the 1959 season. He failed to impress the Baltimore brass in spring training camp.

Once the 1960 regular season got underway, the 6-foot-3, 200-pounder began to click with his whiplash batting stroke. He finished his rookie campaign with a .292 average, 21 homers and 98 runs batted in.

Barber, a left-hander, had an 18-12 win-loss record while posting a 3.34 earned run average. He completed 14 of his 34 starts and pitched eight shutouts, tying him with Minnesota's Camilo Pascual for the major league high.

Others mentioned in the balloting included pitchers Bill Stafford of New York (6) and pitcher Frank Funk of Cleveland, pitcher Jack Kralick of Minnesota and catcher Jim Pagliaroni of Boston (1 each).

Caleb Choice Over Trotters

WESTBURY, N.Y. (AP)—Caleb, who holds world records for a 3-year-old trotter on both a half-mile and mile track, was made the early 21 favorite today for the \$83,175 Dexter Cup at Roosevelt Raceway Saturday night.

Seven 3-year-old trotters are entered for the mile and a sixteenth, including Harlan Dean, straight heat winner of the Hambletonian.
