

Oregon Ducks Upset Washington 7-6

Ducks Get Even For One-Pointers

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon smothered the Washington passing attack and upset the Huskies, 7-6, Saturday despite a last quarter comeback by the Huskies.

Washington did not complete a pass until the end of the third period and did not score until the closing minutes.

Oregon produced its winning touchdown on just five plays in the second quarter of this defensive battle. Halfback Monte Fitchett of Oregon started Washington's downfall by taking a punt in midfield and returning it 32 yards to the Washington 34.

He almost went all the way but fullback Tony Kopy of Washington bowled his way past a blocker and managed to spill Fitchett with one arm.

From there, quarterback Ron Veres took just four plays to get the score, which came on an 11-yard pass to end Paul Baugé. Kicking specialist Buck Corey then added what turned out to be the winning point.

Washington never threatened until a 56-yard drive that started late in the third quarter and went to the Oregon 1 before the Ducks stiffened and held early in the fourth.

Washington came back moments later, however, with an 80-yard drive that produced its touchdown. Fullback Jim Stiger got it with a 2-yard drive.

The Huskies, who had gambled repeatedly throughout the game, tried for a 2-point conversion. It failed when quarterback Pete Ohler's pass fell short of halfback Charlie Mitchell.

Washington did not complete a pass in that drive but did manage two other completions in the closing minutes. One was for short yardage, but the other was a 47-yard gain that gave Washington a chance to pull the game out with less than a minute to go.

Oregon's defenders, however, batted down two more passes, and a field goal try by Ray Mansfield from the Oregon 39 was short in the final six seconds.

Oregon, after suffering one-point losses at the hands of Washington the past two years, considered it a fitting outcome. Oregon dominated the first half and saw a field goal try of its own fall short in the first period. Washington did not get past midfield until late in the drive that carried to the Oregon 1.

Up to that point, Washington had completed only a short swing pass for one yard. But then, with the ball on the Oregon 43, Ohler threw 24 yards to end Lee Bernhardt, and Oregon was penalized for piling. That put the ball on the Oregon 10.

Reserves had been in the game but Oregon put in its first team and stopped that threat.

Although Washington did not complete a pass in its touchdown drive a pass interference call played a big part. Washington was on the Oregon 27 when, finding the going tough, Ohler tried a pass. It fell incomplete but an interference call against halfback Lu Bain put the ball on the 12, and Washington went over on three line bucks.

ASHLAND (Special)—"It was a great defensive effort on the part of both teams." The speaker was Al Akins, head coach of the Southern Oregon Red Raiders who had just beaten arch-rival Oregon Tech 6-0 here last Saturday.

"Oregon Tech was every bit the team that I expected," continued Akins. "They have a good, sound ball club, and I'm tickled to death to get by such a good team as they have."

Akins, who had seen his Raider team drop the last three games in a row to OTI prior to last weekend's "big" win, had words

of praise for several members of the Owl eleven, including big Jim Madden, the 230-pound tackle who made his presence felt to the host Raiders all afternoon long. "Madden is a tremendous ballplayer," he said, "and their fullback, Harvey Graham, is a real good runner for being only a freshman."

The tremendous defensive battle, one which could have very easily ended up in a scoreless tie, saw Raider quarterback Doug Olsen score the game's only TD on what turned out to be a disputed play early in the fourth quarter. A 60-yard pass play from Olsen to Dave Hughes set up the SOC score, which took four cracks at the solid Owl forward wall to accomplish . . . or at least so say the officials.

With the ball resting on the one-yard line as the result of the long pass, Olsen attempted a quarterback sneak up the middle which many observers, including one of the game officials, thought had pushed the ball over the goal line. But say . . . the other three officials ruled that Olsen failed to make any ground and three downs later Olsen traversed the necessary yardage to score the biggest six points of his young college career.

"Actually, I never made it over that last time," admitted Olsen in the dressing room. "I was sure I was over the first time, and I'm sure the films will bear me out," he said. "On the fourth down play, however, they (officials) gave it to me."

As an afterthought, Olsen said, "I guess you might say that last play was an 'equalizer' as far as the officials are concerned."

GRANTS PASS (Special)—The host Grants Pass High cross-country team netted a low of 44 points to annex the District 6A-1 championship run over the GP Country Club course here Friday afternoon.

Tied for second with 32 points each were the teams representing Ashland and Medford. The Crater Comets were fourth with 87 while Klamath Union trailed with 102 points.

The tie for second place creates some problems for the district since the first and second place teams are scheduled to continue in the state meet at Willamette next weekend.

Medford and Ashland may run off the tie, draw for position, or petition the Oregon School Activities Association for permission to enter both teams.

The winning runner was Medford's Dennis Brumback who covered the 1.3 mile course in 9:28.0. Teammate Harold Martin was second with a time of 9:35.0. Ashland's Gerald Brown and Don Way were third and fourth respectively.

Paul Sandoval led Craig Lee and Bill Sweetland across the finish line for KU.

All five conference schools entered seven men, the best five of each being counted in the scoring.

Missing from the Pelican lineup was Steve Lawrence, one of the top performers, who was sidelined with the flu Friday morning. "We just got beat—no excuses," claimed coach Paul Deller of KU. "We'll be back next year — of course we'll lose three of our top seven to graduation, but I feel our chances will be good."

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—Gary Player of South Africa swept past Australian golf stars for a victory Saturday in the Professional Tournament at the Lakes Course.

MSU Wins, Hawkeyes Dumped

San Jose Stuns WSU; Wins 21-19

SPOKANE (AP)—San Jose stunned Washington State with three consecutive second-half touchdowns and then fought off last minute drives to take a 21-19 football victory here Saturday.

Spartan Walter Roberts intercepted a pass by WSU's Mel Melin in the end zone with 35 seconds left to protect the San Jose lead. A few minutes earlier, Melin's 40-yard field goal attempt went wide.

Two of the San Jose touchdowns came on passes from Ghon Gallegos to Oscar Donahue. The other was on a sparkling 53-yard punt return by Max Burton. Phil Clifton's kicks were true after each score.

Ken Graham brought the small crowd to its feet and the Cougars back into the ballgame in the fourth quarter with a 90 yard kickoff return. But WSU's gamble for a two-point conversion and tie failed when Melin's pass was blocked.

Washington State's score came on a one-yard run by Lew Blakey and a 53-yard pass-run play from Melin to halfback Jerry Campbell.

Al Brancos, 205-pound WSU guard, missed the chance to score the first touchdown of his career when he grabbed off a Gallegos pass on his own 16 in the second period and lumbered all the way to the goal, only to be ruled out of bounds on the 15.

But the backs took over there and provided the opening score. Hero Burton was almost the goat of the game. His fumble of Harold Haddock's lowering punt set up Washington State's second touchdown. Another time he had a pass stolen from his hands. But his go-ahead punt-return touchdown made up for all that.

DiGravio hit halfback Tom Bloom with a 19-yard pass and halfback Dave Miller with a short one in the important early drive, and a 15-yard Iowa penalty helped considerably.

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—Ohio State, a precision-like football machine ranked sixth in the nation, withstood an aerial bombardment by Wisconsin's Ron Miller and ground out a 30-21 victory over the Badgers Saturday in a bruising Big Ten duel.

Michigan's Bennie McRae then fumbled on the first play when smashed by safety Tom Teigen. Dickson pounced on the loose ball, then bumbled over from the one on fourth down.

The victory left the Gophers with a 3-0 conference record and kept the venerable Little Brown Jug in Minneapolis.

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The Buckeyes put on a brilliant display of ball control in posting their fourth straight triumph since an opening 7-7 deadlock with Texas as Christian.

The fourth period began with Mike Todd going over from the five to even the score at 6-6. Don Osborne then went off tackle for the point and a 7-6 Honker lead.

The final Honker TD came following an interception of a Merrill pass by Roy Kreizenbeck on the Husky 20. Three plays later, Kreizenbeck scampered over from the nine. Troy Wooten ran the conversion to make the final score of the County B League game 14-6.

Holton charged through the Army line for hunks of yardage all through the afternoon and crashed through for a score standing up from the Army 9 at 9:42 of the third period.
