

Counting Of Ballots Study Moves Forward

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's study aimed at recording and counting election ballots by midnight of election night has moved a big step forward, Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. said today.

Appling said he was vastly encouraged after viewing a test of an optical scanner last week at the Remington Rand Co. plant at Newark, Conn.

He said that the scanner accurately read the "X" marks in lead pencil off a card 3/4 by 7 1/2 inches.

Appling emphasized that he did not want to give the impression that any new system would be ready the day after tomorrow. It would require legislation to effect any new system.

The study, Appling said, is based on the premise that to put individual voting machines in each booth is too costly. The scanner suggests a way around that.

Appling said the idea now is to have only the last names and ballot measure numbers on cards, although first names would be permitted when two candidates have like first names.

Then, he said, a giant blow-up with full names and explanations of the measures would be put on the booth in front of the voter for reference.

Appling was given \$12,500 by the legislature for the study, but to date has not spent any of the money.

The optical scanner, Appling said, would permit the voter to vote in much the same way as he does not, but on a card instead of a long paper ballot.

He said law officers would bring the marked cards in locked containers to the central point for the machine counting.

Cloud Hovers Over Needle Cloud

POINT ARGUELLO, Calif. (AP)—That cloud of needles the United States unloaded in the heavens has turned out to be a storm cloud.

For the first time, a U.S. space project is being criticized not because of its lack of scope or success but for its very nature.

The criticism began even before a Midas satellite shot into orbit from this Air Force launch site Saturday. Aboard were 350 million tiny copper needles.

They were released at an altitude of 2,100 miles and the hope is they eventually will spread out and form a belt around the earth. Scientists think radio signals can be aimed at such a belt and bounced halfway around the world.

Some people, including the Soviets, vigorously oppose the experiment.

The Soviet news agency Tass calls the project "anti-scientific" and says it was undertaken "in spite of the fact that many scientists of the world protested against these American plans, stating that they will create difficulties in exploring cosmic space."

Tea Party Offer Angers Boston Council

BOSTON (AP) — Patrick F. McDonough, Irish-born president of the Boston City Council, came down with a severe case of indignation today.

His adopted town was accused of winking on what a British tea company said was a just debt.

"Boston is capable of handling its own affairs as it has since 1630," said McDonough. "This includes money, tea and the British Empire."

What stirred the Irish in McDonough?

It all began when a London tea company claimed Boston owed it for the tea tossed into Boston Harbor in 1773. On the Pacific Coast, Mayor J. W. Snider of Medford, Ore., heard of the British claim.

Mayor Snider immediately dispatched his check for \$1.96 to the British claimant, as Medford's share of the bill.

That's when McDonough got angry. He whipped out his checkbook, wrote out a check for \$1.96, and sent it to Snider with a vehement letter.

"I strongly suspect," wrote McDonough, "the tea belonged to the East India Company, not the present claimants. But even if it was their tea, as they claim, everybody knows it was dumped not by Bostonians, but by Indians."

(As historical documents attest, the tea-tossers of 1773 were garbed in Indian dress, or undress. Some detractors have contended the rebellious group included colonists in breeding but savage by nature.)

Rail Merge Talks Open

SEATTLE (UPI) — The battle between the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific for control of the Western Pacific moved to this city today with the opening of a two-day Interstate Commerce Commission hearing.

The hearings began July 27 in San Francisco with subsequent sessions at Los Angeles and Salt Lake City. A three-week period, ending Nov. 17, has been scheduled for final presentations in San Francisco.

Most of the testimony here was expected to favor the Santa Fe. The Seattle and Tacoma Chambers of Commerce, Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission, and Seattle Traffic Association were among the groups backing the Santa Fe purchase plan.
