

Substitute Baby Sitter Sought in Kidnaping

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI)—FBI agents said today a "substitute" baby sitter may have hitchhiked into Nebraska with the 2-month-old baby she is accused of abducting.

A South Sioux City, Neb., poultry truck driver, Vernon Schmidt, said a woman answering the description of missing Mrs. Margaret McKewon, 37, thumbed a ride with him Monday night at Winnebago, Neb.

The woman carried a baby in a yellow blanket and was accompanied by a "small man" 5 feet tall and about 35 years old, he said. He said the woman told him she was going to visit a "sick

mother" in Omaha and that he let her off at Fremont, Neb., near Omaha.

Mrs. McKewon, an expectant mother, is accused of making off Monday with Jacqueline Marie Willett, the youngest child of a destitute, 17-year-old mother of four children.

The mother, Mrs. Ruby Willett, said she left her children with Mrs. McKewon, her across-the-hill neighbor, while she went to look for work. When she returned, she said, Mrs. McKewon's husband was caring for the children. The husband, Darrell, told her "not to worry" and that his wife

would soon return with the child, she said.

Mrs. Willett said her neighbor had agreed to substitute as a baby sitter when her regular sitter refused to come because she had no money. Mrs. McKewon loved the baby, the mother said, and frequently claimed it was her own.

"I want her back more than anything in the world," the black-haired mother said.

Her 25-year-old husband, Franklin, was released from jail at Yankton, S.D., so that he could be with his wife during their ordeal. Willett had served half of a 30-day sentence on a bad check charge.

Mrs. Willett said she didn't report the missing baby until late Thursday because she was "scared" Jacqueline would be harmed. FBI agents headquartered at Omaha entered the hunt for the infant.

Speaking of his family's poverty, Willett said "We've been on the outs for a long time."

Mrs. Willett signed papers giving temporary custody of two of her children, Patricia, 1, and Frankie, 2, to county authorities. A fourth child, Darlene, 3, was with Willett's mother at Yankton.

Nation's Budget Goes Up And Up

WASHINGTON (AP)—The budget is like a black balloon. It keeps going up but you can't see through it.

Since it's what the government spends, for everything from missiles to pencils, it affects all our lives.

But no ordinary citizen can understand it. It's too big, too detailed, too complicated.

Yet, a brawl over it is building up between the politicians of both parties. It will get worse in the weeks ahead.

Over this weekend the Kennedy administration will make a forecast.

That this year's spending will be near \$89 billion, a peacetime record; that government income, or revenue, will be only about \$82 billion; and that therefore the budget deficit will be around \$7 billion.

Two good reasons make the budget opaque:

1. What goes into it—meaning what the President and his aides, and later Congress, think it is necessary to spend—is after all a matter of judgment.

That alone means disagreement.

2. The budget figures—the list of expenses the President thinks necessary and submits to Congress every year for approval—fill a volume as big as a metropolitan telephone directory.

No uninitiated man could understand it all. In fact, just five days ago a congressional committee complained the whole budget procedure is 40 years out of date and should be modernized.

When President Eisenhower ran deficits the Democrats quickly gave him what-for. And he had some beaux, too.

One year it was \$12.5 billion. For the fiscal year ending last June 30, President Kennedy announced in July, Eisenhower's deficit was \$3.9 billion.

Now that Kennedy is running a deficit, the Republicans are returning the compliment. Eisenhower already has started banging away.

He not only recently criticized Kennedy's spending but added: "The state of confusion I now sense in Washington is like a tornado—on a spring day."

Democrats—but not Kennedy—promptly reminded him of that \$12.5 billion deficit of his own. But after Kennedy goes into some detail in this weekend report there will be enough ammunition to keep the politicians shooting for months.

Meanwhile Kennedy has some ready explanations for his deficit: Getting the economy out of a tailspin, building up necessary defenses.

As if to take some of the edge off the Republican criticism he can expect after this weekend, Kennedy has done things like these:

He urged his Cabinet and agency heads to be frugal in spending and hold down the number of government workers "to the minimum consistent with getting the job done."

But his administration has promised a balanced budget next year. The Republicans will be highly skeptical, and probably will tell him so before he ever tells Congress next January what the next year's budget should be.
