

# Regular Economy Meets To Chart U.S. Goals

WASHINGTON (AP)—Regular conferences of top civilian and government leaders to chart annual goals for the entire American economy soon will be proposed to President Kennedy by his labor-management advisers.

The idea is to suggest limits and guidelines in such sectors as government spending, business investment and profits and wages and prices, in the hope the recommendations will be followed to insure stability and steady growth.

The plan is to put more persuasiveness behind the "hold the line" appeals voiced by Kennedy and his recent presidential predecessors while still avoiding a controlled economy.

While everyone would remain free to make his own economic decisions, it is felt that all would become more morally bound to act responsibly within the publicly stated economic goals.

The proposal for such annual goal-setting conferences is understood to be contained in a draft report of the wage-price subcommittee of Kennedy's Labor-Management Advisory Committee.

It is one of several sets of recommendations due to be submitted to Kennedy when the 21-man advisory group, made up of public, business and labor representatives, meets here again late next month.

The advisory panel, headed by Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg, has four other subcommittees readying reports for the White House on such subjects as bargaining and industrial peace, "economic growth and unemployment," "productivity and higher standards of living" and "policies to insure American products are competitive in world markets."

Prof. George W. Taylor of the University of Pennsylvania is chairman of the subcommittee on "sound wage and price policies." Members include such businessmen as Henry Ford II and labor leaders George Meany and Walter Reuther.

The wage-price report is also said to affirm the principle that wages and salaries, including the fringe benefits such as pensions,

Photo Man Testifies

PORTLAND (AP)—A former commercial photographer said in Portland's mail fraud trial Wednesday that a firm he worked for in 1958 photographed 2,788 automobile accidents that year.

The witness, Rodney M. Alloway, testified for the defense in the trial of 10 defendants accused of staging fake automobile accidents to defraud insurance companies.

Alloway said his firm monitored the accidents from police radio calls, without opposition from law enforcement agencies.

Such monitoring no longer is condoned, Alloway said.

Of the total number of accidents photographed, 11 pictures were ordered during 1958 by Phillip Weinstein, Portland attorney who is one of the defendants, Alloway testified.

Dwight Schwab, defense counsel for Weinstein, said the filming of these accidents was well known and Weinstein was one of many who had access to the photographs.

Because these pictures were available, Schwab said, earlier testimony by Leland Deegan, Bend, was "ridiculous."

"Weinstein is accused by Deegan of having told Deegan to go out and bash up the rear end of his car," Schwab said. Deegan had testified that Weinstein told him to back his car into a tree because it was not damaged enough by an accident.

# Demos Strike Back At Ike's Attack

WASHINGTON (AP)—With the White House silent, four Senate Democrats struck back today against an attack by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower on Kennedy administration fiscal policies and the Peace Corps.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said Eisenhower was engaging in "campaign oratory" when he said in New York Tuesday that the administration's budget policies are "shrinking dollars" and that the Peace Corps is a "juvenile experiment."

"When the former president talked about deficits in his purely political speech," Mansfield said, "he should have been reminding that in one year during his administration the nation had the highest peacetime deficit in its history, \$12.5 billion."

"I am glad he is willing to admit that the nation has attained a state of prosperity. I hope he recalls that when President Kennedy took over from him we were in a state of recession."

Mansfield said Congress had given its overwhelming approval to establishment of the Peace Corps. He added that he hopes it will "be given an opportunity to prove its worth before it is condemned for purely political reasons."

Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., said in a separate interview he was disappointed that Eisenhower would express critical opinions about the Peace Corps.

"I think he has caused hurt to a lot of very sincere American young men and women who are showing a dedication to their nation that ought to be encouraged," Hart said.

Sen. Maurice B. Neuberger, D-

Ore., said she thought Eisenhower had "betrayed his own position" by suggesting sarcastically that a Peace Corps member be sent to the moon because that was an underdeveloped country.
