

# AUTUMN'S PALETTE FLOWER SHOW THEME

Autumn's Palette is the colorful theme for the North Side Garden Club's flower show scheduled for Nov. 4 at the Klamath Falls Yacht Club, 2700 Front Street. Entries will be received from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. and will be removed at 5 p.m.

Arrangements are under the direction of Mrs. George Deen, chairman, assisted by Mrs. John Guidi, co-chairman. Mrs. Merle Jackson is club president.

Regular rules governing flower shows will be used. Prizes in junior sections will be merchandise. Award of distinction, award of merit and sweepstakes, ribbons will also be given.

Class A is for those who have won five or less firsts; Class B, five to 10 blue ribbons and Class C, over 10 ribbons.

Schedules may be obtained from Mrs. Deen or Mrs. Gary Price.

A brief outline of divisions follows:

Artistic division: Class 1: Gypsy Fires. Colored foliage, fruits, and/or flowers. Class 2: Song of the Pines—pine flowers. Class 3: October Bright Blue Weather—using colors of blue and gold. Class 4: Last Rose of Summer—a rose and up to three buds and foliage. Class 5: Call of the Wild—using grasses and plants. Class 6: For This Bounty, We Thank Thee—horn of plenty using fruits, nuts, pods or flowers. Class 7: June in November—dried flowers. Class 8: A Touch of Frost—whitened branches or evergreens, flowers permitted. Class 9: Frankly Artificial—using artificial flowers with natural foliage, weathered wood or figurines. Class 10: Fruit of the Vine—using artificial grapes, flowers or processed foliage. Class 11: Elfin Delight—miniatures under five inches.

Novice division— for the first time arrangers. Class 1: September Bounty—using a basket with fruits, flowers or nuts. Class 2: Wayside Beauty—using dried grasses, wil plants.

Men only division: Class 1: A

Bit of This and That—dried plants and weathered wood. Class 2: Hunters Quest—fresh or dried material with accessories.

Junior division: Class 1: Jack's Bite—a pumpkin and Jack-o-lantern. Class 2: Dear Teacher—natural and artificial flowers for teacher's desk. Class 3: Natural History—dish gardens. Class 4: Date Baiting—using a perfume bottle. Class 5: Farewell to Summer—a dried arrangement.

Horticulture division: Any house plant will be permitted. Potted plants, primrose, one crown; chrysanthemums, ageratum, asters, petunias and herbs, chives and parsley; any available blossom specimens.

Collection division: cacti, succulents, African violets, foliage plants, seed pods, branches of foliage, native cones, dried herbs, ornamental gourds, evergreens. Small pumpkins, squash, gourds, apples to be arranged on tray or in large bowl.

Also to be shown are berried branches, 12 to 18 inches in length, planters and horticulture exhibits from juniors.

**No Need To Hassle On 'Right Of Preparedness'**

Khrushchev must be tickled pink at the number of Americans who are being misled into do-nothingness, by all the talk about whether or not a man has a moral right to build a family bomb shelter.

Those who are trying to make a moral issue out of a simple act of preparedness ask two questions:

Could you bear to take yourself and your family to the safety of a bomb shelter, knowing that all around you those not so fortunate would be waiting to die?

Would you want to live in a world devastated by bombs — a world, perhaps, without hope?

The first question is absurd. Is there any difference between a man building a shelter for his family and moving them into it at the first warning of an enemy attack, and that same man's attempt to get his family to a safe spot during a tornado alert?

No man can be responsible for the survival of a whole community, but each man can take every possible precaution to protect his own family against any anticipated threat.

The second question is equally absurd.

No war is going to wipe the earth clear of all humanity. Some are going to survive. And the more people of good will who survive, the better for the future of mankind.

If Americans keep on debating the moral right to build family bomb shelters while the Russians keep on making preparations to go underground — there probably will never be an atomic war. There'll be no need for one.

All K will have to do is say, "Our bomb shelters are ready. Every Russian can get to safety. Are you Americans equally prepared? If you aren't—then we'll be glad to take over your country without dropping a single bomb."

Fantastic? Not at all. That's why K must smile his evil smile when he reads that many Americans are ashamed to build bomb shelters for fear it is morally wrong for them to even want to survive a nuclear attack.
