Court Reopens Phone Rate Plea

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The ruling involved the amount of an increase that the company should get for rates on interstate service based on its Oregon properties, which were held by Pacific Northwest Bell, a subsidiary. Morgan allowed an increase of \$750,000 out of \$1,850,000 requested. Morgan, the court said, refused to make allocations of investment increase items between intra-state and interstate commerce based on recognized standards adopted by the utility industry and other states.

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The spokesman for the PUC office said Morgan substituted the findings of the PUC staff and hired consultants. He said that the Oregon PUC office had never officially adopted the national manual.

The spokesman added that it is impossible to say now if the ruling would bring an additional telephone rate increase. He did say he doubted that any possible increase would be retroactive.

In considering interstate rates, the court said, Morgan related to consider an amount of more than \$6 million in plant and investment and some \$43,000 in expenses and taxes that result from it.

The court said that Morgan reached his conclusions based upon a formula which in effect valued interstate calls at three times as much as local calls.

"The record," the court concluded, "does not warrant holding that an interstate call does have such an increased value."

Justices Kenneth O'Connell and Gordon Sloan dissented on the grounds that Morgan's order was based upon rational grounds and should be upheld. The majority opinion was written by Justice George Rosman.

Dairymen Vote Down Milk Pool

SALEM (AP)—Some 1,100 dairymen from northwest Oregon and neighboring southwest Washington voted down a market-wide milk pool, the state Agriculture Department said today.

Director J. F. Short said the mail referendum vote was 894 to 464 against the market-wide pool. The referendum was conducted under the state milk stabilization act, which permits the department to set a floor price that distributors can pay dairymen for both milk and cream.

Dairy Cooperative, Portland, had petitioned for the market-wide pool referendum.

The dairymen in the Portland-Salem marketing area, which was involved, now operate under distributor pools.

Under distributor pools the distributors must pay a minimum of \$5.80 per hundred pounds for both milk and cream, but there is no minimum for so-called surplus milk. This means that the dairymen get a blend price which is the average of the two, including what is paid for the surplus milk bought for manufacturing use.

A market-wide pool would have required that the amount of bottle and can milk price which dairymen would get be the same in all distributor pools.

This would have meant that some with a higher share of bottle and can milk would have had to pay equalization money to others. Now the percentage of bottle and can milk varies from pool to pool. Counties in the Portland-Salem marketing area are Clatsop, Yamhill, Pacific and Klickitat in Washington, and Lincoln, Tillamook and Clackamas in Oregon and Clark, Waukegan, Skamania, Coville, and Pacific and Klickitat in Washington.

Soviets Call American Bomb Claim 'Mongering'

LONDON (AP)—Moscow radio said today America's claim to be able to strike a crushing nuclear counterblow is "mongering" that doesn't frighten the Soviet Union.

The broadcast replied to Deputy Defense Secretary Roswell L. Gilpatric, who said last week that the United States' second nuclear blow in a war would be as good as the Soviet Union's first.

"In a fit of hysterics," said the broadcast beamed to North America, "Gilpatric went so far as to threaten the whole world with the U.S.A.'s nuclear supremacy."

"Who can be frightened by all this? Perhaps former President Eisenhower, who recently expressed the desire to have an atomic bomb shelter built on his farm."

"As for the U.S.S.R. Gilpatric is wasting his time with bellicose speeches, for although the Soviet people do not want war, they will not be bullied by such warmongering."

"The U.S.S.R. has sufficient strength and means to rebuff any threat of aggression."

Eisenhower said in New York, N.Y., last week that he had been urged to build a fallout shelter on his Gettysburg, Pa. farm as an example for the rest of the nation. But he added that he had not done so because he thought this would alarm people.

He also said that he would leave a fallout shelter in the rest of his family were exposed during an attack because "I wouldn't want to be the last man standing."

SP Strike Pact Sought

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Efforts continued today to reach agreement on a job security clause in a bargaining agreement between the Southern Pacific railroad and a telegraphers union.

Representatives from the railroad and the Order of Railroad Telegraphers met twice with federal officials in the offices of Labor Undersecretary W. Willard Wirtz.

There was no word from either side as to what progress was being made toward a settlement.

A union spokesman said only that it was "too early to predict one way or the other whether an agreement can be reached."

The union is seeking a clause in its bargaining agreement that would protect telegraphers from loss of their jobs as a result of automation and reductions in passenger service.
