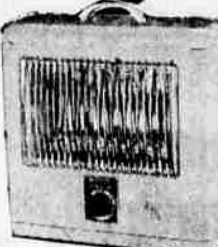

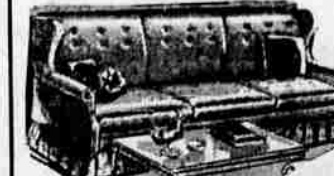

Lt. Highland Joins Training

Plan Passes Malt Barley

Because a substantial part of the malting-type barley produced in the United States normally is grown in what is now the severe drought area, special provisions are included in the 1962 feed grain program for barley to assure adequate supplies of this grain, according to Earl Wilson, chairman, Klamath County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

No producer of acceptable varieties of malting barley will be required to participate in the 1962 feed grain program as a means of qualifying for price support provided he has previously produced this type grain and plants barley only of an acceptable malting variety for harvest in 1962. Also, he must not have a barley acreage on the farm in 1962 in excess of 110 per cent of the average he had for 1959-60.
