Church Council Wives, backed by every cook in the church, are summing up all their Scandinavian heritage to stage two evenings of colorful smorgasbord eating Nov. 1 and 2.

Food fans will be served from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. No advance tickets will be sold, but committee members expect capacity crowds both nights.

Their menu is their proof. Beginning with an offering of Swedish meat balls, baked salmon and baked herring, the fare will continue with sursild or pickled herring. Then comes the potatiskorv, or Swedish potato sausage (home-made, of course) escalloped potatoes, baked beans and assorted salads, deviled eggs, various cheeses and pickles.

There will be julekage or Christmas bread and homemade rye rolls. For the final sweet dinner guests will turn to lefse or lingonberries (Swedish cranberries), mandel kage or almond cookies, kranser or wreaths, sand bakkels or sand tarts, fattigmand or rich butter cookies, along with anise cookies, sprits and rosettes.

Among the cooks participating, Mrs. Hilding Nelson is making the pickled herring, while Mrs. Pete Hedberg and Mrs. Swan Erickson are preparing the potato sausage; and Mrs. Victor Ongman and Mrs. Olga Overan, lefse.

Mrs. Ted Hoff is making Christmas bread; Mrs. Otto Erlandson and Mrs. Esther Sveagarden, sand bakkels; Mrs. Harry Anderson, rolls; and Mrs. Bennet Lofsgaard and Mrs. Esther Sadius, rye bread.

Churches Set City-Wide Reformation Observance

Reformation Day will be observed in city-wide services at 3 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 29, at First Congregational Church, 2154 Garden Avenue. Klamath Council of Churches will sponsor the program.

The strains of Mendelssohn's "Reformation Symphony" will set the mood for the observance which will feature a sermon by Rev. Warren Pechman, pastor of Hope Lutheran Church.

Rev. Pechman, who will speak on "Why I Am A Reformation Christian," said the service will commemorate the historical posting of the 95 theses by Martin Luther on Oct. 31, 1517, and the

subsequent Reformation movement.

"We are indebted to the movement which gave the Bible to the world in the vernacular, or the languages of all the people," said Rev. Pechman.

"In addition to the direct religious significance, Luther's emphasis on education provided the impetus for the broad public education system in Western Europe and eventually in America," Rev. Pechman stated.

Various ministers in the Klamath Council will participate in the second annual service by the group, according to Rev. Ralph Richardson, president.

World Community Day will be observed in special services Friday, Nov. 3, by the United Church Women of Klamath Falls. The program will be held at 1:30 p.m. in First Presbyterian Church.

Mt. Laki Church Auction Saturday

"Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse," the Old Testament scribe recorded in Malachi. The Men's Club at Mt. Laki Community Presbyterian Church has given the age-old scripture their own interpretation for a very up-to-date problem.

At 10 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 28, at the Klamath County Fairgrounds the men will stage their second annual public auction of goods varying all the way from heifers and lambs to farm machinery and a knitted sweater.

The items, all donated by members and friends of the church, will be auctioned off, the proceeds to go to the Mt. Laki Sunday School building fund. Last year the men deposited their first \$6,000 in a fund which will finance the much needed educational facilities.

In one sense the donation of various items recalls the days when parishioners brought produce and articles to supplement the pay of the local parson, said Rev. Andrew Jarvis, pastor.

But in this case the goods brought in will benefit a project above and beyond the offerings which support the regular church budget, he explained.

Noting the many times the subject of tithes and offerings was mentioned in the Bible, Reverend Jarvis particularly recalled the advice to New Testament Christians urging them to give "not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver."

And that's just what has happened in the Mt. Laki area. Donations have come from many. There's a steer, a hog, a total of 12 fat lambs, a yearling heifer and four tons of hay, plus another 20 bales.

Pointing up modernity are an electric broiler, a potato planter and an oil floor furnace. Not all of the items are large however. There are canned goods, fresh produce, including Klamath potatoes, and even handmade clothing and accessories.

Joe Wright, president of the Men's Club, announced that many committees have been working for many weeks handling and collecting the items to be sold. Karl Dehlinger and Dwayne Blackman are coordinating the event.

Working on advertising have been Len Weber, Nels Olsen, A. R. Rickson, Harlan Heyden, Joe Riker, Innis Roberts and Jim O'Donohue. Listing the items are Arnold Brandt, Howard Manning and Gary Renne.

Also working are Bryant Williams, fairgrounds; Bob Rhodes, auctioneer; Joe Steele, potatoes; Robert and Paul Breithaupt, special donations; A. R. Dickson, accounting; Joe Riker and Brandt, livestock; Fred Beymer, hay.

First operating as a Bible institute, and more recently as a seminary, the school has doubled the number of trained pastors since it started 10 years ago.
