

Quota Foe Sends Bill With Wheat

HILLSDALE, Mich. (AP)—Farmer Ralph Shinaberry unloaded 60 bags of wheat at the government's door today along with a "bill" for \$2,544.10.

It was the newest move in seven years of tussling between Uncle Sam and Shinaberry, a foe of farm quotas.

The 69-year-old farmer trucked in wheat—he estimated it at 97 1/3 bushels—which he had stored since 1954 when the government first cracked down on him for violation of quota restrictions.

He piled it beneath the window of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office here.

The 97 1/3 bushels, Shinaberry said, was all that remained from the 560 bushels in excess of the quota. The rest has spoiled.

Shinaberry had a quota of nine acres in 1954. He raised wheat on 23 acres. The government fined him \$638.48 at a bushel rate for the excess.

Shinaberry said in a prepared statement that the government has a lien on this wheat "and it can't be sold. As long as it belongs to the government, it is being delivered to the ASC."

The farmer itemized his bill as follows: \$1,187.20 for the original 560 bushels, \$730.80 for storage costs over 87 months, and \$626.10 interest on the income he would have received had he been allowed to sell the wheat in the first place.

The Hillsdale Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office reacted quickly, announcing it could not accept the wheat and saying the grain was in poor condition anyway.

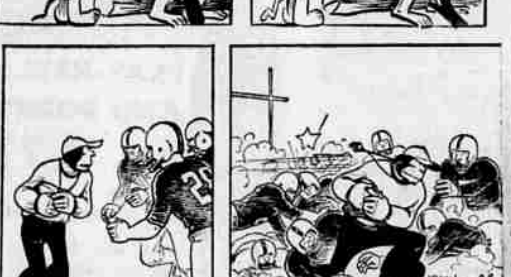
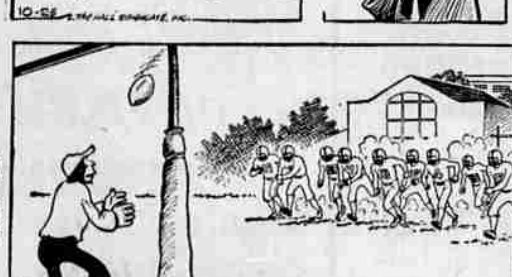
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
