

SHA, Malin Tussle Features B Slate

The Sacred Heart Trojans, undefeated in three County B League football games thus far this season, come up against the biggest stumbling block in the league this Saturday afternoon. If they wish to maintain their winning string they have to figure out a way to stall the hard-charging Mustang side-saddle offense which they face in Malin at 1:30 o'clock.

The Trojans and the Mustangs each own 5-1 overall season records, the SHA club having col-

lected its lone defeat at the hands of the A-2 St. Mary's Crusaders in the non-counting season-opener while the Mustangs bowed to Chiloquin in their first league action of the year.

Provided they get past the Malin herd the Trojans are still not necessarily out of the woods, since their 1961 finale is a contest with the Tulelake Honkers in Gem Stadium the following week.

The Honkers are favored this Friday night when they open the B loop action as guests of the Merrill Huskies under the Merrill lights at 7:30 p.m.

A Tulelake win and a Sacred Heart loss would tie the two clubs at 3-1 each for second place behind the Mustangs.

The Honkers are 3-2 for the season and have a 2-1 league mark. Merrill is 1-5 overall, and 1-2 in conference play.

The Saturday afternoon battle in Malin pairs clubs that are nearly identical in both offensive and defensive statistics.

Coach Marv DelPlante's Trojan eleven has scored 154 points while permitting its opponents to collect 39. Coach Bob Graham's crew has amassed 150 points and given up only 36 over the six-game route.

The entire burden of defensive proof Saturday does not all belong to the Trojans. The SHA eleven also claims a novel offensive style, one that could pose a problem or two for its hosts.

DelPlante has installed a closed double-wing type offense that is steered by quarterback Jerry DeNault and includes halfbacks Doug Murray and Bob Neeley plus fullback Mike Holland.

Graham's unique single-wing is guided by quarterback Bob Steyskal and features big tailback Larry Rick, running mate fullback Nick Johnson, and little Bob Holt.

The clubs break about even in beef across the forward wall, provided Trojan soph Chuck McNoise is sufficiently recovered from an injury. McNoise is a 240-pounder who can make a lot of difference.

The Mustangs have a height advantage at one end slot in the person of 6-4 pass-grabber Dick Clark and claim good speed in Chuck Henderson at the other.

DelPlante's ends are Keith Murray and Shan Britton, both of whom are proven veterans.

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NY's Mantle Earns Third Batting Title

NEW YORK (AP) — Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees, who took a back seat to teammate Roger Maris in the 1961 home run race, captured the American League slugging crown for the third time with a .687 percentage.

Cincinnati's Frank Robinson won the National League slugging title for the second straight season with a .613 average, figures compiled by The Associated Press revealed today.

A year ago Mantle accumulated the most total bases in the junior circuit, but Maris wound up the slugging leader at .581. This season it was the reverse, Maris leading in total bases and Mantle topping the sluggers.

Mantle, whose 54 home runs were second best to Maris' record of 61, accounted for 353 total bases in 514 at bats. Among his 163 hits were 18 doubles and 6 triples. The 30-year-old switch-hitter had previously annexed the slugging crown in 1955 with .611 and 1956 with .705.

Robinson, whose productive bat was instrumental in the Reds' winning the National League pennant, collected 334 total bases in 545 trips. The wiry right-handed swinger's extra-base output included 33 doubles, 7 triples and 37 homers among his 176 hits.

Panthers Hold Off JV Threat To Win 13-12 Modoc Squeaker

The Old Statue of Liberty play got a brief revival on Modoc Field Tuesday night but it wasn't really planned and it worked against rather than for the Klamath Union Jayvees.

With 47 seconds left in the ball game and the Jayvees trailing 13-12, KU quarterback Rick Horn faded back and cocked his arm while searching for a loose receiver. He didn't find one soon enough so Chiloquin Panther end Al Wilder picked the ball off Horn's hand and scampered 61 yards to dash the young Pels' victory hope. He was stopped short of the goal line and the game ended 13-12 for Chiloquin.

For the Chiloquin eleven the narrow non-league win was the fourth of the season. The loss was the sixth straight for the Jayvees.

Down 7-0 at the half the JV unit came back to crack the scoreboard with 8:42 left in the third quarter when halfback Chuck Mills went 11 yards around end for six points, but a conversion pass from quarterback Rick Horn to Roger Rodgers was incomplete.

Wingback Benny Nygren, who scored the Panthers' first TD on a 60-yard romp around end with 7:28 left in the first quarter, counted the second Chiloquin score with just 2:34 left in the game as he bombed in from the four. A run by Bob Bojorcus for the extra point was no good.

The Pels made it 13-12 just 44 seconds later as Horn connected with Mills on a spectacular 75-yard pass play but the attempted run for the extra-point was short.

The KU eleven got new life when it recovered an onside kick and moved down to the Panther 25 on a 32-yard pass from Horn to Mills.

Horn then hit Tom Day with a 15-yard aerial to set up the crucial loss of the ball.

The horn sounded as the Panthers kept to the ground for two plays.

The squeaky win may have cost the Panthers the services of fullback Al DeBortoli who was carried from the field with a leg injury early in the second period.

Nygren was the big gainer for the winners with 114 net yards in 21 carries. Bob Bojorcus, who moved into the backfield after DeBortoli's injury, was next with 83 yards in 14 trips.

Mills, with 66 yards in eight carries, and 107 yards in pass completions, was high for KU.

Fullback Mike Petrick, who

sat out the opening periods with a pulled muscle came in the ball game to carry the ball four times and gain a total of 50 yards, including one 41-yard romp.

Horn completed three of seven, pass attempts while Nygren, who handled the Panther passing missed on all three of his tries, tries.

Minnesota Q-Back Proves Big Factor

If anyone mentioned Sandy Stephens' name a year ago, it was an effort trying to place him as the quarterback of the national champion Minnesota Gophers. "They just weren't a team of back-field stars."

It's different this year. The Gophers are right in the middle of the fight for a second successive Big Ten title, and the 6-foot Stephens is the man at the helm.

After a 6-0 opening loss to Missouri, Stephens has come back to take an active hand in every touchdown—eight in all—that the Gophers have scored in winning three consecutive games.

Unlike most quarterbacks, the senior from Uniontown, Pa., is not an outstanding passer. He completed only 35.3 per cent a year ago, and until a torrid 7-for-12 against Illinois, missed 35 of 43 in the three preceding 1961 games.

Stephens may have to go it alone this week against Michigan. Jerry Pelletier, who has spelled him on defense, is out with a shoulder separation and Stephens may have to play both ways.

Princeton's Dick Coleman is worried about an aerial attack—his own. Noting his team completed only 2 of 13 passes for 14 yards in a 15-0 loss to Colgate last week, he remarked, "We've got to work on throwing under pressure" as he drilled for Cornell.

Penn won't have No. 1 tailback John Owens for its game against Rutgers this week and Mickey Brown will probably take his place. Oklahoma put Paul Lea into the first-string left halfback post and had ends John Porterfield and Dale Perini in scrimmage for the first time in nearly two weeks.

Maryland will still be without backs Dennis Condie and Bob Burton against South Carolina while the Citadel, atop the Southern Conference, may miss halfback Eddie Taylor for its non-league clash against Xavier.

Iowa State Coach Clay Stapleton moved fullback Dave Hoover to tailback on the alternate unit for Ozzie Clay, who is out for the year with a knee injury. At Penn State, Don Jonas, restricted by a dislocated collarbone, will be limited to nothing but extra points and field goals for four weeks.

Kansas may lose its two top tackles, Stan Kirshman and Dick Davis, and end Mike Dear, with various ailments, for this week's game against Oklahoma State while Northwestern's leading ground gainer, Bill Swingle, is not expected to play against Notre Dame because of a lame knee.

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Ole Miss, Spartans Favored

NEW YORK (UPI)—Top-ranked Michigan State and second-ranked Mississippi are such overwhelming favorites for their next engagements Saturday that the oddsmakers declined to list them on their weekend "line."

Michigan State, which succeeded Mississippi as the No. 1 team in the UPI major college football ratings this week, entertains Indiana Saturday while Ole Miss hosts Vanderbilt.

Last season, the Spartans walloped Indiana, 35-0, and Mississippi shut out Vanderbilt, 26-0.

All the other top 10 teams are stout favorites. Third-ranked Texas is picked to defeat Rice by at least 14 points, and fourth-ranked Alabama is a 13-point favorite over Houston.

Sixth-ranked Ohio State is also picked by 13 points over Wisconsin in the nationally televised game of the week.

The Southwest Conference clash between Baylor and Texas A&M is the only even-money game on the list.
