Klamath Union football coach Bob Williams, who just finished chalking up one of the best season records in years at the home of the Pelicans, seemed sort of calm and confident at the Booster Club meeting last Wednesday night.

Williams is quick to credit his players and his assistants, Larry Kline and Chuck Bills, jayvee coaches Jack Peterson and Lloyd Manown and freshmen mentors Keck, Don Herbig and DeLance Duncan for their parts in the KU success.

## Joe Brown Outpoints Challenger

MANILA (AP) — Fast-punching Joe Brown of Houston, Tex., twice flooring his younger opponent, easily outpointed Bert Somodio of the Philippines Saturday night while making a record 11th successful defense of his world lightweight championship.

Brown, 35, sent the 27-year-old challenger to the canvas for no-count in the fifth round and for a nine count in the 11th. He also ripped open a cut on Somodio's left cheek and staggered him with a solid right cross in the seventh. The champion also scored repeatedly with sharp jabs and uppercuts.

The decision was unanimous. Referee Arch Hindman scored it 74-62 under the 5-point system. Judge Tony Petronella had it 71-65 while Judge Rafael Torres of Manila had the titleholder in front 71-65. Hindman and Petronella are executives of the U.S. National Boxing Association.

A crowd of 25,000 in Araneta Coliseum saw the Somodio start and finish fast. He scored frequently in the in-fighting in the early rounds as Brown tried to keep him away with a constantly moving left and an occasional uppercut.

## Portland State Trounces EOC

LA GRANDE (AP) — Portland State College, led by the running of halfback Bill White, rolled to a 27-7 victory over Eastern Oregon College Saturday night in an Oregon Collegiate Conference game.

White gained a total of 189 yards rushing for an average of 8.2 yards per carry. Jerry Humphreys also sparked for the Vikings, scoring one touchdown and booting three conversions.

## USC Wins; Cal Beaten

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Illinois made a long and exciting journey in a vain attempt to escape the football wilderness Saturday — but Southern California hung on to win 14-10.

Southern Cal's Trojans went into the game as two-touchdown favorites, but had to come from behind in the third quarter. Sophomore quarterback Pete Bearhead took to the air in a 55-yard scoring drive to turn the trick.

The rangy thrower connected with six-foot-five Hal Bedsole for gains of 24 and 10 yards and then to Ben Rosin for 15 to the Illinois two. Big Ben Wilson scored through the line and the Trojans got the three-point conversion on a pass from Bearhead to Lynn Gaskill.

Few of the 28,694 in Memorial Coliseum left as Illinois began its belated march — from the Illinois 11 — with 5:50 left. The Illinois sophomore quarterback, Ron Fearn, cut loose with a 27-yard gallop to ignite the threat and the Big 10 visitors pounded on down to the Trojan 25.

The bulk of the ground gains was provided by Walter, Mills, and fullbacks Vern Petrick and Bill Bianchi.

## Soph Sparks Bruins Past Stanford U.

STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Sophomore tailback Mike Hafner provided a victory spark and defense halfback Kermit Alexander exploded on an 87-yard touchdown run Saturday as UCLA opened its Big Five Football Conference campaign with a 20-0 victory over Stanford.

A crowd of 35,000 saw Stanford's Indians throttle UCLA's attack through most of the first half until Hafner came on to direct an 82-yard scoring drive he capped with a smash from the 1.

Fifty-nine seconds later, Alexander grabbed a short field goal attempt at his 13 and raced through the entire Indian team for a touchdown on the final play of the half.

Stanford dominated third quarter play until UCLA's defensive lightning struck a second time on a 30-yard scoring dash by 219-pound John Walker with an intercepted Rod Sears pass.

Victory gave UCLA a share of the Big Five lead with Southern California, each with 1-0 records, Baylor 23-0.

## Army Eyes Star NFL Gridgers

The Green Bay Packers, powering their way toward a second straight Western Division title in the National Football League, may have high-scoring Paul Hornung on hand longer than they thought.

But the Cleveland Browns, struggling to stay in the Eastern race, are due to lose some of their prime offensive strength to the Army after Sunday's game.

Hornung, Green Bay's man of many talents, was to have reported for military duty this week but instead will check into the hospital for a physical examination which could take 10 days to evaluate.

However, the Packers still will have two regulars bound for the Army this week—linebacker Ray Nitschke and flanker back Foy Dole. And Cleveland will be hard hit by the military call-up with whippet runner Bobby Mitchell slated to go in.

The Packers, Western leaders with five victories in six starts, have a return match Sunday with the Minnesota Vikings (1-5) at Milwaukee, and the Browns (4-2) are at St. Louis (3-3). Also on the schedule: Philadelphia (5-1) at Washington (0-6), Dallas (3-3) at New York (5-1), Chicago (4-2) at Baltimore (3-3), San Francisco (4-2) at Pittsburgh (1-5) and Detroit (3-3) at Los Angeles (1-5).

With Hornung out for much of last week's game with a bad knee, the Packers uncovered a stellar replacement in Tom Moore, who was a running whiz as Green Bay smothered the Vikings 33-7. But as a point producer machine, the Packers don't have a man of Hornung's abilities. He set an NFL record last year with 178 points and is the current leader with 92.

Mitchell has combined with Jim Brown to give Cleveland a whirlwind ground punch in recent seasons and his absence will make it tough for the Browns.

The Browns are 4-2, with one of their victories over the Cardinals. To cope with Cleveland's vaunted ground offense, St. Louis has a bristling upfront defense. After Sunday, rookie Tom Watkins from Iowa State is likely to take over for the departing Mitchell.

Rice easily gave Texas its best test of the season, particularly in the first half, but the Owls couldn't match coach Darrell Royal's score-grabbing pupils.

Texas banged out 369 yards, rushing to only 52 for the Owls. The Steers had another 86 passing to 59 for Rice.

But for an apparent busted signal and an offside penalty Rice might have ended the half even or ahead of Texas. The signal mixup came on third down with 2 needed for a score and resulted in no gain. A fourth down pass was incomplete. Near the end of the second quarter, Billy Cox lobbed a 40-yard pass to John Burrell in the end zone but an Owl was offside, and Rice had to punt.

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## Owls Overpowered By Humboldt State

ARCATA (Special) — Humboldt State's Lumberjacks showed the Oregon Tech Owls Saturday night why they are the nation's tenth-ranked small college football machine as they relentlessly smashed the Techmen from Klamath Falls, 41-7.

Plowing through the mud with reckless abandon, the Lumberjacks raced to a 21-0 halftime lead and were never headed by the outmanned Owls. For Humboldt State, it was the 28th win in the last 27 games and gives them a 5-1 record this season. Oregon Tech, the defending Oregon Collegiate Conference champ, is 3-4 for the season.

It took Humboldt about seven minutes to get on the scoreboard. The Lumberjacks took over on their own 45-yard line after an OTI punt. Humboldt marched 55 yards to the Owl end zone with fullback Ed White doing most of the damage. White plunged the final two yards for the TD and also caught a 17-yard pass from quarterback Roger Toft during the drive. Halfback Frank Buda contributed a 19-yard run to the Lumberjack cause. Jim Walker kicked the point to give the Steers a 7-0 lead with 8:05 left in the first quarter.

Late in the first period, Humboldt started another drive. This one went 59 yards in eight plays and ended with Buda breaking over his own right tackle for six yards and an equal number of points. Walker again kicked the point. Key play of the scoring drive was a 39-yard double reverse to scatback Dodd Frasier.

Oregon Tech began a passing when its ground game was stopped cold by the huge Humboldt line. But Frasier showed up to intercept a Bill Rossan pass and returned it to the OTI 38-yard line. The Lumberjacks got fancy as end Ron Remington took a handoff from Toft on an end-around and went the distance. The TD was nullified, however, on a clipping penalty and the Techmen finally held on their own 23-yard line.

Unable to move, OTI's Larry Meyers lofted a punt and Humboldt took over on its own 47. The Lumberjacks then put together the third long drive of the first half and went 53 yards with substitute fullback Rego Piva slashing 25 over right guard for the touchdown. Walker kicked another point and the score stood 21-0 at the half.

The pattern of the game continued as the second half started and Humboldt splashed happily through the mud and the game, but outwitted Owl defenses. With 6:05 left in the third period, the Lumberjacks' Dave Curry pounced on an Owl fumble on the Tech 43-yard line. White again blasted up the middle for a five-yard TD jaunt. The point failed but the Lumberjacks had taken an insurmountable 27-0 lead.

ASHLAND (AP) — Sophomore quarterback Doug Olsen's sparkling performance Saturday night led Southern Oregon College to a 25-7 victory over Oregon College of Education.

Olsen ran for two touchdowns, passed to Howard Hartman for another, kicked three extra points and completed 17 of 31 passes for 286 yards.

HOUSTON (AP) — Pat Trammel, a 193-pound senior, passed for one touchdown and ran for another Saturday night as undefeated Alabama scored its sixth straight victory by defeating the University of Houston, 17-0.

Trammel's passes also sparked a 42-yard second period drive that led to a 33-yard field goal by Tim Davis.

Shortly after Davis' kick, the Crimson Tide cut loose with a 62-yard touchdown surge. Three Trammel passes accounted for 46 yards, including a five-yard touchdown pass to Bill Oliver.

A fumble at the Houston 8 stopped a 72-yard Alabama rampage powered by Mike Fracchia in the third quarter. Seconds later, however, the tide recovered a fumble on the Houston 15. Trammel carried over after Fracchia moved to the 2 in two carries.
