Soph QB In Action At Miami

The Miami Hurricanes, which have won only two of five games and have lost their last two, hope to begin the college football season all over again tonight when they meet a strong University of North Carolina team in Miami's Orange Bowl.

But for teams like Michigan State, ranked first nationally in the current Associated Press poll, Mississippi, Texas and Alabama, the winning habit, cultivated with the opening game, should continue this weekend.

For Miami, off last week, a new start is contemplated. George Mira, the flashy sophomore quarterback who has been hobbled by injuries since the victory over Kentucky, is expected to see action. As Mira goes, so go the Hurricanes for he has not played in the last two games and saw only limited action in a 25-8 victory over Penn State.

George Washington (3-3) takes on Boston University (1-4) in the night's other major activity.

Michigan State (4-0), after two clutch wins over Michigan and Notre Dame, takes on Indiana in a Big Ten game. The Spartans, in a four-way tie for the conference lead with fifth-ranked Iowa, sixth-ranked Ohio State and Minnesota, should make it with plenty to spare.

Ohio State (3-0-1) meets Wisconsin (2-2) in the day's national television game (ABC-TV, 2:30 p.m., Eastern Standard Time) while Iowa (4-0) plays Purdue (2-2) and Minnesota (3-1) takes on Michigan (3-1) in the Little Brown Jug game. Each of the four Big Ten leaders has a 2-0 conference mark.

Mississippi, looking to next week's crucial Southeastern Conference clash against Louisiana State (No. 7) has a homecoming date against Vanderbilt (2-3). Ole Miss is 5-0 so far and has not lost in 20 games.

Alabama, atop the SEC with 4-0, is out of the conference against Houston (2-2-1) while Texas (5-0) plays what may be its last obstacle for the Southwest Conference title when it meets Rice (2-2-1). The third-ranked Longhorns, which easily beat tough Arkansas last week, are 2-0 in the SWC and Rice is 1-0. Notre Dame, ranked eighth with a 3-1 mark, meets Northwestern (2-2), ninth-ranked Georgia Tech (4-1) plays Tulane (1-4) in another SEC game and Big Eight leader Colorado (4-0) plays winless Oklahoma (0-4) in a conference tilt.

Bruins Set For Big Five Debut; Webfoot Duo Ready For Huskies

UCLA's Bruins, the pre-season favorites, stage their debut in Big Five Conference football competition Saturday when they invade Stanford to test the Indian defenses.

That game marks the only conference action as California travels to meet Penn State's powerful forces at University Park and Southern California hosts winless Illinois.

Northwest fans see a continuation of the Washington-Oregon rivalry in a game at Portland, Washington State and San Jose State match their aerial offenses at Spokane, and Idaho goes to the

underdog at Utah State. Oregon State gets the week off.

UCLA didn't complete a pass last week in beating Pittsburgh 20-6 but the Bruins boast a pair of fine running tailbacks in starter Bobby Smith and sophomore Mike Haffner. The latter, who started last week when Smith was hobbled by a leg injury, leads the Big Five in rushing with 337 yards. Smith ranks close behind with 330.

Although Stanford hasn't passed as much as in previous years, the Indians probably will take to the air against the big UCLA line. Defensively, Stanford is better than in recent years.

Washington, with its fleet set of backs led by Charlie Mitchell, rates as the favorite over an Oregon team that has been beset by injuries. Off the medical list this week, however, are fullback Mike Caechter and rightback Jim Josephson.

San Jose State and Washington State boast two of the leading collegiate passers. The Spartans' Chon Gallegos heads the list with 62 completions for 706 yards and six touchdowns. Mel Melin of Washington State has hit 52 times for 611 yards and four tallies. Melin's favorite target, end Hugh Campbell, is the nation's

leading receiver with 33 receptions for 456 yards.

California, after losing to Southern California 28-14, faces more trouble in the Penn State crew. The Nittany Lions got quarter-back Galt Hall into full action last week after injuries sidelined him on Sept. 29. He promptly led Penn State to a 14-0 victory over Syracuse.

California's Randy Gold, meanwhile, was having one of his worst afternoons as he missed his first seven passes against USC.

Star halfback Willie Brown of the Trojans saw little service in that one but should get more use this week against the Illini.

Rule Changes Favoring The 'Little Man'

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Rule changes aimed at bringing the little man back in basketball will be featured tonight when the new American Basketball League presents its opening game.

The San Francisco Saints and Los Angeles Jets will play here in the ABL inaugural, Abe Saperstein, founder and president of the eight-team loop, will be on hand for opening ceremonies.

The rest of the league commences firing next week. Other teams include Hawaii and Kansas City along with the two California teams in the Western Division and an Eastern Division comprised of Pittsburgh, Washington, Cleveland and Chicago.

New Rules

The most striking feature of the new league is the three-point reward for shots made from beyond a radius of 25 feet. In exhibition play, the long shots have not been tried too frequently, but several tight battles were broken up with long set shots in the final seconds.

A second rule change gives the offensive team 30 seconds in which to take a shot, instead of the 24 seconds permitted by the rival National Basketball Association.

A third switch finds the free-throw line 18 feet wide at the base line, tapering to 12 feet at the free-throw circle in an attempt to keep the big boys out from under the backboards as much as possible.

Actually, only the three-pointer is brand new to basketball. The other two are borrowed from Olympic Games regulations.

The league will play an 80-game split season with the division winners meeting at the halfway mark and again at the finish. Should the same team win both division playoffs, there will be no further series; otherwise a best four-out-of-seven affair will decide the champion.

The Saints, coached by Phil Woolpert, are considered one of the loop's strongest teams. Woolpert collared two NBA veteran forwards in Mike Farmer and Ken Sears and has added 6-foot-10 inch center Jim Francis, star of the National Industrial Basketball League for several years.

Gene Brown and Whitey Bell are the starting guards.

The Jets will present some familiar faces, too, including player-coach Bill Sharman, perennial NBA all-star for the world champion Boston Celtics, and George (Bird) Yardley, former Stanford ace and the first NBA player ever to score 2,000 points.

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Wealthy Old-Timer Leads Benefit Battle

NEW YORK (UPI) — Frank Crosetti, one of the wealthiest players in baseball, is in the forefront of a battle by some 100 other old-timers to be included in the increased pension benefits distributed by the Major League Players Association.

The old timers are accusing the chairman of the owners pension committee and the association with attempting to "freeze" them out of projected boosts in benefits. Crosetti, who has shared in 19 World Series pots as a player and coach with the New York Yankees, receives \$175 a month and wants \$250.

The former Yankee shortstop, currently a coach, has engaged attorney J. Norman Lewis of New York City in an effort to induce the Players Association to include himself and the other old-timers in increased pension benefits.

Lewis, who was the attorney for the Players Association from 1953 until 1959, blames John W. Galbreath, president of the Pittsburgh Pirates and chairman of the pension committee, for inducing the "freeze-out" of older players from the projected boosts.

SCOUTS FOR YANKS

NEW YORK (UPI) — Col. Buster Mills, a former major league outfielder, has been signed as the New York Yankees' southeastern area scout. Mills, 53, recently resigned as a scout for the Kansas City Athletics.

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
