

Huskies Favored Saturday

EUGENE (AP) — Oregon football coach Len Casanova scheduled a light workout for his squad members today. The team will travel by bus to Portland tonight where they will clash with the Washington Huskies Saturday.

Casanova has stressed defensive workouts all week, in hopes of stopping the potent attack of Jim Owens' two-time Rose Bowl champions.

Washington is favored over the Ducks, and if the game goes according to expectations, it will be the seventh straight win for the Huskies in the series between the two schools.

The last time Oregon won was in 1964, when it got a 26-7 triumph. Washington has managed a one-point victory in the last two years, 7-6 in 1960 and 13-12 in 1959.

Casanova, short on backfield strength due to injuries, said sophomore speedster Mel Renfro definitely will not be in action Saturday.

Rematch Possible

NEW YORK (AP) — Sugar Ray Robinson will meet Denny Moyer of Portland, Ore., in a rematch, matchmaker Teddy Brenner said today, but not until after he fights Canada's Willie Greaves for a second time.

Brenner said Robinson told him he is committed to fight Greaves in Pittsburgh Dec. 8, causing a delay in the Moyer bout at Madison Square Garden until Jan. 6. Robinson outpointed Greaves in Detroit Sept. 25 and Moyer at the Garden last Monday.

Hornet Seniors Face Final Test

Henley football coach Len Weber puts his squarely up to his senior Hornet griders who are playing the final game of their careers at 7:30 tonight when they host Eagle Point in the feature of the Henley 1961 Homecoming.

Said Weber, who, with a 4-2-1 record for the current season, is winding up his third year at the Hornet helm, "I expect an all-out effort from our seniors. This is their final game and one they should really want to win. If we don't get that effort, they'll all be replaced by underclassmen and we'll call it a 'bust' and gain some experience for next season."

Although Henley and Eagle Point are hooked for third place on the Rogue League ladder, each with 3-2 records, the dopesheets give the visitors an edge that calls for a maximum-plus effort on the part of the Hornets.

Led by Steve Geren, a 175-pound blocking back (quarterback when they use the T) Dick Wilson, fullback Bob Bonner, a 215-pound sophomore, and wingback Sam Charters, also spearheaded EP's "backwards" single-wing to a crushing 33-0 win over Rogue River.

Rated second only to RR loop champion Phoenix's Mike Conbruck, Geren is more shifty if not as powerful and has been named Oregon prep player of the week.

Special halftime ceremonies are planned for the evening, said Weber.

Vicki Fairchild will be crowned queen of the Homecoming celebration.

Trojans Get Shot At Title

The Sacred Heart Trojans get their big chance tomorrow afternoon in Malin.

Undeclared in County B League football to date, the SHA eleven can pull down the championship if they can stop the determined host Mustang squad.

Game time is 1:30 p.m. on the Mustang's home gridiron.

Tonight the Tulelake Honkers and the Merrill Huskies resume their rivalry in a nonconference slated for the Merrill field at 7:30.

Although each of the county schools meet the Honkers in regular season play, the California eleven is not considered in title competition.

The Trojans, probably the "thinest" squad in the loop, may get some aid from the flu bug tomorrow.

Questionable starters for the test are tailback Larry Rick, a 200-pound Malin powerhouse, and regular guard Bill Whitman. Both were missing from school today because of illness and it could not be determined whether they would be ready for action Saturday.

Rick, the biggest gainer for the Mustangs, could hurt them badly with an absence. A hole left by Whitman in the line would also be hard to fill, according to coach Bob Graham.

The Mustangs, 5-1 for the season, are 2-1 in league play, will be out of the race should the Trojans defeat them. The SHA club, also 5-1, is 3-0 in B action.

Should the Mustangs grab a win tomorrow afternoon the league will be in a two way tie for first and must wait for the Chiloquin Panthers to play their final test next weekend in Merrill against the Huskies.

A Chiloquin win next week and a Malin victory tomorrow would knot all three teams in the lead. The method for picking the team to represent District 5B in the playoffs has not yet been revealed.

Tonight the Merrill squad, 1-5 for the season, is rated the definite underdog against Tule. The Honkers have a 3-2 string going for them.

Bookmakers Pull Booboo

DETROIT (UPI) — Oddsmakers made a mistake that might prove costly when they distributed some 70,000 betting cards covering Saturday's collegiate football schedule.

An error, typographical or human, appeared on the cards and made two highly touted teams only slight favorites in the weekly betting.

In suburban Wyandotte, Mich., the cards covering 68 games listed Army only one point over West Virginia and Texas seven points over Rice. The smart money throughout the country generally conceded that the Cadets should trip the Mountaineers by at least two touchdowns and Texas should win over Rice by 14 points.

Oregon Tech Defenses Scheduled For Tough Assignment In Arcata

The Oregon Tech offense, still the best among the Oregon Collegiate Conference clubs, gets what should be its stiffest test of the season tomorrow night in Arcata when they hook up with the powerful Humboldt State Lumberjacks.

However, the Techmen are planning some offensive surprises for the host club, and one Owl player in particular, fullback Stan Glass, has a very definite plan in mind.

Glass, who led the conference sod-gainers until an injured hand forced him to turn over some of the fullback chores to Harvey Graham, is now back in shape and is hoping to reclaim

his lead and spark the Techmen to some scoring of their own.

Bob Pennell of Oregon College of Education took a 68-yard lead in individual rushing statistics with a 157-yard effort against Portland State last Saturday to dislodge Glass as the conference's leading ground gainer.

Pennell has picked up 490 yards in four games and has averaged 5.2 per carry in 94 times with the ball. Glass dropped to third place while SOC's Al Barnes moved into second place with 422 yards. Glass has gained 393 yards.

There were no other major changes in individual statistics although Bill White of Portland State increased his scoring lead over SOC's Howard Hartman. White has scored 8 TDs for 43 points while Hartman has 31 points.

Conference coaches voted OCE's quarterback Chuck Burns "Back of the Week" for directing the Wolves victory over Portland State. Other backs receiving mention were Bob Bates of EOC, Wayne Dennis of OTI, Doyle Branson of SOC and Bill White of PSC. "Lineman of the Week" honors went to SOC's defensive stand-out, linebacker John Buck, for his outstanding effort against Oregon Tech. Others mentioned were Richard Barr of EOC, Jim Madden of OTI, Gary Weber of PSC and OCE's tackle Herb Hermann and end Bruce Carpenter. Southern Oregon continues to set the team offensive pace with an average of 282.5 yards per game. The Red Raiders lead in pass offense with an average of 120 yards per game. Oregon College of Education is setting the rushing pace with an average of 215.0 yards per contest. Defensively Oregon Tech sets the pace. The Owls have given up 237.3 yards a game. They lead in rush defense with an average of 140.3 yards a game and are second to Eastern Oregon in pass defense. EOC has given up only 70.2 yards a game to opposing passers and Tech has yielded 96.0 yards per game.

Jayvees, Freshmen Set Tilts

Both the Klamath Union freshman and Jayvee football squads see action at home Saturday, the frosh in an entanglement with Hedrick Junior High beginning at 1:30 p.m. on Modoc followed by the Jayvees as they host the Alturas Modoc Braves at 7 o'clock.

The flu bug has been giving the frosh unit some trouble. Three players and head coach Al Keck were sidelined as of press time today, and their appearances Saturday are still doubtful.

Should Keck be unable to show, assistants Don Herbig and Delance Duncan will take over.

Terry Rogers, Larry Robertson and Bob Moss are the doubtful players.

The frosh offensive unit will include Jim Drew at quarterback, halfbacks Rick Gustafson and newcomer Bob Forbes, and fullback Ben Kern.

Terry Eccles and Jack Bauer will go at ends; Lyle Haney and Terry Ash will handle tackle jobs; John Jendrezewski and Tom Osa are set at guards and Jim Patzke draws the center assignment.

The frosh, 2-2 for the season, will wind up next Saturday when they tangle with Ashland there.

Coach Jack Peterson's JV squad will get some aid from the varsity for the Alturas action. No seniors are among the "help" received and only players who see little varsity action are included.

Offensively Peterson will start quarterback Rick Horn, halfbacks Chuck Mills and Bud Wolter, and either Bill Bianchi or Vern Petrick at fullback.

His line will include ends Fred Kelly and John Parisotto, tackles Bill Mills and Terry Christiansen, guards Steve Campbell and John Elliott, and center Roy Marvin.

His defensive setup will include Grover Dahn, Petrick, Ray Taylor, Jay Paxton and Marvin in the backfield while Mike Kitching, John English, Thurston Henzel, Kent Puckett, Bill Crain and Larry Niemi are set for line duty.

Carry Back Mystery May See Solution

The Carry Back mystery may be solved with the running of Saturday's \$75,000-added Trenton Handicap at Garden State Park.

Carry Back is the 3-year-old colt who won the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness, then missed his chance for the coveted triple crown by finishing up the track in the Belmont Stakes.

After the Belmont, early in June, it was disclosed Carry Back had injured an ankle during the race. He did not race again until Aug. 26 when he won the Neptune Purse at Atlantic City. He won the Jerome Handicap at Belmont on Sept. 2, but since then has lost three straight.

Is Carry Back lame or isn't he? Jack Price, who trains the colt for his wife, Katherine, has not been saying much this week, so it is up to Carry Back to supply the answer himself in the Trenton.

Expected to enter the mile and one-quarter race against older horses is another 3-year-old colt, Ambipose. Sherlock, who beat Carry Back in the Belmont and Lawrence Realization, is another 3-year-old possibility.

OSU Passer Earns Praise

CORVALLIS (AP) — The pass catching of Don Kasso in workouts this week has been praised by the Oregon State football coaching staff.

Kasso, who recently was put in the split end position after playing halfback regularly, looked good on the receiving end of passes from Terry Baker, despite heavy rain in workouts Thursday.

Oregon State has an open date Saturday, but kept up steady workouts this week, concentrating on pass defense — a weak point in four losses out of five games this season.

Pressure On 49ers Sunday

CHICAGO (UPI) — San Francisco Forty Niner coach Red Hickey said today that he hopes his squad will be "mentally tough" when it meets Pittsburgh Sunday.

Hickey was optimistic about his team's chances after Thursday's practice which he labeled the "best we've had in three weeks."

The pressure will be on the Forty Niners to rebound after last week's 31-0 whitewash by Chicago. The Bears' five-two defense and Forty Niner mistakes both contributed to the one-sided result.
